

· WASHINGTON-In case you'd like to hear a little from me about that Hundred-Dollar-A-Plate Jackson Day dinner the Democrats dished up at the Mayflower the other night, well-

In words of one syllable-it did not quite make the grade. I hope my old friend, Charlie Michelson, Democratic publicity chief and one of the smartest men in anybody's country, won't be too cross with me for writing this. But Charlie himself knows I am speaking the truth when I say there was something missing in that costly celebration. There was not any seasoning. The old-time Jacksonian flavor was missing. The show just did not come off.

The whole thing was a sort of rehash-you understand what I mean. You know how tasteless food always is when it has been standing around too long. It is flat and you sort of choke it down. You say, "That was undoubtedly a






