



Federal rent control in crowded war production Edson areas is estimated to have saved tenants some \$300 million in 1942, may save them as much as \$1 billion in 1943 on the basis of a total rent bill of \$5 billion. To achieve this saving the rent controls division in the Office of Price Administration had, as of the end of 1942, 283 offices, 3000 paid employes, and was spending money at the rate of \$10 million a year. In other words, for every dollar of the taxpayers' money spent by the government to control rents, tenants were saved \$100.



A SURPRISING array of new, post-war industries may be a-borning in-of all places—the war plants that are now devoted to turn-ing out tons of poison gas, incendiary bombs and the non-toxic smoke. which will play an increasingly important part in this global ruckus. Take the gas masks themselves. At least 10 miltion of them will have to be made for the armed services, to say nothing of the millions made for civilians. The important part of the gas mask is



high-grade charcoal and it was a considerable problem to produce this gas absorbing material in sufficient quantities. Today this activated carbon can be made from almost anything, including coal when the war is over the plants making this activated carbon may be kept right on going, say

Since this activated charcoal will absorb gas, chemists spy it is entirely possible to make a handy little kitchen dingus that will absorb kitchen odors. Yea and moreover, the chemists say this activated carbon stuff wil even take the stink out of a gymnasium locker room, than which

there is nothing huskier this side of a skunk. NEW smoke-producing units designed to throw smoke screens ove war plants or whole cities to camouflage them and spoil the aim of enemy homber pilots may find a practical application in peace time as frost protectors for orange groves and early vegetable patched. The old method of beating a sudden freeze was to light smudg fives and rouse every man, woman and child in the countryside to keep the smudge pots going all night long.

These new smoke-producing units, however, will make the job of protecting an orange grove or a truck farm as simple as

protecting an orchard, an orange grove or a truck farm as simple as cigaret lighter. A small battery of machines will smoke up a squar

mile or more, and, being practically automatic, only a few men woul be required to keep the fires going all night.

A large part of the poison gas manufactured is chlorine or chlorin compounds. Productive capacity for chlorine manufacture has bee stepped up tremendously, and new processes have been developed for its more economical manufacture. Here's another industry that won be just a war baby. Manufacturing chemists are looking ahead to a big boom in the chlorine bleaching business, and in further purifice. tion of water supplies, whether you drink it or swim in it. Brand-ne cleaning agents that will revolutionize the dry cleaning business at to be found in the chlorinated bydro carbons which also have a rol some place in the complicated chemistry of synthetic rubber, and c course that may be the biggest of the war-born industries.

THERMITE, or iron oxide, used in some of the incendiary bomb has already found wide use in manufacturing as a welding agent, so there's nothing new in that. But in magnesium, the element used in other incendiary bombs, there is a whole new light metworld waiting to be born. Alloyed with other metals, it has it strength of ricel, with much less volume. Your new post-war at tomobile may have a lot of magnesium in it and will consequently lighter and much cheaper to operate.

Relief At Last For Your Cough

Substitutes Are Needed For Farm Fertilizers, Now

AUSTIN Jan. 21- In the face of the rapidly growing shortage of fungicides, insecticides, and fertilizers to protect and vitalize crops, a sound crop planning and rotation program ought to be de-veloped and put into effect, believes a University of Texas soil

Dr. Marie B. Morrow, University botanist and bacteriologist, who for several years has conducted extensive soil and plant stu-dies for the U. S. Department of Agriculture, points out that the war effort is requiring the use of many chemicials which formerly went into these agricultural "remedies", and suggests specialists ought to be assigned to discove substitutes.
