W. F. CREAGER **HEADS FOURTH** WAR LOAN FOR RANGER AREA

W. F. Creager, chairman for the sale of war bonds and stamps in Ranger, will head the committee for the Fourth War Loan Drive in Ranger. Creager states Saturday that organization for the drive will be completed Monday and the committee will be ready for the opening of the drive on

county committee for War Finance since its organization shortly after the war broke out and is experienced in the work of War Loan Drives, having served as

chairman in the other three drives As chairman of the drive, Creager appealed to the individual cit izens of Ranger to dig deep into their pockets to meet the challenge of this new drive which is the largest of all War Loans in terms of individual participation.

The treasury is seeking to raise a national quota of \$14 billion dol lars and of that, Eastland county's quota is \$559,000 of which \$272,000 be bought by individuals. Rs. ger's quota in the drive is 136,000 and the same amount is assigned to Eastland and

Though the county quota is \$28,300 less than that of the Third War Loan, more bonds will have to be bought by individuals in the Fourth Loan because of the restrictions on banks and institu-

Creager stated that he nor any one else was expecting Ranger to below the quota, as Ranger has always met every war time quota, but he did say that the people of Ranger as individuals must realize their responsibility in this drive or the quota might come up

Agencies which will handle the sale of bends are the Commercial State Bank, The Arcadia and Columbia Theatres, C. E. May, Insurance, the Post Office, and the J. C. Penney Company. B. E. Garner, manager of the theatres stated Saturday that instructions to all Interstate Theatres were to sell a bond for every seat in the theatres and this will mean that the local theatres will be called upon to sell over a thousand bonds. Joe N. Graham stated that his store will work hard in this drive as in the past and that they expect to go over the tops as always.





Gardening Hints Given By County H. D. Staff Member

Garden plants such as tomatoes, cabbage, pepper and eggplants can be started in a plant bed and then husband who expects to report for transplanted to the garden. This practice gives slow-growing plants a "head start" in the early spring is serving the hospital in her ab- so that they will be ready by gar den planting time six to eight

For starting such plants as let a surgical patient in the West tuce, cabbage, tomatoes, pepper, and egyplants, a small bed will and eggplants, a small bed will prove helpful. A wooden box 4 to 5 inches deep, 18 inches wide, and 24 to 30 inches long is a convenient size. The main consideration is a small container that can be picked up and brought into the kitchen on cold days and nights, and put outside on warm days.

One method of making a plant bed as suggested by Loma Faye Hearn, Assistant County Home Demonstration Agent is as fol lows-A mixture can be made of one-fourth rotted manure, one fourth sand, and one-half top soil Make a layer 2 to 3 inches thick of this mixture, and put a layer of course sand 1 inches thick ov it. Mark off rows in the sand inches apart, plant the seed hree to four to the inch, and cover half inch deep. Scatter a thir layer of pea-size gravel over the surface after planting, then sprin kle freely with water. The grave s used to help prevent damping off of the small plants.
