Since this is a county show, the animals have to be registered to compete. Any Dairyman in the county who would be interested in exhibiting at the county show are requested to contact the County Agents office.

## Candidate



Preston Smith, 38-year-old Lubbock business man, entered the political arena this week by announcing his candidacy for Lieutenant Governor.

Smith is a three-term veteran of the Texas House of Representatives. He was first elected in 1944 to represent District 119.

During his service in the House, Smith has been for four years a member of the appropriations committee. He has also served as chairman of the sub-committee on higher education. He is a firm believer in the application of sound business methods in the operation of the state government.

Born on a Williamson County farm, son of Mr. and Mrs. C. K. Smith, he stayed with farm life until 1931. He is the seventh child in a family of 13 and has six brothers and six sisters.

Much of his career in the House has been devoted to championing the cause of Texas' rural people. He was author of the rural hospital bill and co-author of the rural telephone bill, and also has been active in the fight for farm-to-market roads and soil conservation. Smith has been a supporter of all veteran legislation.

Of his hospital plan, Smith says "This measure will go a long way toward solving the doctor shortage in small communities. If the counties will vote bonds for hospitals and then lease them to some of the young doctors just out of college who have no financial means to build their own hospitals, the younger men will not be so inclined to go into the large towns where facilities are available."

Commenting on his race for Lieutenant Governor, Smith said, "Much of Texas' population is centered in rural areas and small communities. Unless you have lived on a farm or in one of the very small towns, of which there are many in the state, you can't realize how much is needed in the way of worthwhile legislation for the rural areas. Texas needs the services which the rural population provides. The rural population needs better facilities for day-to-day living. As Lieutenant Governor, I will continue my efforts to see that this important segment of our population receives as many needed improvements as possible, along with other necessary and important legislation."

## Harold M. LaFont Announces For Re-election



This week Judge Harold M. LaFont announced his candidacy for re-election to the office of State Representative of the 120th Representative District of Texas. In making his announcement for re-election, Judge LaFont submitted the following statement:

"Many people will recall that last November I made the race for representative to fill the vacancy created by the resignation of Judge I. B. Holt of Olton, Texas. I want to take this opportunity of thanking the people for the large vote they gave me last November. Representing the people of this district at the special session of the Legislature in February of this year, the most impressive thing to me about it was the importance of the work of the Legislature to our people.

"In asking the people to re-elect me to this office it is with a full realization that whoever the people elect has the responsibility of making the laws that govern over 6,000,000 people of the State of Texas. These laws directly affect the daily lives of practically all of us and serious thought and consideration should be given to each and every law that is passed by the Legislature. It is my humble judgment that men who fill these places of responsibility and in whom we place our trust and confidence, should be experienced, honest, sincere and capable.

"All of us are interested in the progress and welfare of our Representative District and of the State as a whole and we have a right to expect our fair share of those things for which our tax money is spent. These included educational assistance, police protection for our families and property, assistance for aged and needy people, and a good system of state highways and more paved farm to market roads. All of these items of state governmental help make our district a better place in which to live and rear our families.

"Among the subjects which no doubt will be considered by our next Legislature is a program to pave more rural roads. We, in this district, are particularly interested in any such program. Another matter we are vitally interested in and which will have to be closely watched by us because of its importance to us is the question of our underground water. The meeting held in Amarillo a few days ago is illustrative of the thinking of some people of our state.

"Having served as county judge of Hale County from 1932 to 1939, and district attorney for six counties of the eight counties in this district from 1942 to 1949, having practiced law in this district for twenty years, I believe that this experience should qualify me to represent the people of this district.

"It is my plan to make this race on whatever merit I may have and not on the demerits of anyone who may run, and I assure you that if you support me for this office in the election to be held on July 22nd of this year no one will try harder than I will to represent all the people of this district."

Mr. Jay Boston, who was recently selected as the outstanding farmer of Castro County for 1949 by the Board of Supervisors of the Running Water Soil Conservation District, was guest speaker of the Dimmitt Lions Club at noon Tuesday, March 28.

Mr. Boston, in his talk to the businessmen of Dimmitt, related many of his farming experiences which have made him the successful farmer he is. Chief among the topics he discussed was the use of legume crops for soil-building and the use of fertilizers along with legume crops. "These new practices may be compared to the advent of farm tractors of a few years back," stated Mr. Boston. "Some farmers are going to continue in their old way of farming, not realizing that they will be losing money every year they let pass without using soil-building crops." He added, however, that this applies only to irrigated lands since nature will take care of dry land farms by giving them a rest occasionally through droughts, green-bugs, etc. In 1948, Mr. Boston made a measured yield of over 70 bushels of wheat per acre. He was trying for an 80-bushel crop for this year but the green-bugs have made that impossible now.

He still plans, however, to make a record corn yield this year on some land on which vetch was turned under for soil improvement. "We have as good a soil as can be found any where," said Mr. Boston, "and if we handle our soils right, we can produce as high yields as any county anywhere." He was of the opinion that we should stay with crops that we know will grow here such as wheat, grain sorghums, and corn, instead of turning to truck crops where more labor and intensive farming are required. Mr. Boston believes that the potentialities of Castro County as to high yields of wheat and grain sorghums and livestock feeding possibilities are second to no other county, if proper use of soil-building and fertilizing practices are made.

Other practices for which he was selected as the outstanding farmer of Castro County for 1949 included the establishment of improved irrigated pastures, proper management of crop residues to prevent blowing and increase the water absorbing and water-holding capacity of the soil, and the installation of a good irrigation system to make the most efficient use of irrigation water. Though he lives in Hereford, Mr. Boston farms in Castro County eight miles north and seven miles west of Dimmitt. Soil building crops which he has grown include hairy vetch, which is usually fall seeded and hubam clover, which can be drilled in the wheat crop during the last of February, March or the first part of April. Mr. Boston's farm was included in a conservation tour which was held last summer in Castro County, and it will very likely be included in tours to be held again this year. He gives credit for assistance he has received from Mr. Raymond King, County Agent, and technicians of the Soil Conservation Service all located in Dimmitt.

**Sports Afield...**

The chief difference between the angler who catches fish and the one who doesn't is that the former covers every bit of possibly productive water, and the latter doesn't. The skilled stream fisherman, for instance, will start practically at his feet and work out from there, handling each cast and its drift to cover every square foot of water.

And next to persistence (which implies careful, thorough fishing and patience), experience is most important in catching fish. You can read as many articles as you wish and it won't do a bit of good unless you put the suggestions into personal experience. But you can draw upon the experience of others for some things, so here are some do's and don'ts contributed by Bill Wolf, who knows fish and fishing from coast to coast.

**Don'ts**—Don't fail to clean your fish soon after they are caught and pack them in damp cloth, grass or ferns. Don't expect to catch a fish every cast. Don't stand up to cast in narrow boats or canoes. Shout or swear, but don't bump the bottom of the boat. Don't have more than two people cast from a small boat at a time.

**Time of day**—Fish may feed at any hour, but day in and out you'll get your best fishing in the

If you like night fishing, try the night. The big ones feed at night, two hours before sunset and at shallows; surface lures work well then. Try large dry flies (really huge ones); use slow-moving or noisy surface lures for bass. And at night, the darker the lure the better.

**Plug casting**—Get the best reel you can afford, a light line and a fairly long rod. Small fine wire leaders with snaps at the end are ideal for quickly changing underwater plugs, spoons and other lures; don't use them with floating plugs. Whether fishing a surface plug or an underwater lure, vary your retrieve. Your tackle box should contain some underwater, semi-surface and surface lures, a couple spoons and some rigs for using pork rinds or chunks.

**Bait**—Other than the worm, which is good anywhere, anytime, there is no "best" bait, so consult local fishermen. Only a few generalities are possible here. Minnows, crawfish, worms and hellgrammites are the big four among baits—dependable, usually plentiful. One of the four is certain to appeal to almost any kind of fish. However, don't overlook beetles, grasshoppers, crickets, grubs, ca-

talpa worms and other caterpillars—or anything else small enough.

**Bass-bugs**—A sturdy fly rod, a level line and a short leader work best here. The leader should be about four feet long and strong. The one absolute necessity is a well-greased line. The cork, balsa wood or deer hair lure should lift easily off the water.

The subject of flies is so big, we decided to devote all of our next column to it alone.

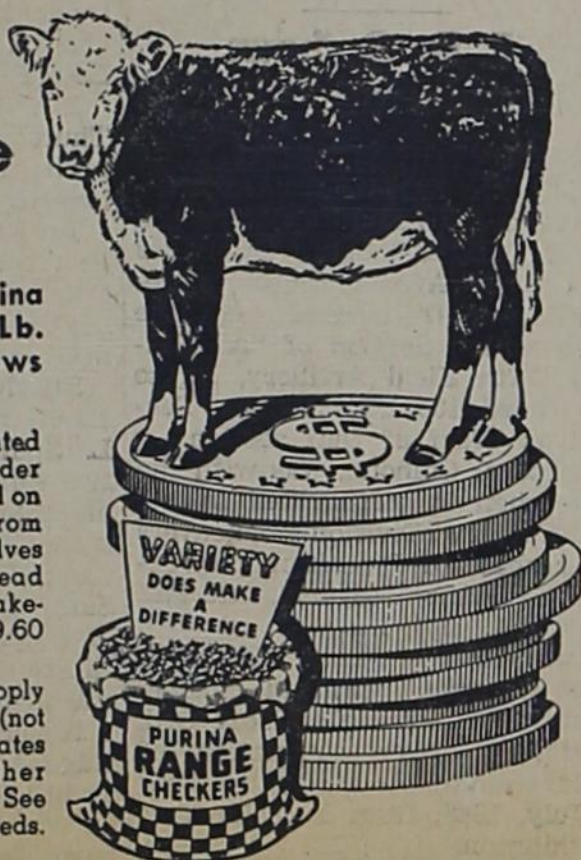

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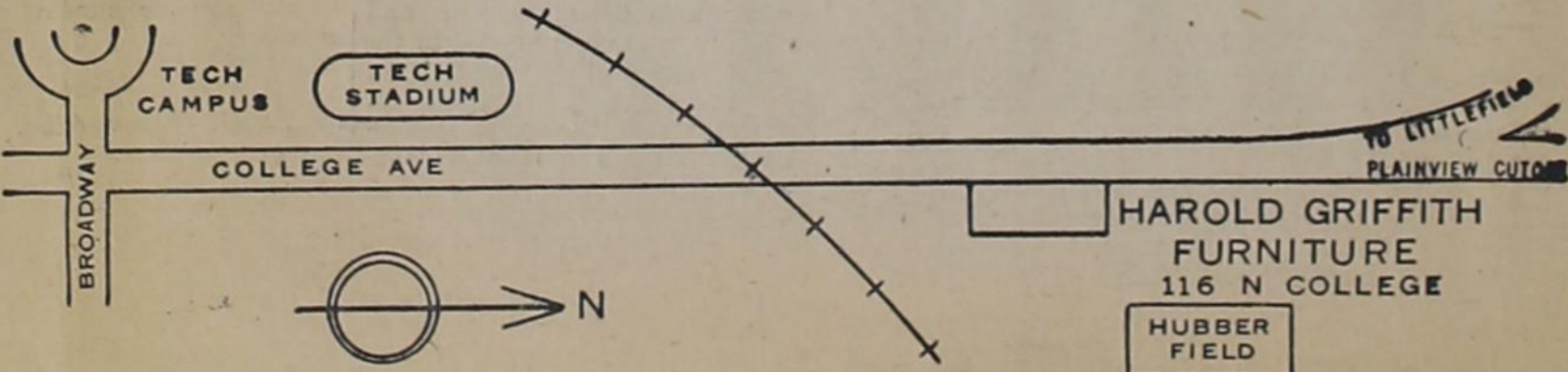

A thousand and seventy girls registered at the meeting. Our girls spent an interesting and entertaining day at Borger.

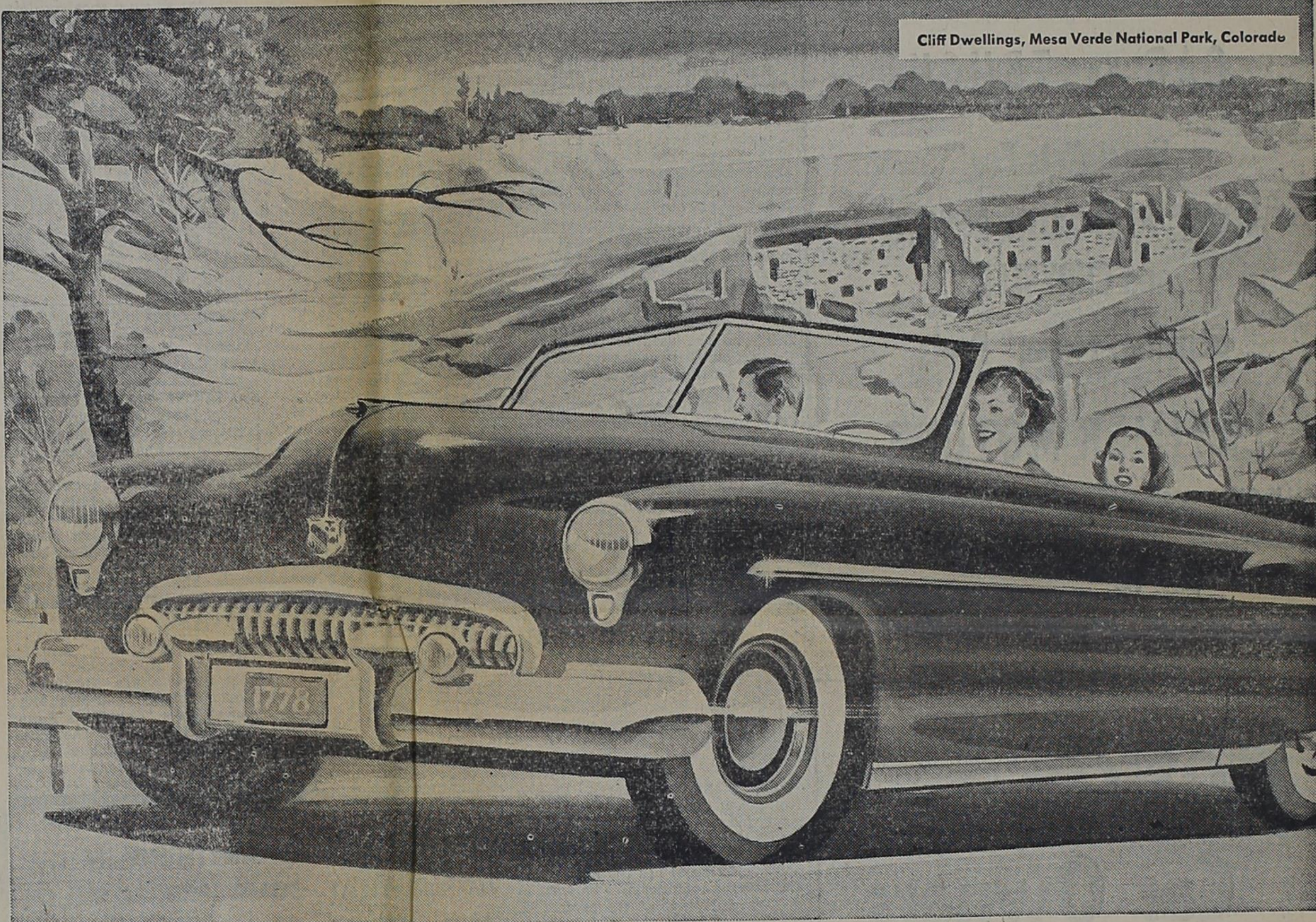

College Station, March 16—Right now eggs are plentiful and compared with other high protein foods, they are a good buy. The homemaker who is hunting bargains in food and has the freezing and storage facilities will be wise to take advantage of the present situation, says Lucille Shultz, associate extension foods and nutrition specialist of Texas A. & M. College.

She says eggs can be stored in the home freezer or freezer locker for six months or more and still be as good as fresh eggs. Only clean eggs should be used, she warns, for dirt from dirty shells may drop into the eggs during the breaking process and spoil the keeping quality. She says the fresh clean eggs should be broken into a clean bowl then mixed thoroughly but do not whip in air. Fill moisture, vapor-proof containers with the egg mixture and they are ready to freeze and store.

If the yolks are separated from the whites and frozen separately, she says you'll want to use corn syrup, sugar or salt to prevent a gummy condition. For each cup of yolks, add one tablespoon of syrup or sugar or one teaspoon of salt. Mix thoroughly and use the same type of containers as recommended for the whole egg mixture. Whites frozen separately need nothing added and no mixing.

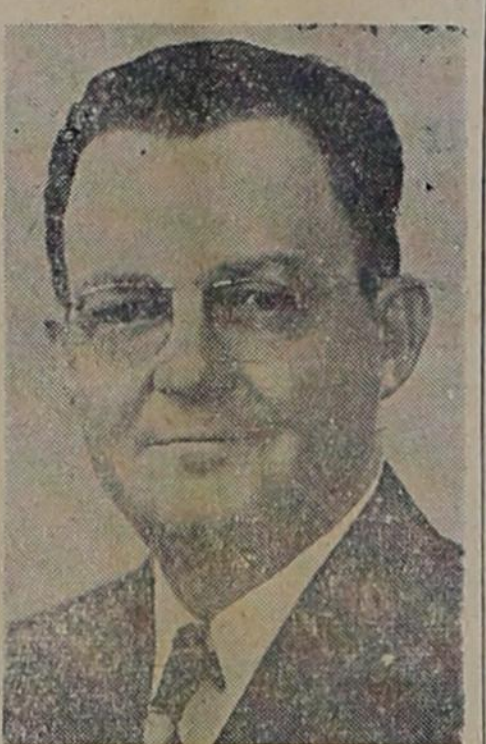

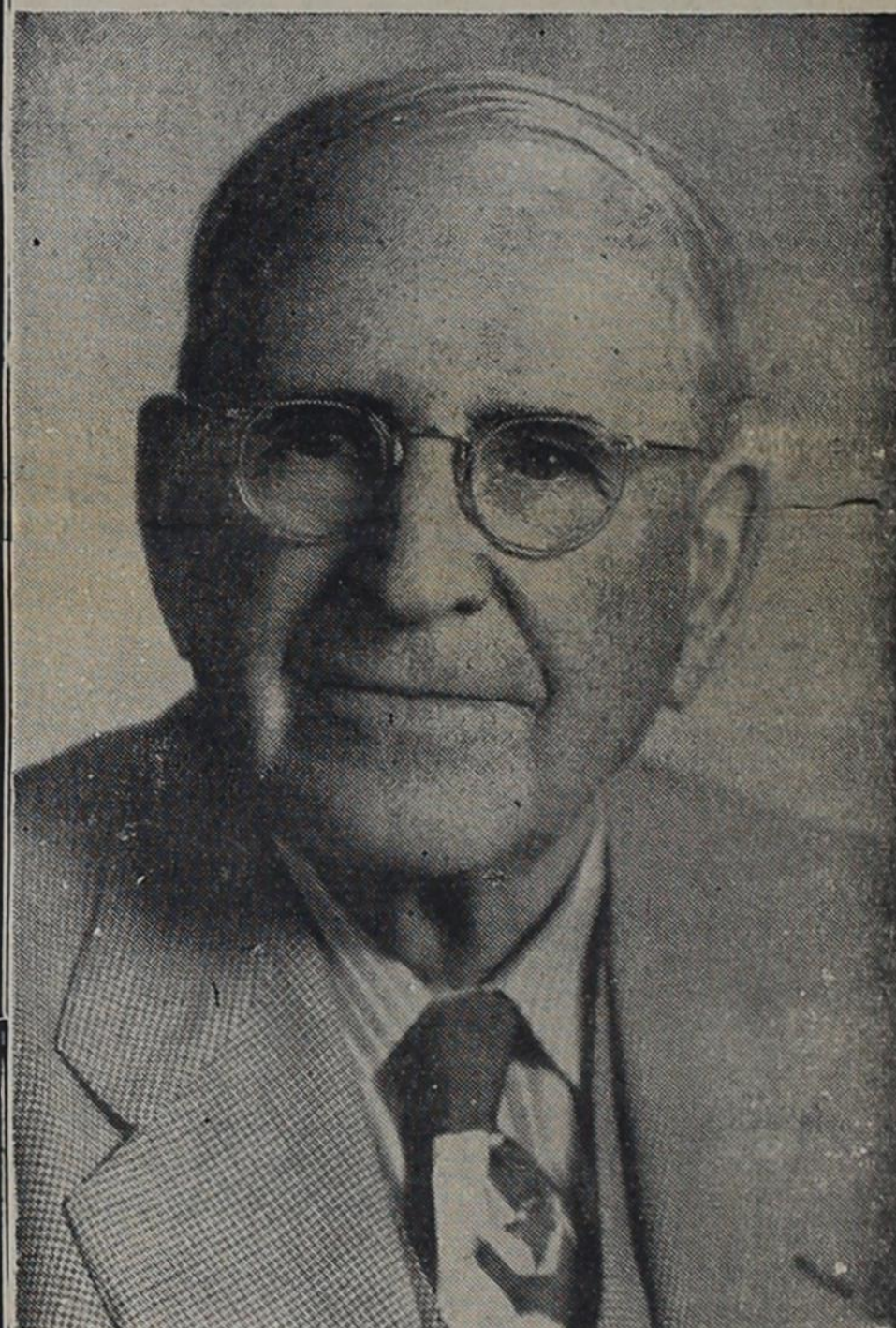

**Continuous Control Needed In Insect Eradication**

Austin, Texas—"There is no easy road to the abatement of insects and rodents, says Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer. Frequently people get enthusiastic about the destruction of the insects and believe that, if an airplane flies over the town, or if a huge fogging machine rolls through town spreading insecticide, the insects will be killed instantly and peace from the insect nuisance will remain forever. This is an erroneous and, unfortunately bad practice, because it creates an

unwarranted sense of security. Before any killing is anticipated, a thorough clean-up of the community should be carried on. This means cleaning up the rubbish and garbage and eliminating all insect feeding and breeding places. It might mean the draining or filling in of wet areas for destruction of the mosquito larvae. When this is done, one will be surprised how few insects are left to become a nuisance and, perhaps, a public health problem. Following this, it is suggested that insecticides be sprayed manually to those places inhabited by the insects. Experience has shown that a 2 per cent to 5 per cent solution of DDT is still the most effective insecticide to use for general sanitation. This is spread to form a thin coat on the surface, where it can remain for future destruction. A spray that will just moisten the surface is sufficient to be effective. Spray only those areas where you know the insects gather.

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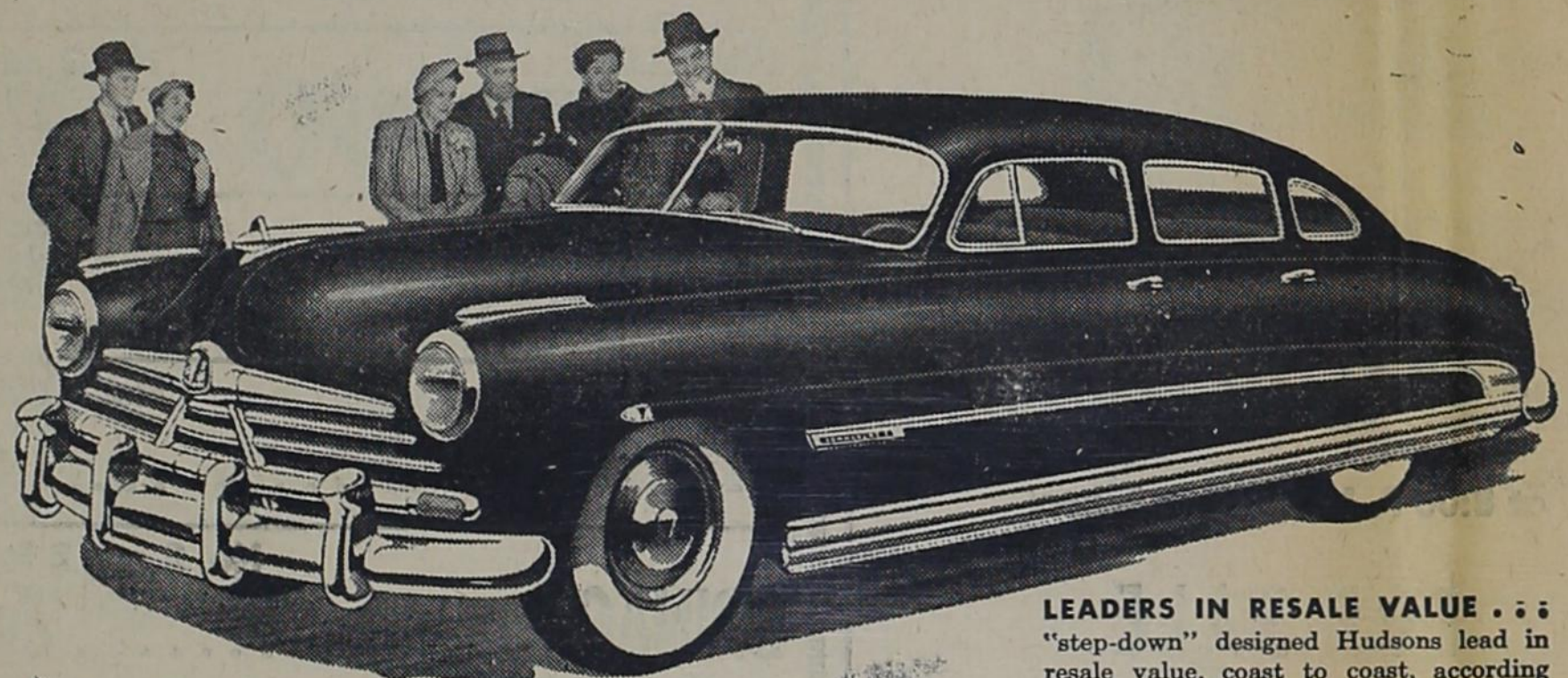

 1/2 teaspoon salt  
 1 tablespoon sugar  
 1-3 cup shortening  
 3/4 cup milk  
 Butter

 Mix and sift dry ingredients and work in the shortening with the fingers or a knife. Gradually add enough milk to make a soft dough, mixing with a knife. Bake in a very hot oven (450-460 F.) and put crushed sweetened fruit twelve to fifteen minutes. When done, split into two parts, butter between the layers and on top. Serve hot with cream.

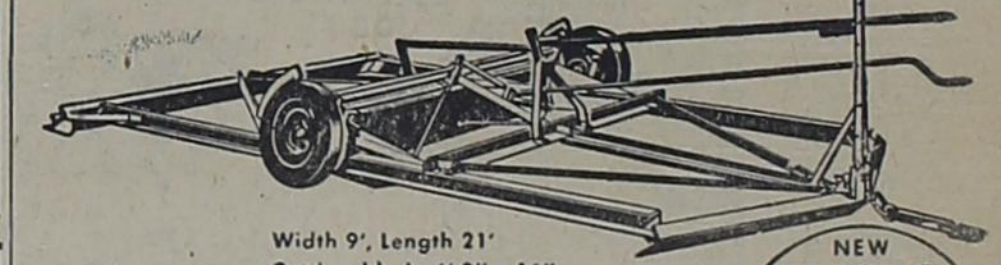

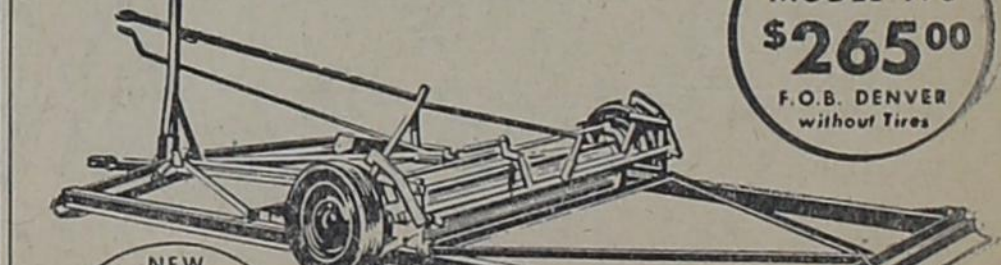
