## **MAJOR ISSUES FACE CONGRESS** AT OPENING

WASHINGTON, Jan 10 (UP) -The Seventy-Eighth Congress pened its second session Mon politically explosive issues whose outcome may have major repercussions in the coming presidental election.

In the Senate, the pending \$2,-275,600,000 tax bill tops the calendar. Weighted with a hotly disputed provision virtually emasculating the war contract renegotiatdebate, Chairman Walter F. George (Dem.) of Georgia, of the Senate finance committee, believes passage unlikely before Jan.

Both Speaker Sam Rayburn and House Republican Leader Joseph W. Martin Jr. are agreed that mustering-out pay-is the first order of business in the House, where Democratic and Republi can strength is closely matched The Senate has passed a bill calling for discharged payments of \$200 to \$500 but thus far the \$216,279 will be paid to 10,173 House military affairs committee
