Yanks Bomb Rail Center Near Paris

ALLIES SHOOT DOWN THIRTEEN JAP PLANES

New Guinea, Feb. 9 (Wednes-day) (UP)—Allied planes, again battering the Japanese base of Rabaul, New Britain, shot down thirteen more Japanese planes and probably destroyed ten others Sunday, a communique announced Wednesday.

The raiders, giving the Rabaul Japs no rest, dropped 124 tons of bombs on the much raised base, badly damaging an airplane run-

way and Japanese repair shops.

The drive is being sponsored by Emerson McCord of Houston who will attend to the re-conditioning and the shipment of the pens.


The public is urged to cooperate with the department in this drive and to search out pens that have become of no use to owners and contribute them to this worthwhile

How To Command MORNING LONG SORTIES FAIL TO STIR ANY **NAZI FIGHTERS**

LONDON (UP) -- American Marauder Medium Bombers strik-ing more than 100 miles into France blasted a rail junction northeast of Paris today in pacing an all-day assault by hundreds of Allied planes on the French invason coast and inland targets.

Allied planes swarming over France throughout the morning had failed up to noon to flush a single German fighter, a joint American-British communique re-

The Marauders, in their deep est penetration of Europe since they went into action last July, smashed effectively at the sprawling Tergnier rail yards between

St. Quentin and Soissons. Running their individual sories since dawn yesterday to more than 450 without loss, the Mara-uders caught the Germans flatfooted at Tergnier and strung their bombs across engine repair shops, sheds and freight trains in

the yards. Other waves of Marauders, flyng under an umbrella of Allied fighters, simultaneously attacked the battered but unidentified military targets in the Pas de Calais

Coastal strip of France. More than 200 RAF Medium bombers took part in the second straight day of intense assaults on France. The operations began before dawn, when ground crews at air fields in South England bomb-

Remain Vastly Different

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Proves Shrewd Diplomat

• WASHINGTON-Since those charges by Senator Hugh A. Butler (R.) of Nebraska of silly United States spending in South America first began to explode above and below the Rio Grande with the soothing qualities of giant firecrackers, even the most conservative New Dealers are beginning to wonder if we North Americans have even begun to understand the South Americans.

In our dimpled North American way we have assumed that because all of us assorted peoples happened to live in the same hemisphere we must naturally be blood brothers temperamentally and characteristically. I honestly don't believe it has occurred to us bighearted Yankees, who thought up that Good Neighbor policy and trimmed it with concessions and cash hand-outs, that Latin American the Latina would not automatically love us ever

A blase state department chief told me yesterday Mostly Spanish that we can never hope to understand the Latin American psychology until we realize that it is pre-

Spain settled South America. She implanted her character, her traditions, her religion and her code of ethics on the people there And there they have stayed regardless of Uncle Sam's birthday

This diplomat admitted that he sometimes believed we should substitute Little Boy Blue for Uncle Sam as a national figure head, (Say over your nursery rhymes, you will see what he meant.)
The Spaniard is first of all, a "Conquisator," my friend said. He ia

a conqueror. He takes what he wants by one system or another. If he can't get what he wants by pretty means, he tries other methods and never feels it necessary to apologize for the devious route. More, he does not even know the route is devious. To him, the result has always been more important than the method.

Maybe my state department informant is right. Certainly, something is wrong with our attitude toward South America. And you cannot blame all of it on the war.

An eminent South American, Gen. Isaih Medina Angarita (President Medina of the republic of Venezuela, to you and me) told how he and his countrymen love the United States at a press conference at Blair House, that new-old government guest house opposite the White House.

President Medina was nicely done in a blue-gray suit with a repeating color note in his blue-gray tie. He wore his Good Neighbor-liness on his sleeve, a bright smile on his broad face, and a smart known better you would have believed him when he raid he had not come to Washington to discuss any matters of business or international relations. His only reason for being here was that he thought it time to make a "spiritual tour." He said he also wanted to know President Roosevelt better.

President Medina sat before a microphone. Behind him in ambush were the dark-eyed members of his entourage. And over in the corner some of Nelson Rockefeller's young men were making disc recordings of the interview.

Of course, we talked about the "unity and solidarity of the Amerteas," President Medina was careful, however, to speak "only for Venezuela" when hard questions came his way. Several did come his way. That one about trading with the Soviet Union, for example, His excellency said Venezuela at least had no plans for establishing such trade.

ALLIES SHOOT DOWN THIRTEEN JAP PLANES

ALLIED HEADQUORTERS in New Guines, Feb. 9 (Wednesday) (UP)—Allied planes, again battering the Japanese base of Rabaul, New Britain, shot down thirteen more Japanese planes and probably destroyed ten others Sunday, a communique announced Wednesday.

The raiders, giving the Rabaul Japs no rest, dropped 124 tons of bombs on the much raised base, badly damaging an airplane runway and Japanese repair shops.

A communique said that Allied Solomons-based planes took advantage of better weather Tuesday to blast ten ack-ack guns at

more Jap planes during the operations, bringing to at least 195 the total of Jap aircraft definitely destroyed since Feb. 1-a daily average of nearly twenty-five



North, South Americans Remain Vastly Different **Proves Shrewd Diplomat**

• WASHINGTON-Since those charges by Senator Hugh A. Butler (R.) of Nebraska of silly United States spending in South America first began to explode above and below the Rio Grande with the soothing qualities of giant firecrackers, even the most conservative New Dealers are beginning to wonder if we North Americans have even begun to understand the South Americans.

In our dimpled North American way we have assumed that because all of us assorted peoples happened to live in the same hemi-sphere we must naturally be blood brothers temperamentally and characteristically. I honestly don't believe it has occurred to us bighearted Yankees, who thought up that Good Neighbor policy and trimmed it with concessions and cash hand-outs, that Lotin American the Latina would not automatically love us ever

Psychology is thereafter. A blase state department chief told me yesterday Mostly Spanish that we can never hope to understand the Latin American psychology until we realize that it is pre-

Spain settled South America. She implanted her character, her traditions, her religion and her code of ethics on the people there. And there they have stayed regardless of Uncle Sam's birthday party ways.

This diplomat admitted that he sometimes believed we should sub stitute Little Boy Elue for Uncle Sam as a national figure head.

(Say over your nursery rhymes, you will see what he meant.)
The Spaniard is first of all, a "Conquisator," my friend said. He is a conqueror. He takes what he wants by one system or another. If he can't get what he wants by pretty means, he tries other methods and never feels it necessary to apologize for the devious route. More, he does not even know the route is devious. To him, the result has always been more important than the method.

Maybe my state department informant is right. Certainly, something is wrong with our attitude toward South America. And you cannot blame all of it on the war.

Am eminent South American, Gen. Isaih Medina Angarita (President Medina of the republic of Venezuela, to you and me) told how he and his countrymen love the United States at a press conference at Blair House, that new-old government guest house opposite the

President Medina was nicely done in a blue-gray suit with a repeating color note in his blue-gray tie. He wore his Good Neighbor-liness on his sleeve, a bright smile on his broad face, and a smart interpreter at his elbow. His manner was guileless If you had not known better you would have believed him when he said he had not come to Washington to discuss any matters of business or international relations. His only reason for being here was that he thought it time to make a "spiritual tour." He said he also wanted to know President Roosevelt better.

President Medina sat before a microphone. Behind him in ambush were the dark-eyed members of his entourage. And over in the corner some of Nelson Rockefeller's young men were making disc recordings of the interview.

Of course, we talked about the "unity and solidarity of the Amerteas" President Medina was careful, however, to speak "only fo his way. That one about trading with the Soviet Union, for example, His excellency said Venezuela at least had no plans

for establishing such trade. President Medina explained, a little laboriously, that Venezuela wanted from the "powerful gesources of the United States" only that which would be halpful to Venezuela in developing her great agricultu
