Diminutive Tabs Prescribed For 1944 Car License

AUSTIN, Tex. Jan. 26. -The 48th regular session of the Texas Legislature, anticipating unusual conditions due to the scarcjty of materials used in the war effort, authorized the State High way Commission to prescribe what ever type of motor vehicle registration was available and best ments of the State and the traveling public for the 1944 registration year.

The Texas Highway Commission on January 18, 1944, passed an order prescribing for the 1944 two metal tabs 2' by 2' bearing the designation of the State. year and an identification serial number. The tabs must be used in connection with the 1942 plates which must be retained throughout the 1944 registration year. The same procedure applies to vehicles which are required to have but one license plate except that one tab is prescribed and the buy from farm slaughterers have one 1942 license plate must be re-

The Highway Commission has 96 from the remaining stamps in Book 3—which they may use. Un-The Highway Commission has tabs be securely fastened to the like the brown stamps, the red 1942 plates in such a manner as stamps of Book 4 are worth 10 to be clearly visible. On all motor vehicles for which two tabs are issued, one shall be attached to the front license plate and one to the rear license plate.

"The advance use of stamps, was explained, does not give the individual who buys from a farm slaughterer a larger meat ration than anyone else. It merely allows the individual buying from a farm er to follow the normal practice of buying fairly large amounts at one time.

"OPA pointed out that consum ers with lockers or other adequate storage space for meat can buy substantial amounts from farmers. Germans Use New Shell To Fight RAF Attackers

LONDON, Jan. 26 (UP)-RAL Beaufighters, roaring across the North Sea to blast four enemy ships off Norway, encountered a new German defense weapon- a parachute projectile - while other Allied warplanes were hammering the bomb-scarred coast of northern France for the thirty fifth

time in thirty-seven days. The Beaufighters, which scored hits on two merchant vessels and two escort ships, leaving a mediam-sized merchant ship and an esort ship ablaze and causing an ex losion in the other escort ship, ran into heavy fire from the ships and from shore.

The enemy ships used the new rojectiles, which the Air Minisry said were of a type not en-countered off Norway previously. A Beaufighters pilot, describ-






