ALLIES READY TO MEET SUB

RUSSIANS ADMIT KHARKOV IN HANDS OF GERMANS AFTER A TERRIFIC DRIVE BY THE NAZI

In the North the Russians are driving ahead for important victories as they admit fight in Smolensk Area

LONDON, March 16 (UP)-Russia'admitted Tuesday dy the fall of Kharkov, its fourth city, to a German army of twenty-five divisors which was driving on a 120-mile south ern front from Belgorod to Izyum.

But in the north the Russians, facing the thaw, were driv ing ahead for important victories, and the Monday midnight communique for the first time put the fighting in the Defense Corps. It is understood Smolensk area, the great German pivot for the whole front, that this covers injuries sustained 230 miles southwest of Moscow.

"On March 15 our troops, after several days of fighting, evacuated the town of Kharkov by order of the Soviet commander." the midnight bulletin reported.

Germany had thrown upward of 250,000 men into the battle and at the cost of scores of thousands killed had tak en the battered city into which the Red Army had marched Feb. 16 for the biggest victory of its winter offensive.

OOK for a considerable reshuffling of war contracts as the principal result of the next War Production Board reorganization which Donald M. Nelson and ais new right-hand man, Charles E.

official reporting to someone else. That will be the Washington shift but it will have no particular effect outside the capital. The Controlled Materials plan and the Industry Advisory committees will continue operating along the lines now laid out, with minor shifts in CMP from time to time as bugs develop and have to be eliminated. Otherwise, no major changes in WPB machinery. Where the Nelson-Wilson plans will really affect war production industries will be in taking some contracts away from some manufacturers and


some contracts away from some manufacturers and giving them to others. While at first glance this might seem to be a cause for considerable confusion in industry, WPB spokesmen insist that will not have that effect. On the other hand, they believe the redistribution of some con-

tracts will smooth out war production and result in greater production. Contracts will not be "renegotiated" in the sense that contract prices will be reduced, and no contractor will make any less profits on his operations as a result of redistribution, WHAT will happen is that contractors who have more work than they can handle will have the surplus taken off their shoulders and given to plants that are now idle or not working at full capacity. That is intended to give more dependable production, steadier production, with sewer layoffs or shutdowns because of a lack of raw

materials or component parts for assembly into finished materials It is Chairman Nelson's belief that war production can be increased by as much as 20 per cent through this orderly handling of war contracts, and without necessarily cutting civilian requirements to the

As an example, Nelson mentions the case of one war contractor, Company X, employing highly skilled labor, which was found to have a fourth of its productive capacity devoted to the manufacture of parts which did not require highly skilled labor. By taking this work away from Company X and reassigning it to other companies, the full capacity of the plant was devoted to precision work on which it was behind schedule. Bringing it up to schedule enabled other companies dependent upon the parts furnished by Company X to get up to their schedules.

Nelson and Wilson plan to use WPB field men to scout out plants in which production may be increased by getting them needed materials, machine tools, or solving their manpower problems, thus eliminating peaks and valleys of output and insuring a steadier flow of materials in and out of the factory. The actual job of reassigning the contracts, however, will of course be the work of the Army and Navy procurement services which let the contracts in the first place
