INCOME WITHHOLDING LEVY IS PASSED BY SENATE AND NOW **UP TO PRESIDENT ROOSEVELT**

Bill virtually assured of becoming law as President has let it be known that he will not vetoe it

WASHINGTON, JUNE 2-Climaxing one of the bitterest congressional battles the compromise pay-as-you-go income tax bill was passed by the Senate today by a vote of 62 to 19.

The bill which was approved by the House Tuesday with a vote of 256 to 114, now goes to President Roosevelt who is reported to have assured congressional leaders that he will allow it to become a law.

Thirty-one each of Democrats and Republicans voted for the measure indicating the bipartisan nature of the short but complicated measure.
