OCD DIRECTOR ANNOUNCES CONFERENCE

Tire Inspections Due By January 15

DALLAS—Civilian defense and industrial workers in Texas, Oklahoma, Arkansas and Louisiana are invited to attend the January sessions of the War Department Civilian Protection School, R. E. Smith, regional OCD Director, said today.

Schedule of courses to be offered at Loyola University in New Orleans during January include the following; plant protection, Jan. 3 to 8 and the same course repeated Jan. 17-22; technique of protection, Jan. 10-15, and gas specialists' course, Jan. 24-29.

Applications for attendance at any one or all of these courses are available at state and local defense councils and there is no fee for registration. Rooms and board are available to both men and women students in the college dormitories for \$15. for each of the six day periods. Registration takes place the first day of each course and specialists from the War Department are the teachers. Lt. Col. Harold R. Brayton, the director of the school.

Sponsored jointly by the War Department and the Office of Civilian Defense, these courses are repeated periodically at Loyola University for civilian and industrial personnel in this region. Civilian defense workers and plant protection officials have found these courses beneficial in the safety and defense programs. Mr. Smith said.

Further details are available by writing to the Office of Civilian Defense, Mercantile National Bank Building, Dallas, Texas, or to the State Defense Council.

Soldiers Over 38 May Be Discharged For Industry Jobs

DALLAS—Soldiers over 38 years of age who wish to be honorably discharged from the Army to return to essential posts in war industries must initiate discharge action, OWI reported. The action also may be undertaken by employers.

The Army regulation governing such cases also specifies that each application for discharge unless a suitable trained replacement is present and available. Civilian agencies such as the War Manpower Commission have no jurisdiction in such cases, OWI stated.

BRASHIERS WED 50 YEARS AGO IN ARKANSAS

Owners of commercial vehicles were reminded today that their first tire inspections under Certificates of War Necessity must be made before January 15, 1943. Ray Martin, Waco district manager for ODT's division of motor transport, urged that operators not wait until the last minute for a rush on approved inspectors, but begin now to get inspections.

A commercial motor vehicle may not lawfully be operated after January 15 without a Certificate of War Necessity and an endorsement by an approved tire inspector on the Certificate. Motor vehicles must be presented for inspection every 60 days or every 5,000 miles, which ever occurs first.

Purpose of the periodic inspection is to insure proper tire conservation. Inspectors have been designated by the OPA War Price and Rationing Board and work as Federal Government agents for this purpose.

If an inspector finds that a tire needs repairing to insure maximum service, he will withhold endorsement on the Certificate of War Necessity record form covering operations of the vehicle on which the tire is mounted, until the repairing has been done. If he finds any mechanical condition causing undue tire wear, he likewise will recommend the necessary repairs and will not sign the operator's Certificate until they have been made.

Without removing tires, the inspector will check for correct air pressure in tires, bent rims and out-of-round wheels, cuts or breaks in treads or sidewalls and evidence of wear from badly aligned wheels, faulty brakes, unbalanced wheels, chamber malalignment and excessive wear of kingpins, bushings and wheel bearings. Inspectors may remove tires from rims for further inspection, if not satisfied with inspection on the rim.

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PRO-NAZI IN NORTH AFRICA BECAME HATED

PORT LYAUTET, French Morocco (Delayed) (UP) —A baby-faced boy of 18, bundled into an overcoat which concealed the French Foreign Legion uniform

that would have branded him a deserter, offered me a list of Frenchmen today.

"We want you to shoot them all soon as possible," he explained.

Those on the list were pro-Vichy Frenchmen. They had been in the minority, but for two years they had matters their own way and ruled with an iron hand under Nazi guidance. The festering bitterness which has arisen between them and pro-Allied Frenchmen is a baffling problem for the ablest diplomats with the American occupation forces in French West Africa.

Before I encountered that boy I had been sitting at a sidewalk cafe filled with laughing gieful

Frenchmen. It was the "pro-Ally" cafe of Port Lyautet. Across the street was the "pro-Vichy" almost empty.

"We have had to whisper just as they whisper in Germany and France," an Allied sympathizer told me. He was wearing the tricolor badge his friends had broken out when the American troops arrived.

"We've waited two long years for you to come," he said "so we could talk out loud once more."

There were sullen looks from comfortable sitting there, as though I had stepped into a family feud. So I left, and then I met the boy who wanted to kill all pro-Vichyites.

He stopped me to inquire the way to American Army head-

quarters. He answered my quizzical look by opening his overcoat just a bit to reveal a glimpse of the bright uniform of the Foreign Legion.

"I have waited two years for a chance to escape so I could fight with the democracies again," the boy said. "When the Americans came I ran away from my regiment at Meknes and walked 80 miles here. Now you will tell me where the Americans are."

I told him, but I knew he faced a rude shock. The American forces had received scores of French Legionnaires — Poles, Russians, Czechs and others — who had similar ideas. But the Americans had no facilities to care for them and, technically, now that the armistice delegates were meeting in Algiers, they were under obli-

gation to return these lads to their troops.

Another problem is what to do with the merchants of Morocco, who want to do a little "business as usual" with the help of American merchandise and American money.

There are a score of first-class shops in this modern colonial outpost of 17,000 persons, some fancier than those in an American city of similar size. From the hardware merchant to the beauty operator, they told the same story to the first Americans to arrive.

"Now if America will just send us something to sell," they said. They pointed to empty shelves.

Virtually isolated since the fall of France, little merchandise had reached them.

The population would like something to buy. They would have a fair amount of staples like meat, fish, cereals and the like, which they can produce themselves, but they need clothing, other foodstuffs and gasoline for their immobilized machines.

The ravages of idleness are visible throughout Port Lyautet. Its modern docks and warehouses once handled thousands of tons of shipping annually, sending millions of dollars worth of merchandise inland to Meknes and Fez.

But when the Americans came they found the machinery of the dock cranes rusted. Ships had been up the river for months or years, either interned or hiding. The merchants are clamoring for American goods to speed up the slow commercial heart of West Africa.

ON sweltering summer days, many cooks like to serve a cold luncheon to their family and guests. But they often include one hot bread to give the cold meal added zest.

Cinnamon Coffee Cake

Two cups sifted flour, 4 teaspoons baking powder, 1 teaspoon salt, 6 tablespoons shortening, 4 tablespoons honey, 1-4 cup sugar, 1 tablespoon flour, 2 tablespoons butter, 1 teaspoon cinnamon. Soft together all dry ingredients, then cut in shortening until mixture looks like cornmeal. Mix honey, egg, and milk and stir into dry ingredients. Spread over bottom of a greased 9-inch round or 8-inch square pan. Blend together sugar, 1 tablespoon flour, butter and cinnamon. Sprinkle over top of dough. Bake in 400 deg. oven for 25 minutes.

As a hearty breakfast for the hungry defense worker or summer vacationer, try these delicious pancakes:

**Buckwheat Pancakes
(18 pancakes)**

Two cups whole ground buckwheat flour, 1 1-2 teaspoons salt, 4 teaspoons baking powder, 6 tablespoons butter or other shortening, 2 eggs, 1 tablespoon molasses, 2 1-4 cups milk.

Blend flour, salt, and baking powder. Cut in butter with dough blinder or 2 knives. Combine the 2 slightly beaten egg yolks, molasses and milk and add to dry ingredients, mixing just enough to moisten. Fold in stiffly beaten egg whites and bake on griddle. Serve with butter and syrup.

**Civilian Building Takes Big Slump**

AUSTIN—Civilian construction in Texas dropped nearly a fourth during November, to total only \$1,609,592 in 32 major Texas cities, according to Texas Bureau of Business Research.

Three cities reported no building permits issued during the month, and reports were lacking from 12 cities usually on the bureau's list.

Building permits for November were 72.3 per cent below the total for November 1941.

Dallas led the list with permits totaling \$389,711; San Antonio

following with \$346,464, and Houston in third place with \$196,899. Dallas and Houston both issued permits totaling well over a million dollars in November a year ago.

There is a chance that the Texas Interscholastic League may have co-champions this year—something that hasn't happened since 1929 when Brockenridge and Port Arthur battled to a scoreless draw on a snowy field at Waco.

There has been one tie game in the finals since that time—in 1932 between Corsicana and Masonic Home—but Corsicana won the title because penetrations were counted in case of tie. The Central Texans rolled down inside Masonic Home's 20-yard line five times that day and kept the Home boys outside their own.

This year's finalists—Sunset of Dallas and Austin—voted to not use the penetration rule, so a tie game will bring co-championships to the two competing teams.

Incidentally, neither of these two teams have ever been in the finals previously.

With the defeat of Amarillo by Sunset last week the honors for most titles won since the league started official operation back in 1929 still remains tied at four each for Amarillo and Waco. The San Joaquin team was out after their fifth try to set a new record.

Airport Now Has Flying Jeeps

WAYNE, Mich. (UPI)—The Army Air Forces now have a "jeep" of their own.

It's the "Sentinel," a small,

tough, highly maneuverable scout plane which can land or take off on a cow pasture or highway, climb at exceptionally sharp angles and maintain altitude at unusually low speeds.

The ship, produced by the Stinson division of Vultee Aircraft, Inc., is designed to be the "eyes" of the ground forces—the artillery, tank corps, cavalry and in-

fantry.

The "Sentinel" has a wing span of 34 feet. It carries a pilot and an observer and has radio communications with all types of ground units as well as with other airplanes. The "flying jeep" is so stable that the pilot can concentrate on observation without worrying about inadvertently stalling or spinning.

The tiny warplane has other advantages, too. One of the most

important is that it requires little gasoline and service work—a boon

to ground crews on distant battle fronts where supplies are a serious problem. Like the auto "jeep" the "Sentinel" can be pushed around easily by its own crew or hidden under trees.

In many operations this plane replaces the "sausage" observation balloons used during the last war. It has a wide spread range enabling it to fly unusually fast.


to a hovering speed of less than 45 miles per hour.

Although the plane's fuselage is made of welded steel tubing, its wings and tail surfaces are fashioned from wood to conserve strategic materials. Nearly 70 percent of the aluminum in the "Sentinel's" original design was eliminated before the plane was put into production.

Another new warplane also has

been turned out by Stinson. It's the AT-19 or "Reliant", which will be used to teach British Navy fliers aerial navigation. The AT-19, a high-gulled monoplane with seating capacity for four, is essentially the peacetime Stinson "Reliant" used by business executives and sportsmen. It is powered with a 290-horsepower radial engine.

Let Nothing You Dismay

In Czechoslovakia unsightly rubble is the only reminder of what used to be the little village of Lidice. From some where in Nazi captivity, women and children mourn husbands, fathers, sons, brothers who were murdered cold bloodedly, in Lidice, because Czechs dared fight for their country.

In Greece, women and children whose only fault was being born non-Germans literally are dying from starvation, while their Nazi conquerors gorge on food that would save those innocent lives.

In Norway men, women and children are suffering from bitter cold because their warm clothing and fuel have been taken to Germany for Nazi use.

What is happening to the Poles, and to Jews of every nationality, to satisfy the sadism of Hitler and his colleagues is too gruesome to be told in detail.

In France, in Belgium, in Holland, in Yugoslavia, in Denmark, in China, in the Philippines and all over the Orient the marks of the beasts are cut deep into lands that never asked more than the privilege of living their own lives in their own ways.

Americans, at home, have been spared. Yet today or Guadalcanal, in North Africa, in New Guinea, on the waters of the seven seas and in the air everywhere, Americans and British and refugees from the occupied countries are dying in defense of fundamental human rights.

Against the sad world background, it sounds pretty empty to shout Merry Christmas, doesn't it?

Have we any right to a Merry Christmas, with bright lighted evergreens bedecked with gifts from everybody to everybody else—to Merry Christmas, with turkey or goose Christmas pudding with brandy sauce, and all that comes between, including the wines?

There are many who say "NO", and most of us have reduced the scale of both of celebration and of giving. But still we are observing Christmas in the traditional manner. And why not?

Christmas, though sometimes we forget, is the birthday of that Christ whose teachings we are fighting to preserve. We are giving both wealth and blood to protect the spirit of the Golden Rule, which probably can't be paraphrased better than in the words of St. Paul to the Ephesians:

"It is more blessed to give than to receive."

There can be no incongruity about devoting this one day in the midst of total war, to celebrating the birth of Christ and certainly there can be no more appropriate observance this day than through giving to others.

Last Christmas was blacker than we knew then. Last Christmas, if the Japs had known it, the arsenal-pantry of democracy lay wide open for a knockout blow.

Now, thanks to the fortitude of our allies and the astounding energy of our own people, the tide of battle has been turned. We can see ahead—further than the optimist thinks, yet still in sight—that Christmas when all the oppressed peoples of the world can join us in whole-souled festival.

Therefore with proper restraint and a deep sense of personal gratitude that we in this hemisphere still remain free to carry on the tradition:

God rest ye merry, Gentlemen,

Let nothing you dismay;

Remember, Christ the Savior

Was born on Christmas Day.

several years, it is only recently that a McDonald Observatory scientist discovered the cause of the glows. Dr. C. T. Elvey, astronomer at the jointly operated University of Texas-University of Chicago plant, has been studying the mystery with one of the fastest cameras ever made as well as instruments.

The red and green glows, which cannot be reproduced under normal conditions in the laboratory, are caused by oxygen atoms in the upper atmosphere, about 350 miles above the earth's surface. The yellow glow comes from sodium atoms 50 to 100 miles above the earth.



against individual migration to war centers by those seeking work, without first consulting the Employment Service office nearest them.

"It is going to be necessary to fill labor requirements in the industrial centers of this region

out of which the whole program of national war activity is fabricated, and the channels through which men and women of Texas, Louisiana and New Mexico will be directed so they may contribute their maximum to winning the war were outlined today by the man who is responsible for getting this big job done in these three states.

He is James H. Bond, Regional Director of the War Manpower Commission for Region X.

"It takes planes, guns, tanks and ships to win this war,"

Mr. Bond said today. "But first it takes men and women to make them, and the hundreds of other things required to arm and equip the fighters. Putting the right workers in the right war occupations is the job that has been given the War Man Power Commission."

The manpower situation does not present a uniform picture throughout the country, Mr. Bond explained. Needs and local situations vary greatly, even within the same states and regions, and the War Manpower Commission in this Region will handle these local situations on an individual basis, keyed to the local respective needs.

"This region, for example, is predominantly an agricultural section," Mr. Bond explained, "and we are constantly concerned with the vital problem of producing or harvesting enormous crops of live stock, foods and fiber that must be given adequate labor to handle them. At the same time, we have seen a substantial development of industrial war production in certain areas of this region. We are

keyed to the local respective needs.

"The key to orderly direction of men and women who are being brought into the war effort is the United States Employment Service, now a part of the War Manpower Commission, with local offices located throughout the three states that comprise Region X. Mr. Bond said. Pointing out that certain local defense areas already are taxed to capacity, he warned





