HOME SERVICE DEPARTMENT EASTLAND COUNTY RED CROSS IS AIDING MEN IN SERVICE

Department said to be doing more in proportion to population than any other county in state of Texas

(EDITOR'S NOTE)-The following article has been prepared to familiarize the public with the work that is being done by the Home Service Department of the Red Cross in Eastland County, and to encourage the people to contribute to the War Fund Drive for the Red Cross which will begin March 1.

STATEMENT BY SENATOR HARRY F. BYRD (D-VA.)

In his press conference, the President, in opposing the action of the House Appropriations Committee which eliminated the appropriation requested for continuance of the National Resources Planning Board, of which the Pres ident's uncle, Frederic A. Delane, is chairman, depicted aimself as a "miser" and "economizer" role in which the President said few people had seen him); and called those advocating the elimination of this agency "speadthrifts." I confess I find some difficulty in following this line of reasoning.

The President rightfully says we must have post - war unaccustomed role of an economizer, which would have been more convincing had it been based on more solid substance.





Advice Given On Planting and Care of Irish Potatoes

About March 1 has been recom mended as the planting dates for Irish potatoes. Select a light sandy loam soil that is well drained and will warm up early.

The varities recommended by the Extension Service are the Triumph, the Irish Cobbler, and the Katabdin which is especially recomraended for home use. Plant the potatoes that was plowed last fall, if possible. Plow to a depth of

Use seed that has not been damaged in transit, and see that it bears an inspection card certifying it to be free of disease. A medium sized potato may be well divided by 2 cuts at right angles, thus making four pieces. planting, open a furrow in the center of the ridge so that potatoes can be planted and covered easily with three to four inches of soil. Space planting at 14 to 18

Cultivate frequently to keep the surface soil and eradicate weed growth, As soon as plants appear, stir the soil between the rows and reasonably close to the plants to a depth of 6 inches,
