MacArthur's bombers swept in on the convoy at mast height and antiajreraft fire, barrage ballons and thirty-five Japanese fighter Russians threatening Konoto planes covering the operation.

Twelve of the enemy fighters were shot down by the bombers and their fighter escort and eight others were listed as probably de-s troyed and five as damaged.

Three Allied bombers and one fighter were lost in the daring attack, but five of the seven vessels had been sent to the bottom or were burning fiercly when the raiders turned away.
