Lex Boost for Liquor, Beer, Wine, Jewelry, Furs

Uncle Sam May Also Boost Revenue on Cigars, Cigarets

Special to Central Press WASHINGTON-It is now fairly clear that an economy minded congress will pass a tax bill that will yield between two and three bil-ilion dollars of revenue a year. Sharp increases in a number of excise taxes will be provided for by the new measure—in lieu of a general sales tax which is definitely out owing to administration and labor

Liquor, beer and wine taxes are due to be boosted and istest in-dications are that cosmetics, jewelry, furs, and possibly also passenger transportation, theater admissions and a number of other items. Uncle Sam is expected to collect more revenue on cigars and he may up the ante on cigaret taxes. Rates on first-claus mail will go up a penny an ounce, but chances favor retention of exist-

ing rates on second-class mail. Individual income taxes will either remain about what they are now or will not be increased sharply.

The house ways and means committee, meanwhile, is moving for aplification of the individual income tax structure by merging the "victory tax" with the 6 per cent normal individual income tax. It is expected that the senate will be sympathetic to this idea.



It's always a big crowd in these war days. But the Long Distance operator keeps the calls moving quickly unless they just get too many for the circuits. . If she says the circuits are busy, you can help by canceling your call if it isn't really important. But if you can't cancel, the operator will request-"Please limit your call to 5 minutes." It's the work of war we are trying to speed over the wires.




