# ALLIED WAR STAFFS CONFER

## MEN 18 TO 38 MUST HAVE **CLASSIFICATION CARDS ON** PERSON BY FEBRUARY I

Men of These Age Limits Subject to Heavy Penalty if Card and Registration Certificate Not Carried on Person

All men in the State of Texas between the ages of 18 and 38, who have been subject to Selective Service registration for as long as six months and who do not have their classification cards, were cautioned today by General J. Watt Page, State Selective Service Director, to communicate with their local boards at once.

On and after February 1, General Page pointed out, any man in this age group who does not have in his personal possession his Classification Card (Form 57), as well as his Certificate of Registration, is liable to fine or mprison-

The recent order of the Selective Service Bureau of the War Manpower Commission, setting the February deadline for possession of Classification Cards by men of military ages, has met with prompt response in Texas. General Page said. Many registrants are reporting to their local boards, requesting classification or asking that lost Classification Cards be duplicated. However, General Page says he believes there are still a fefw who have failed to get in touch with their boards because of carelessness or negligence.



ry of how the rationing of canned goods came to be necesin these us d-to-be-free United States makes an interesting oackground, now that this rationing is about to be put into effect.

onekground, how that this rationing is about to be put into effect.

The first move in this direction was taken as long ago as February.

1942, when a temporary ceiling order was slapped on wholesale prices of canned fruits and vegetables.

This order went into effect March 1, 1942.

There was some hoarding of canned goods going on even then, and there was some need for allocation. The Army and Navy were asking that large supplies of canned goods be set aside for them, and

supplies of canned goods be set aside for them, and the war production areas with their big new pop-ulations were upsetting all the normal demands and

ulations were upsetting all the normal demands and channels of distribution.

At that time, no one had any accurate idea of what the canned goods situation of the country really was, and the curbstone opinion of most people in the food industry was that little or nothing could be done about allocating output.

That created one of those well-known government needs for statistics, and as a result there was compounded one of those now famous government questionnaire. It was tough. It was everything any businessman had ever heard or seen in the line of a government questionnaire, and more. It went out to the 2200 food canners and processors and the 7200 wholesalers.

FIRST returns came in May and by May 31 the division of supply and requirements in the Office of Price Administration had an idea of where the inventories of canned goods were at the beginning and end of the month, how much goods had been canned during the month and at what rate they were disappearing. These reports have been made out monthly since that time by 90 to 97 per cent of the

By summer need for rationing really began to be felt, so in Aug the War Production Board slapped down its conservation order M-237 restricting canners to the delivery of not more than 35 per cent of the civilian allotment of 1942 canned goods to retailers by Dec. 1 1942, and not more than 70 per cent by April 1, 1943. This was applying action on the civilian allotment of the cent by April 1, 1943.

In September the M-237 order was amended and rationing was applied to the wholesalers by restricting purchases to 70 per cent of the fruits and 80 per cent of the vegetables they had sold to retailers during the first eight months of the year, January through August

THERE were still no restrictions on sales, however, until November when the stocks began disappearing too fast. Then the whole-solers' sales to retailers were restricted to 9 per cent of their, base

period sales per month.

The first plan for rationing canned goods at the retail level was drawn up last July. It has been revised, sweated over, amended and generally overhauled many times since then, and it still isn't perfect it probably never will be.

All these plans are being worked out with the food industry, and rationing of all foods is being tied to existing trade distribution methods. In England customers may trade with only one store. These is none of that in the U. S. rationing scheme. Customers may trade anywhere they like so as to keep as much freedom of competition at there always has been between retail stores.




