

CENSORS PRAISE MORALE OF U. S. TROOPS IN ITALY

WASHINGTON, (UP)—The U. S. Army's morale in Italy is high. Nobody knows this better

than the censors. "Our boys write about the war as though it were a cream-guff duel," according to 1st Lt. Frank T. Mather of (1517 Hawkins St.) Nashville, Tenn.

Mather supervises the work of a number of regimental censors of a regiment of the 15th division composed of Colorado, New Mexico, Arizona and Oklahoma. Former National Guardsman. The chief letter writing characteristic of American soldiers is to understate, he declared in a report from 5th Army headquarters received here.

"They rarely dramatize or mention the horrors of total war," he said. "They're content to gripe about small things, such as not getting enough chocolate candy in their rations, and will gape about bombings and artillery attacks."

"To me the letters indicate that some hell or high water—and they have been through both—they're still able to laugh."

"One man recently spent three-quarters of a letter giving his opinion on the situation which he considered hopeless to the Germans. I deleted so much I thought it would be best to return the let-

ter to him for rewriting. His next letter got around the whole thing by advising his family to ignore the newspapers and start reading Gibbon's 'Decline and Fall of the Roman Empire.'"

One of the most trying problems according to 1st Lt. Charlie L. Bennett of (612 N. Broadway) Hugo, Okla., comes up when a man wants to write home about a friend who has become a criminal.

"From the standpoint of an injured man, there's good reason why this shouldn't be done. The mental condition is likely to be exaggerated, causing the family members any anxiety."

Army censors are so spontaneous and so subject to exaggeration that letters to him at all times are fully substantiated only after it is reasonably sure that an official notification has reached the nearest line.

The censors know they are running up and down with the first sergeants in the Army's traditional unpopularity sweepstakes.

"I know I've been called every name in the book, not to mention a few choice references ad-libbed" 1st Lt. John Ticks of (2065 Wacoma Ave.) Lakewood, O., said. "I can sympathize with the men. I'm sure this is one of the most thankless jobs in the Army."

Ticks cited the example of a soldier trying to tell his family why he was so happy, describing minutely a nice bovine area, a tree grove, lush countryside, and naming a town.

"He'll drag my name through the Italian mud when he gets the answer to this," Ticks said.

Soldiers are forbidden to identify places where they are or mention commanding officers of the rank of captain or above. These rules only make common sense, 1st Lt. William P. Galvin, of (110 W. 22nd St.) Cedar Falls, Ia., declared. "Any soldier has a pretty good conception of information that would be valuable to the enemy. If he would only develop writing from that standpoint, censorship would become practically an extinct art."

Because censorship is photographed in reduced size, considerable lines are obliterated with pencil. Censors make deletions from enclosed letters with scissors. For that reason soldier's correspondence must be on only one side of the page. Each company appoints one of its officers mail censor, and he in turn elicits whatever aid he can from his brother lieutenant. The job is strictly extra-curricular in addition to an officer's regular duties.

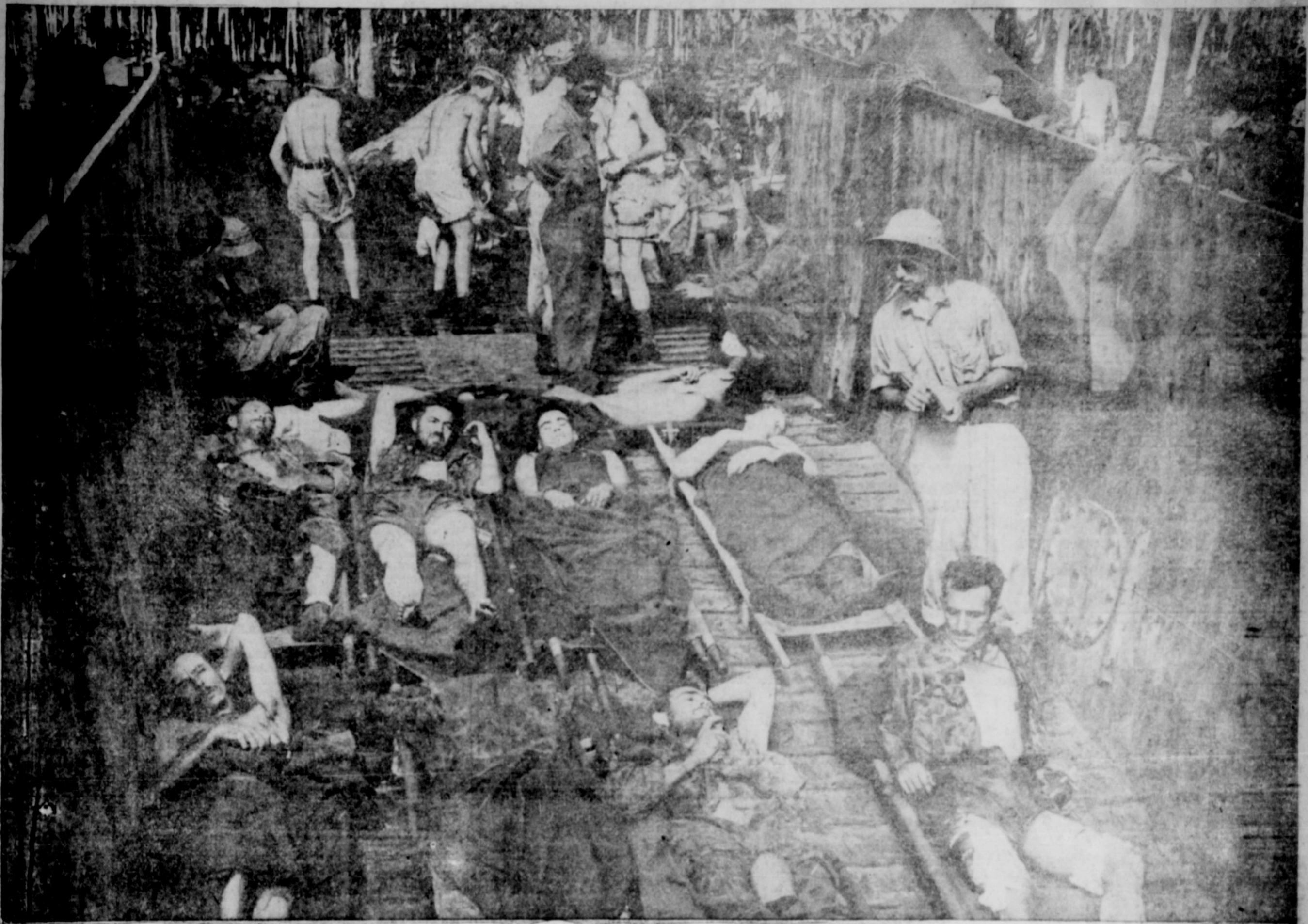

Gardening Hints Given By County H.D. Staff Member

Garden plants such as tomatoes, cabbage, pepper and eggplants can be started in a plant bed and then transplanted to the garden. This practice gives slow-growing plants a "head start" in the early spring so that they will be ready by garden planting time six to eight weeks later.

For starting such plants as lettuce, cabbage, tomatoes, pepper, and eggplants, a small bed will prove helpful. A wooden box 4 to 5 inches deep, 18 inches wide, and 24 to 30 inches long is a convenient size. The main consideration is a small container that can be picked up and brought into the kitchen on cold days and nights, and put outside on warm days.

One method of making a plant bed as suggested by Loma Faye Hearn, Assistant County Home Demonstration Agent is as follows—A mixture can be made of one-fourth rotted manure, one-fourth sand, and one-half top soil. Make a layer 2 to 3 inches thick of this mixture, and put a layer of coarse sand 1 inch thick over it. Mark off rows in the sand 2 inches apart, plant the seed, three to four to the inch, and cover half inch deep. Scatter a thin layer of pea-size gravel over the surface after planting, then sprinkle freely with water. The gravel is used to help prevent damping off of the small plants.
