Elections come and go. Some are very routine and make only a slight impression on the minds of the people concerned. However, the election just held demanded and received widespread interest throughout the United States, and fortunately the results amounted to a vote of confidence for our national government. Unlike some European nations whose administrations are based on majority vote in the legislative body, Congress or Parliament, making it possible to have a change of administration at any time, or else give the current government a vote of confidence, the administration in the United States, in off election years, must depend on the outcome of the general election for an indication of its popularity.

Another thing, locally, that the election just held will long be remembered for was the fact that the Republican party organization saw fit to station election observers at all of the polling places. The conclusion drawn by many of the election judges was that the observers presence at the polls was to eliminate the possibility of suspected fraud. The primaries held earlier in the year were strictly party affairs and were conducted under party supervision. Unlike the primaries, the general election is strictly official and is held under the direction of elected county officials and it is their responsibility to staff the various polling places with competent election judges and clerks. That was done according to law in Castro county, and the people used are, in the main, the same personnel used in all other elections whether they are school board elections, city elections, bond elections, or what have you. These people are all honest well-known citizens and are appointed to hold elections because of their knowledge of election laws, gained through experience in past elections. So far as I know there has never been the slightest suspicion of election fraud in Castro county, or for that matter in this vast Panhandle area of Texas, and for neighbors to become suspicious of neighbors to the point that they deem it necessary that they be watched to keep them honest is almost unbelievable in this area with its enlightened citizenship. Let's all reaffirm our confidence in each other and support our elected officials with all the means at our command.

Democrats Make Clean Sweep

Castro County voters turned out in record numbers Tuesday to ballot in the general election. All Democratic candidates, on local, district and state levels were given overwhelming majorities by county voters and all Democratic candidates for state-wide offices won two or three district offices in the state were captured by Republican office-seekers.

The unusually long ballot, with the attendant constitutional amendments, accounted for the lateness of returns from the larger boxes in the county. Election officials in the voting place or precinct 2 worked until 12:00 p.m. Tuesday night and completed counting at 12:00 noon Wednesday.

For the first time in Castro county history a political party demoted it necessary to have supervisors, or observers, present at the various polling places in the county. The Republican county organization appointed a supervisor for each polling place.

Following is the way Castro county voters cast their 1730 ballots in the various races: "For governor of the state, the county vote went decidedly Democratic. John Conally received 1094 votes while Jack Seale, republican received 510. Lieutenant Governor voting gave

Preston Smith, 1266 and Bill Hayes 458. Waggoner Car running for attorney general received 1369 votes from the county while Everon Kennerly received 350. Democrat Herbert O. Willborn acquired 1336 votes while Mrs. E. D. McKay was given 390 for State Board of Education.

Andy Rogers took 1351 votes from the county against Republican opponent, John Zahn who received 375 in the senatorial race for 30th District. State representative of 91st District Bill Clayton carried Castro County 1298 while Republican Frank Ford took 434. Lamb County,

Clayton made 3152 against Ford's 1217. Bailey County gave Bill Clayton 1098 votes and Ford, 753. From Farmer County while Frank Ford achieved 921. Ford carried Deaf Smith County with 1313 votes while Clayton received 1169.

In office or Railroad Commissioner for unexpired term, Ben Ramsey acquired 1380 county votes while Arnold Hanson took 341. Robert S. Calvert took 1310 county votes for Comptroller of Public Accounts while opponent Mrs. Hargrove Smith received 295.

The county maintained its democratic tradition as Joe Pool, Congressman at large received 1229 votes against Republican Des Berry with 493 votes.

County voting gave Jerry Sadler 1385 for Commissioner of General Land Office while Alert B. Fay received 333 votes. All county officials were re-elected with a vote of confidence. Amendments number 2,3,4,5,7,8, 11, 13 passed in Castro County voting.



Popular Congressman Walter Rogers of Pampa, who has served 12 years in the U. S. Congress, received a vote of confidence from his constituents Tuesday, when he was returned to the legislative post by the voters of the district. Following a spirited campaign in the 28-county 18th Congressional district, Rogers amassed a 3 to 2 lead over his Republican opponent, Jack Seale, Mayor of Amarillo. Latest returns showed Rogers leading with 31,860 votes to Seale's 23,093.

Bobcats Howl For Indians' Blood

Dimmitt Bobcats meet the Morton Indians this Friday night, here, 7:30 p.m. This will be the third conference game of the season. Dimmitt has two wins and no losses in district play.

Muleshoe and Dimmitt are tied for first place in conference play. Neither team has lost a district game. Dimmitt has defeated Olton and Friona while Muleshoe has beaten Morton and Olton.

Morton Indians defeated the Friona Chiefs when they met for district play. Morton has good potential says Coach Covington. They have a tremendous amount of weight and power. "Morton has a real fine team with good materials, comments Covington. The Indians have five starting linemen who weigh 200 lbs or more. They have one 193 starter and one 190 lb. lineman starter. Their line outweighs the Bobcats approximately 27 lbs per man. In the backfield, both teams are fairly even, Indians have one quarterback weighing 202 lbs.

Coach Covington says they move slow; however, once started they are hard to stop.

Wildlife Refuge is Boy's 4-H Project

There is a haven for wildlife about 1 mile east of Nazareth. This is due to the efforts of Tommy Conrad, 12, son of Mr. and Mrs. L. L. Conrad who was interested in protecting wildlife.

Tommy started this refuge for fowls and animals, five years ago as a 4-H project. His father donated 14 acres containing two ponds for the area.

With advice and help from SCD Bruster, agriculture teacher at Nazareth two years ago; and his parents, Tommy succeeded in establishing the refuge. It is built on a zig-zag pattern (contour) so irrigation water starting at the top will run down through trenches by the force of gravity.

The boy planted from seeds and grew successfully tame and wild plum trees, apricot, and peach. These trees are to provide summer foliage for the wildlife. Winter cover is 176 red cedars and 64 Arizona cypress. These evergreens were seedlings when planted. While, the trees were small Tommy protected the quail and other fowl with piles of post.

Present inhabitants of the refuge are quail and rabbit. Tommy hopes to acquire some pheasants for the area.

Tommy's project involves a considerable amount of work. He spends free time after school and Saturdays working on the refuge. In the beginning, he had to hoe out the weeds, protect the young trees from harsh weather, and destroy harmful insects. It is a familiar sight to see the blond-headed boy astride his black and white horse, Chico, checking the trees for harmful cutworms.

Someday, Tommy hopes the wildlife refuge will contain many animals who feel safe in having their home, there.

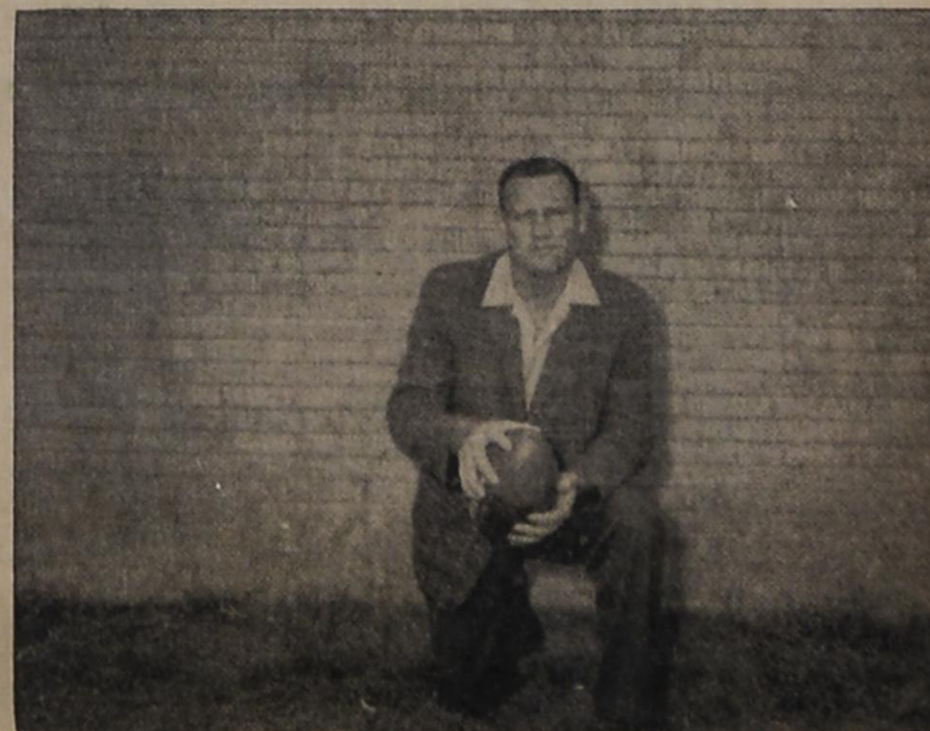

Nazareth School Conducts Short Dairy Course

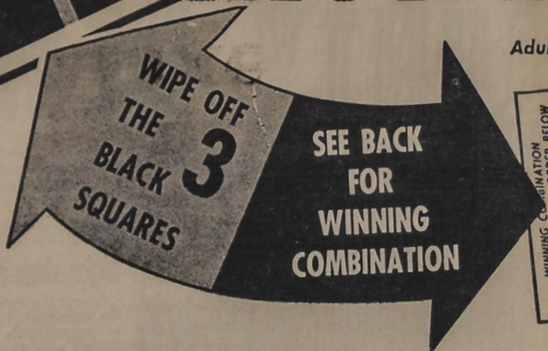

By the fall of 1961, he had established 35 acres of dead litter for seeding old cropland back to Native Grasses, had established 10 acres of Midland Bermuda grass, and had shaped a waterway that was to be seeded to Native Grass. Realizing that haste was of essence, he used cotton burrs to mulch the remainder of the land being retired to Native Grass. Using this mulch and the dead litter already established, he seeded 56 acres to Native Grasses in March of 1962. In June and July of 1962, continued his land use conversion plans by establishing 28 acres of additional irrigated Pastures. He finished his land use conversion in July of 1962 by drilling 20 acres to Switchgrass. Through sound planning and application, Bridges completed his land use conversions with astounding success. On the land converted to irrigated pastures, he has some of the best in the District. On the land seeded to Native Grasses, he has obtained an excellent stand of desirable species of grasses.

In summarizing his program, Bridges makes the following points: 1. That land seeded to Native Grasses will produce as much over the years as crops would have. In years when the dryland crops along the Draw received enough water to make a decent crop, there always seemed to be a chance of overflow to ruin it. 2. All Class III and IV land was becoming severely eroded but now is being held in place by grasses. 3. The irrigated pastures established in 1961 and early 1962 are already paying off in abundant grazing. 4. This type of approach to land treatment is paying off. He has accomplished the job in an orderly well planned manner. He feels that the Great Plains Conservation Program is only the finest cost sharing program to be handled by the department of Agriculture. 5. From the results to date, he feels that his net take home dollar per acre will be larger that prior to his land use conversion. He bases this on less equipment

costs, less labor costs, and less risks from crop loss due to hail and overflow from flooding. At present the livestock carrying capacity of the unit has been tripled and the management of existing grazing land has improved. Mr. Bridges in not only pleased with the change but has encouraged several neighbors to make similar changes. Through his efforts and oversight, there been approximately 1,000 acres of land use conversions in his community.

sponsibility in the Extension Service was with production testing and dairy herd management. "Many dairy short courses in various parts of the state have been taught by Mr. Hillin and all have met with outstanding success," according to Walter Labay, Area Supervisor of Vocational Agriculture, Plainview. Arrangements for the adult education short course in dairying and in other fields are made through Walter Labay's office.

The short course at Nazareth is scheduled to begin Nov. 12 at 8 p.m. in the vocational agriculture building. Other meetings in series of 4 will be held Nov. 13, 14, and 15. During the dates the short course is in progress, Mr. Hillin will be available to assist dairymen with individual problems and to provide to Tom Heffernan.

Dairymen interested in attending the short course should write or call the Superintendent of Schools, Mr. J. M. Slavik, or the Teacher of Vocational Agriculture, Mr. Tom Heffernan. An entry fee of \$2 will be charged. Dairy Short Course Certificates are to be presented to each dairymen who attends all the training sessions.

Joe Hillin states that the short course will be adjusted to wishes and interests of dairymen enrolled but that he expects to cover such subjects as developing a good dairy herd, raising cows and heifers, feeding for milk production, making and feeding silage, methods of using milking machines, general management problems, and dairy equipment.

"Short course in dairying, as well as in other areas, are now available to farmers throughout the state under the new cooperative program between the Texas Education Agency and Texas A & M College," stated Bob Jaska, Associate Professor, Department of Agricultural Education at Texas A & M College, who coordinates the program for Texas A & M.

"This cooperative program," states Jaska, "is designed to make the services of specialists available to conduct short courses under the supervision of public schools. Such a program will enable teachers of vocational agriculture to provide improved educational services to farm people."

Specialists are now available in the fields of beef cattle, insect control, farm management, farm electrification, farm welding, swine production, tractor maintenance, dairy science, pasture and oxy-acetylene welding.



J. O. SEALE, AGRICULTURE TEACHER in Dimmitt school for 20 years has received a special award. He was given a 20-year service pin for having taught in Dimmitt Schools since December 28, 1942. Seale's first year of teaching was here. He had been living in Lubbock when he moved to this area to begin teaching Vocational Agriculture. 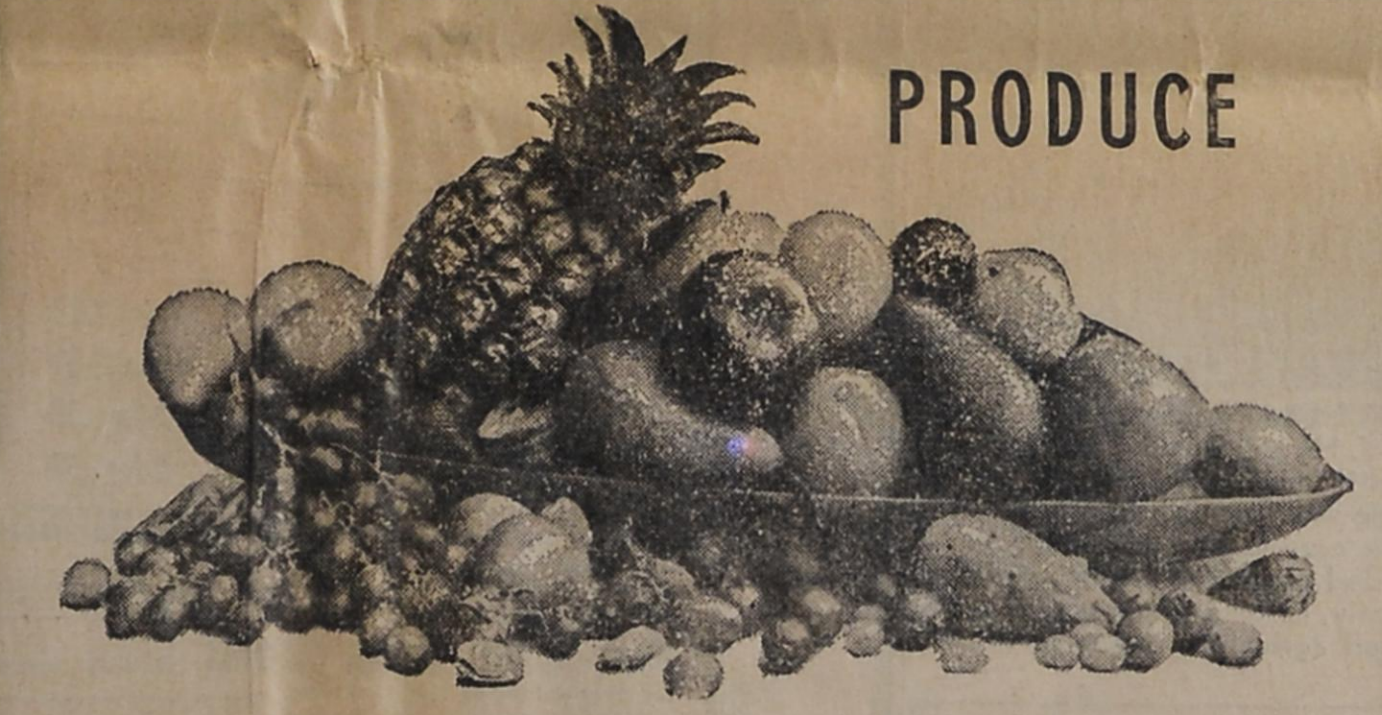

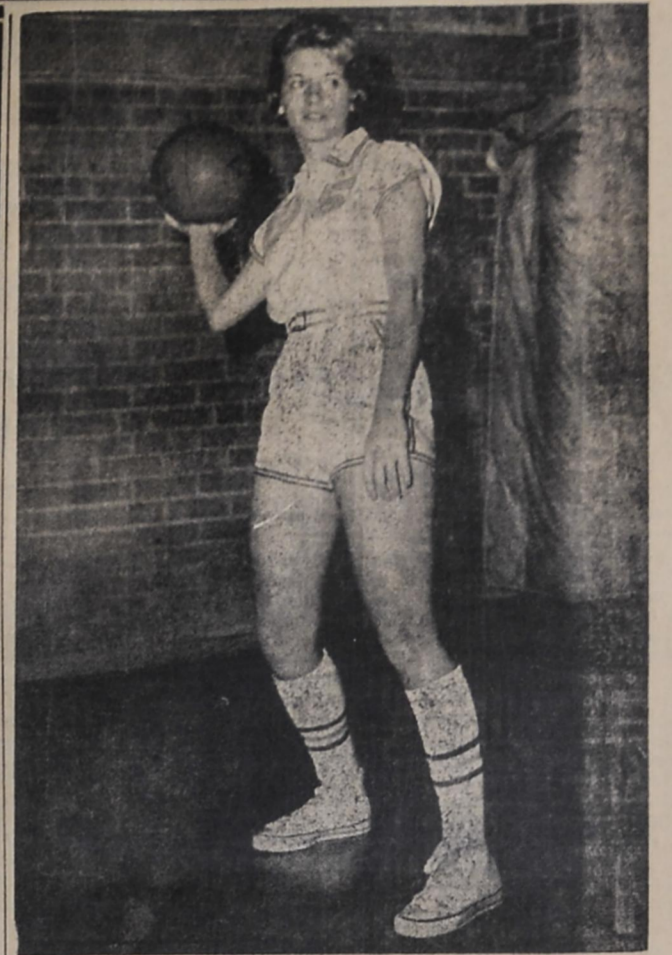

Mrs. Brockman took her nurses training in Dallas. The R. N. discussed the fact of maturity. She said, "One must be mature enough to establish a home."

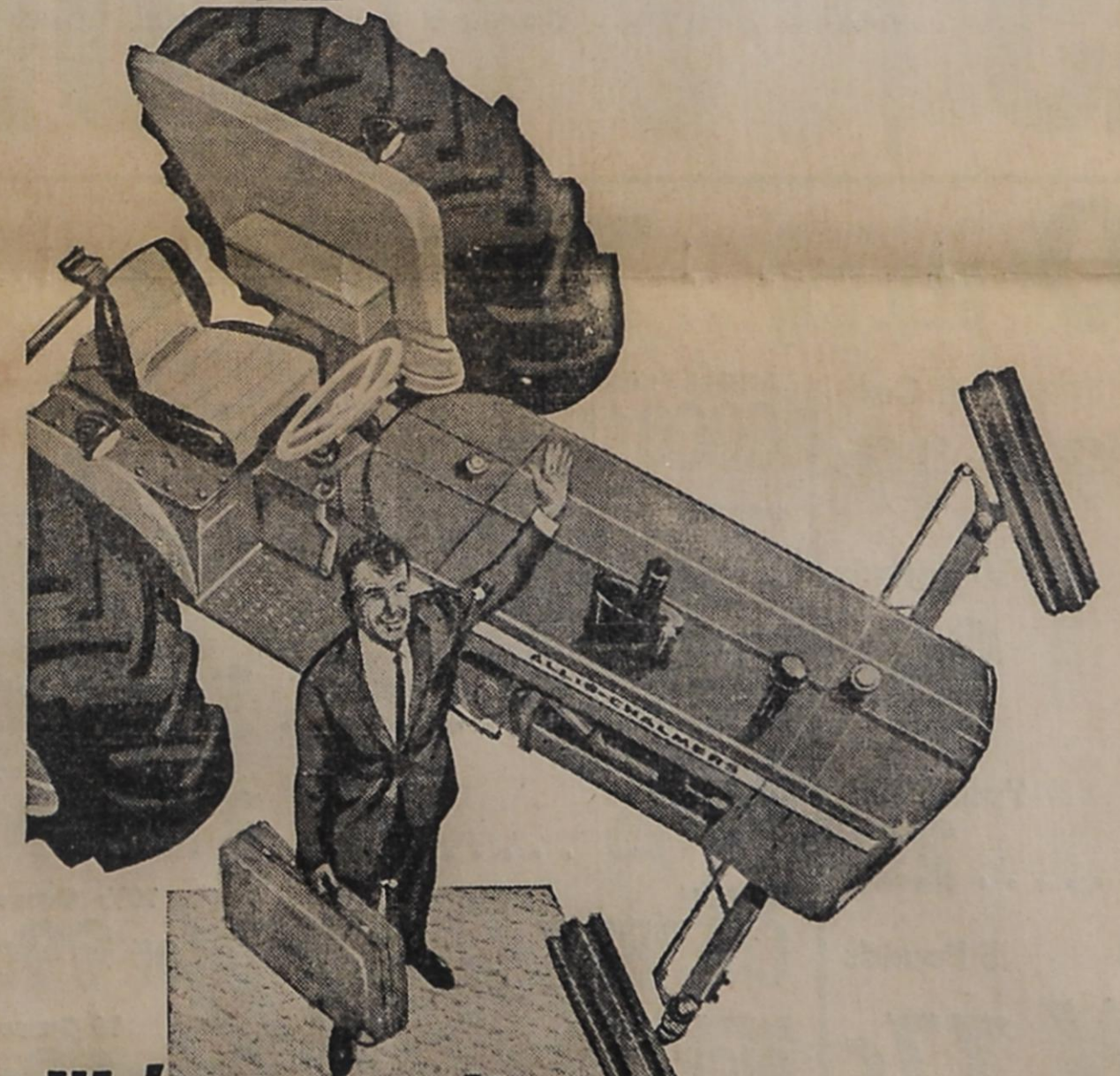

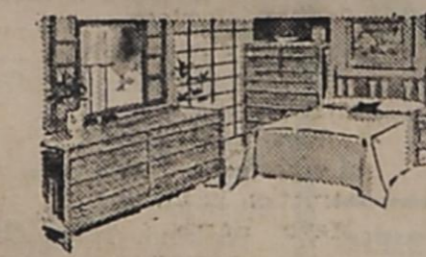

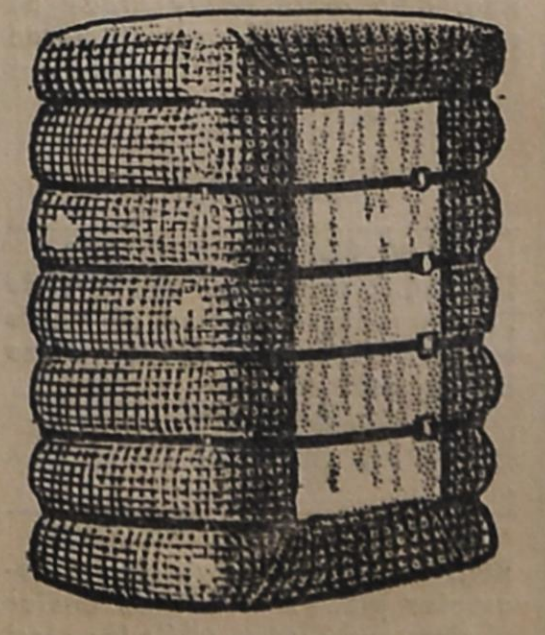

Highlights and Sidelights FROM Your State CAPITOL

A statewide drive is underway with Mrs. Mary Moody Northen to raise \$350,000 for a "Cerama Star" shrine at Washington-on-the-Brazos, where the Republic of Texas was born.

Campaign was announced by Gov. Price Daniel after meeting with Mrs. Mary Moody Northen of Galveston, Robert L. Thornton of Dallas and Gus S. Wortham of Houston, who co-chairman the project.

"Cerama Star," as visualized by designer Clyde E. Gray of Woodville, will be a star-shaped concrete building covering five acres of ground at the historical site near Brenham.

It will contain more than 6,000 square feet of ceramic, tracing Texas history.

Shrine is to perpetuate the memory of the 59 courageous early Texans who met at Old Washington on March 2, 1836 and declared their independence from a tyrannical Mexican government. They set in motion a course of events which saw, within 50 days, the fall of the Alamo, the massacre at Goliad, and the decisive victory at San Jacinto which secured the freedom of Texas.

Back in 1956 the Texas Press Association joined with the Texas Independence Day Organization to encourage construction of such a memorial.

Building to be shaped like the Lone Star, with a tower rising from the center, topped by a powerful searchlight known as the "Light of Texas Freedom."

An elevator will take passengers to the top.

Tours For The Taking—Scouts for the Texas Highway Department's Travel Division, always on the look-out for interesting things for tourists to see, have uncovered 324 tours that Texas industries offer in 70 cities.

Information came from queries as to what plants would spread the welcome mat for visitors.

Replies were compiled into an easy-to-read booklet entitled, "Visitor Tours of Texas Industry." Copies can be obtained through the Travel Division's Austin office, or at any of the eight State Tourist Bureaus.

Subterranean Center—Texas Department of Public Safety plans to go underground to handle disaster relief operations.

Col. Homer Garrison Jr. reports that ground has been broken for a \$630,000 underground state emergency operating center.

Garrison said the present disaster communications center, located in the basement of the department's headquarters, lacked facilities to handle major disasters such as Hurricane Carla — at peak efficiency. The new 12,000,000 center will facilitate uninterrupted operation for 30 days.

Designed to withstand the effects of air blast, thermal radiation, residual radiation (including fallout) and chemical and biological agents of warfare, the safety center will be manned around the clock from the time it's completed. It will accommodate about 120 persons, and be equipped with an independent water supply, fuel supply and auxiliary utility power.

Parks Plans Fall Through—Those water-color illustrations of a \$1,500,000 lodge on Lake Texoma in Eisenhower State Park now are more of a dream than a reality.

Plans for the project fell through when John Prather of Dallas, a member of the Eisenhower Development Corporation, financing the lodge, told State Parks Board executive director Bill Collins that the finance company, holding a \$350,000 note against the marina, had filed for reposition.

Lamplighters Inns, Inc. of St. Louis, Mo., which had agreed to operate the lodge, withdrew when it became apparent that the proposed \$500,000 marina won't be completed in time for the tourist season.

Prather said his group still is interested if it can find a backer, but the Parks Board figures it is under obligation to no one at this point.

A giant sigh of relief was expressed when board members were assured the state was not financially involved in the building plan.

Several attempts to finance a lodge on the Texas side of the 20-year-old lake have failed. Oklahoma's Lake Texoma Lodge across the lake was built about 1953.

In The Black—Land Commissioner Jerry Sadler reports that his department is in such good financial condition that it won't need to ask the Legislature for an appropriation for the Veterans' Land Program, out of General Revenue, for the next two bienniums.

While \$15,847,000 is due to be paid out during the next two years, for bonded indebtedness, the program has more than \$17,000,000 set aside to meet the obligations.

Sadler said that \$16,500,000 in installment payments from veteran purchasers, and \$3,000,000 in interest from federal securities, will be collected in the coming biennium.

Auto Tax Backed—Assessing automobiles for city and school taxes, without assessing "all other personal property on an equal and uniform basis," has been upheld by the Austin Court of Civil Appeals.

Court reversed a judgment of the Hays County District Court which had denied the City of San Marcos and San Marcos Independent School District Judgment against F. W. Zimmerman for delinquent taxes on three motor vehicles.

Suit was for back taxes for 1956 through 1959.

Security Bids—State Securities Commissioner William M. King reports five applications for permits to sell \$4,562,890 in securities in Texas.

Applicants include four Texas companies: FNIC Investors, Inc., Houston, \$618,840 Medallion Stores, Inc., Dallas, \$814,050 Texstar Securities, Inc., San Antonio, \$30,000 and Texas Fund, Inc., Houston, \$3,000,000.

System Challenged—The "place" system of electing two or more state representatives from Texas' larger counties has been challenged in Austin's 53rd District Court.

Houston attorney Robert W. Hainsworth seeks a declaratory judgment that the present method of apportionment of representatives in the larger counties is unconstitutional.

His petition attacks the 1961 reapportionment act of the 57th Legislature.

Act assigns representatives by the place system to 17 counties now allocated more than one representative: Jefferson, Galveston, Harris, Nueces, Hidalgo, Cameron, McLennan, Bell, Dallas, Travis, Tarrant, Bexar, El Paso, Wichita, Taylor, Lubbock and Potter.

Draft Status—In times of crisis, men worry about their draft status.

President Kennedy's arms quarantine on Cuba has brought a flood of calls to State Selective Service headquarters, in Austin, from men concerned about their "obligation."

If you were born before August 30, 1922, you don't have any, says SSS headquarters.

If you were born after August 30, 1922, you legally are required to be registered, unless you are not yet 18 years old.

Any man past 35 is no longer liable for military service. But he still is obligated to inform his local draft board of any change of address.

Basketball Probe Continues—House Speaker Jame, Turman and members of the House general intent-of-the Legislature charges issued subpoenas to appear in Austin before the Travis County grand jury.

Their appearance is desired in connection with a hearing on Contempt-of-the Legislature charges.

Three witnesses balked at answering the committee's questions during the probe of possible fixing in Southwest Conference basketball games.

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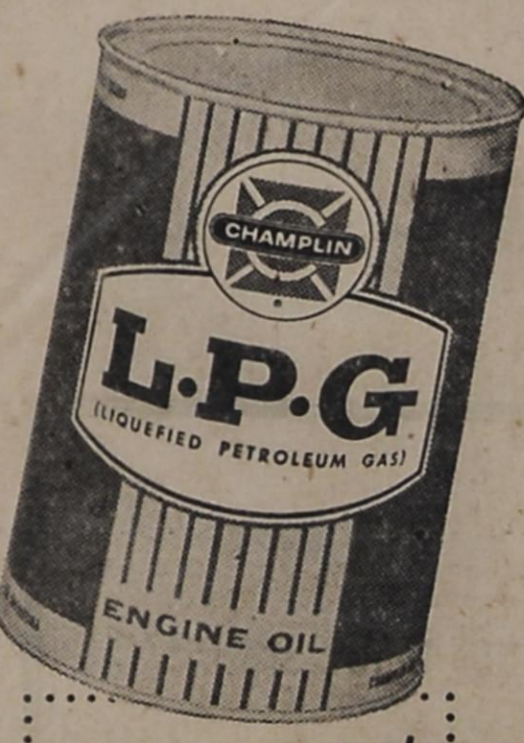

About Your Health

Texas has 90 "packaged" hospitals on hand, ready for almost instant use following enemy action or a major natural disaster. Most of them are located at least 15 miles from assumed strategic target areas.

The hospitals, costing \$21,000 a piece, were provided by the Federal Office of Civil and Defense Mobilization as part of a nationwide stockpile program. They are administered in Texas by the state Office of Defense and Disaster Relief, with technical cooperation from the Texas State Department of Health.

Outgrowths of the mobile army hospitals developed and tested during the Korean War, they can be completely installed by 40 or 50 people in four or five hours. In one test exercise an installation was made in 70 minutes by experienced personnel.

Local civil defense organizations in designated location store and other-wise manage the hospitals and equipment. Emergency conditions such as the Cuban crisis are occasions for making sure the hospitals are in a high state of readiness.

Each unit—already crated for instant shipment into stricken areas, is a complete 200-bed affair with facilities for three operating rooms, a pharmacy, x-ray service, clinical laboratory, sterilizing room, central supply room, and electrical power supply.

Each hospital weighs 24,000 lbs. and contains 8,000 individual pieces of equipment, including a 1500-gallon water tank and pump for emergency water supplies. There are also complete medical supplies, from surgical caps and gowns to ether and alcohol which are separately packaged and marked to avoid fire hazards.

Local civil defense authorities provide refrigeration for items such as insulin and blood derivatives. Antibiotics and other materials with expiration dates are labeled "deteriorative" to indicate they must be periodically inspected and rotated.

State civil defense and health authorities estimate that emergency hospitals will have to provide at least half the total hospital beds following a major emergency, since most conventional hospitals are located in metropolitan centers which may be targets of enemy action.

Doctors and nurses to staff emergency hospitals will be recruited from the community where the unit is installed for service, according to present planning.

Walter Rogers' WASHINGTON NEWSLETTER

From past experience, it is safe to assume that one of the first tests facing the new Congress will be the age-old battle to change the membership of the Rules Committee. Some of the veteran lawmakers who knew of my fight against the change were already enlisting my support before I came home. Nearly everyone will recall

the controversy in 1961 over the proposed increase in the membership of this important committee a battle that caused a delay of several weeks before the Congress could commence its business. When the smoke had cleared, there were three additional members on the Rules Committee. The Resolution which was adopted applied only to the 87th Congress, however, and unless the new 88th Congress takes action to continue the increased membership, the Rules Committee will revert to its original composition of 12 members. Although the additional membership did not accomplish all its advocates had counted on, it is expected that a determined effort will be made to convince the 88th

Congress that its Rules Committee should have 15 members, and the controversy could very well reach the same proportions as before. Hence, I thought it would be of interest to again discuss the subject in a newsletter. The House of Representatives operates through committees. The bills introduced in the Congress by the Members on different subject matters are assigned by the Speaker to the respective committee having jurisdiction of that subject matter. These bills are considered by that committee, and if approved, are referred to the House of Representatives with the recommendation that the bill become law. However, instead of going directly to the House of Repre-

sentatives, these bills must first pass through the Rules Committee and obtain approval by that Committee for hearing before the House of Representatives. In other words, most bills are not considered by the House unless they pass prior to the 87th Congress, the Rules Committee consisted of 12 members — 8 Democrats and 4 Republicans. If all Members were present and voting, a bill, in order to receive approval to be debated before the House, had to receive at least 7 votes. If a bill received only 6 votes for it and 6 against it, the motion to report the bill failed. During recent years on several highly controversial measures, the division in the Rules Committee had been a tie of 6 and 6. This meant that the highly controversial legislation could not receive a rule to be debated before the House. This is what caused the big hue and cry to change the Rules Committee or the Rules of the House. It was the cause of the caustic and bitter criticism that was directed against Congressman Howard Smith of Virginia and Congressman William Colmer of Mississippi — unfair and unjust criticism, in my opinion, but nevertheless, criticism that formed the basis of the battle against the Rules Committee.

In the opinion of the writer the Rules Committee, as previously constituted (12 members), is necessary for the proper dispatch of the business of the House of Representatives. It could not and did not thwart the majority rule of the House. There are 4 ways of bringing a bill before the House of Representatives. The first is through the Rules Committee the 2nd is by a suspension of the rules which requires a two-thirds majority the 3rd is by a discharge petition which, if signed by a majority of the House of Representatives, will discharge the Committee in which the bill is pending and make the bill a privileged matter before the House the 4th method would be by following the usual procedures under the rules of the House on Calendar Wednesday.

The United States is a great country with many varied and diversified interests. The National Congress is supposed to be representative of all of those several interests. It is supposed to pass laws that are fair and just to all of the people. Just as there must be laws for all of the people to live by, fairness and justice to each other, the lawmaking body itself must have rules and regulations in order to properly conduct its business. That is the primary reason for the Committee on Rules in the first place, its jurisdiction including (a) the rules, joint rules and order of business of the House. Good government requires a sharp division of opinion, sound presentation and expression of all factors of the problem or issue involved and a thorough sifting of the proposed final result. This is the process that has made this country great, that has made it strong and will keep it strong. Any policy or process of permitting a simple majority to shove through any and all kinds of laws on emotional dictates or other pressures would soon result in the destruction of any government. There is no doubt that the Rules Committee has on occasion created frustration in the minds of those who would like to see their pet bill or project sail through unopposed. But it must be remembered that the sharp division of the Rules Committee constitutes an excellent safeguard against impractical or inadvisable successes by advocates of any extreme philosophy. It assures consideration for the will of the minority, whichever party that might be. The secret of good government is the balance that is struck in the final product of law after full, complete and exhaustive consideration and debate of the issues and problems involved. Some call it compromise others call it the area of agreement between the many sides represented. But to me it is the balance that insures the justice guaranteed under our Constitution to all individuals. The Rules Committee in the House of Representatives as constituted prior to the 87th Congress is, in my opinion, the balance wheel that can preserve the good health of our government.
