OPA Offers Some Reduction In Butter Points

The Eastland County OPA Board announced today that where there is danger of wasting country butter, the Board has permission to offer temporary reduction in points.

If a particular community within the county is experiencing difficulty in moving country butter to the extent that waste and spoilage is eminent, the Local Board has permission to reduce point values. A reduction in point values cannot be permitted unless it is clear that the farm butter is selling at a price at least low enough to continue the customary flux season differential between farm butter and creamery butter and that farm butter cannot be disposed of at the customary price differential without a reduction in point values.

It has been necessary, however, to fix two definite standards in regard to reduction in point values which are as follows: (1) No Board shall authorize a reduction in point value for country butter for any farm producer whose average weekly production of butter during the month of May is in excess of 10 pounds per week, or whose average weekly production of butter during June is in excess of 8 pounds per week. (2) No country butter may be reduced by any Local Board to a value of less than five points per pound. Applications for point reduction on country butter must be made to the Local Board office and the producer must report on Form R-1609 for the period for which sales were made. This applies only to producers of Eastland County.

ADDITIONAL UNITS GRANTED HIGH SCHOOL

Dr. G. C. Bombing Olympic To Be Staged By Schools Cadets

ARMY AIR FORCE BOMBARDIER SCHOOL, CHILDRESS, TEX., (UP)—The first All-American Bombing Olympic, composed of cadet teams of the bombardier schools of the Gulf coast and the West coast, will be held here May 23.

A small group of army officers will witness the inter-sectional olympic.

Approved by the Flying Training Command, the Bombing Olympic is designed to devise new methods of training as well as to keep alive a competitive spirit. Teams will include pilot, student bombardier and student photographer, and teams from Childress, Midland, San Angelo and Big Spring bombardier schools will be pitted against teams from Victorville, Calif., Deming, Albuquerque and Alamogordo, N. Mex.

Trophy for the Olympic, designed by the chambers of commerce of the cities in which the schools are located, will be a pickle barrel, the bombardier's symbol of success.

FLEWELLEN IS GUEST SPEAKER AT LIONS CLUB

Lee Dockery was in charge of the program for the regular meeting of the Lions Club held at the Paramount hotel Thursday afternoon, and presented L. H. Flewellen, representative of the 106th legislative district of Texas, who spoke on legislation.

Rep. Flewellen has just returned from Austin after the close of the 48th session of the legislature and had much of interest to pass on to the club. He stressed the necessity of more thought being given to pending legislation as well as more thought to bills before they were presented by senate and house members. Among the bills which Flewellen stated that he had sponsored, was the bill which permits the state highway department to take over upkeep of roads built by counties, without assuming the indebtedness for construction of the roads.

Club members presented Miss Imogene Minton, club pianist, with a rhinestone lapel pin in appreciation for her fine services and for her unbroken record of attendance for the year. Joe Graham, president of the club made the presentation.

The possibility of Josef Stalin helping to plan United Nation's Global strategy appeared enhanced today by a Moscow dispatch skirting the subject with what appeared to be an affirmative inclination.

The dispatch said the mission of Joseph E. Davies, who reached Moscow with a message from President Roosevelt to Stalin while the President and Prime Minister Churchill were conferring in Washington, was believed to have been highly successful.

Meanwhile President Roosevelt told a press conference that movement of war supplies into China is going along pretty well, and that he and Prime Minister Winston Churchill will make some final decisions next week on basic Allied strategy.

The Chief Executive declined to elaborate either statement, except to say that next week's basic decisions will be based on tentative reports which he and the British Prime Minister expect to receive tonight from their staff chiefs.

He sounded an optimistic note by declaring that this country's steadily-mounting ship production is forging a ring which is slowly but surely being tightened around the Axis.

On another point, Mr. Roosevelt said in response to questions a large majority of this country's armed forces outside the United States are stationed in the Pacific as Churchill said in his speech to Congress Wednesday.

He said he and Churchill will study their staff chiefs' recommendations over the week end.

Applesauce Is Sure Fire With Girl Gremlins

WASHINGTON, (UP)—To correct a fallacy making the rounds—there are little girl gremlins. Take it from Jacqueline Cochran, the world's No. 1 flier and director of the Army Air Forces' Pilot Training Command for Women at Fort Worth, Tex. whose acquaintance with them dates back to 1932.

"Fifinellas," as modern female gremlins are known, are believed by Miss Cochran to be direct descendants of the "Ladies" and "Ladies-in-Waiting" of the 18th century. Cooper, who retired recently because of failing health, built many of the rubber figures used in the Macy Day Parades in New York City and made envelopes and gas bags for almost all the big and little dirigibles produced in America.

Rubber Boats Got Impetus In Balloon Races

AKRON, O., (UP)—The rubber life raft which is standard equipment today for airplanes operating over water goes back to the balloon races that were all the rage in the '20's. Those balloon races helped to demonstrate the practicability of light, quickly-inflated craft such as those on which three Navy fliers spent 34 days under the hot Pacific sun not so long ago.

Want Baubles To Barter With Pacific Natives

SAN FRANCISCO, (AP)—The San Francisco League for Servicemen has launched a nationwide drive for contributions of cheap and imitation jewelry to be sent to the armed forces in the Pacific for barter with the natives.

Reports received here by high Army and Navy officials reveal that the aborigines of the Pacific islands will perform the most dangerous and arduous tasks in exchange for trinkets, cheap jewelry and almost anything that glitters. Jewelry of the 10-cent store type is worth its weight in gold.

One unit in the islands reported that in exchange for a cheap brooch and a pair of earrings one native dug 52 foxholes, so that when the soldiers arrived on the front protection was already prepared for them.

Help Carry Wounded
The natives will also carry the apparently have no fear of any personal danger, and a bauble will cause anyone of them to do work that often relieves a soldier for a more serious task.

The natives will also carry the wounded on stretchers and help the troops in any way they can—just so there is a glittering reward in sight for them.

Some soldiers are even wondering if they could not barter them into doing KP duty for them.

Seek a Slogan
The league expects eventually to choose a slogan in which to help them with their nation-wide campaign. Among some under consideration are "Buddies' Baubles for Barter," "Currency for Cannibals" and "Jewels to Jab Japs".

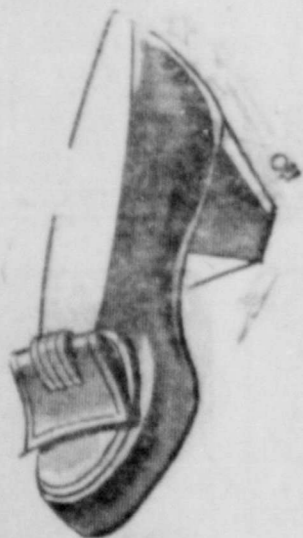

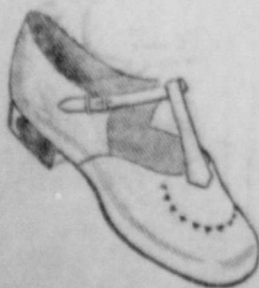

And then he explained that he had just checked into the field after being transferred from Frederick, Okla., and was using the bunk of his twin brother, George.

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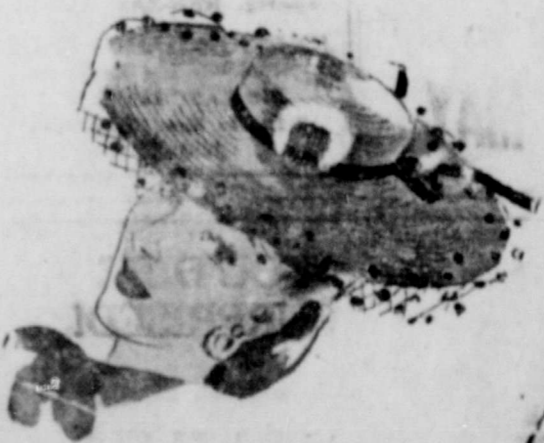
