

These USDA grades for carcass beef are Prime, Choice, Good, Standard, Commercial, Utility, Cut-Prime beef is used by hotels and beef is used by hotels and restaurants while the Choice, Good, Standard and some Commercial beef etail counter, Uvacek says. Good cuts can be obtained from any of these grades but the lower grades are usually better for the cuts which are cooked slowly, while teaks are usually more tender if aken from the higher grades.

Slaughter calves are graded Prime, Choice, Good, Standard, Ut'lity and Cull but the consumer usually sees the appealing terms, calf, young fed tender beef, veal and others at the meat counter. Most of the lambs marketed fall into the top three USDA grades. These are Prime, Choice and



That is the primary reason or the Committee on Rules in the irst place, its jurisdiction includng '(a) the rules, joint rules and order of business of the House.. Good government requires a sharp livision of opinion, sound presenation and expression of all facets of the problem or issue involved and a thorough screening of the proposed final result. This is the process that has made this counry great, that has made it strong and will keep it strong. Any policy or process of permitting a simple majority to shove through any and all kinds of laws on emotional dictates or other pressures would soon result in the destruction of any government. There is no doubt that the Rules Committee has on occasion created frustration in the minds of those who would like to see their pet bill or project sail through unopposed. But it must be remembered that the sharp division of he Rules Committee constitutes an excellent safeguard against impractical or inadvisable successes by advocates of any extreme philosophy. It assures consideration for the will of the minority, whichever party that might be. The secret of good government is the balance that is struck in the final product of law after full, complete and exhaustive consideration and debate of the issues and problems involved. Some call it compromise others call it the area of agreement between the many sides represented. But to me it is the balance that insures the justice guaranteed under our Constitution to all individuals. The Rules Committee in the House of Representatives as constituted prior to the 87th Congress is, in my opinion, the balance wheel that can preserve the good health of our go-
