U.S. DEAD IN TUNISIA HILLS

GAFSA, Tunisia (UP)-A grim little band of American troops has been prowling through the mined and booby-trapped Tunisian hills to locate isolated graves of dough boys who were buried hastily on the battlefield.

The bodies are being transferred to ever-growing American military cemeteries sprinkled across

Exploding mines have wounded several of the searchers, but they have brought in scores of bodies that otherwise might have never

"It's easy enough to locate the plainly-marked graves" said one of the Graves Registration Work- | tion on March 1. ers, Sgt. Donald McHenry, a stage actor from New York City "But a lot of Americans were buried by Arabs who stripped their bodies Arabs didn't mark the graves and don't like to tell where they placed the bodies."

McHenry, however, has won the Arab's confidence by giving them cigarettes and candy, and by do ing his best to carry on friendly chats in pidgin French.

"Finally an Arab will admit he knows where one American is buried," said McHenry, "but when we get to the burial place, there will be several bodies. And when an Arab is convinced that I'm not going to shoot him for stealing, he suddenly 'remembers' where there are other graves.

Although the Arabs steal a solier's clothes, they seldom take his 'dog tags," which carry his own same and that of his next of kin. But when a body is found without these identification discs, the searchers make tooth charts that are returned to Washington. There, the War Department freently is able to identify the vic tim through the tooth chart made when the soldier entered the ser-

McHenry works under a Graves Registration Service unit headed by Lt. Meyer Brown, a former ost office employee in Chicago. In this same unit is Staff Sgt. Eugene Farris, a former funeral director in Augusta, Kan.

"The soil around here is so dry that the bodies are almost mummified," said Farris. "We wrap them in a canvas shelter half, o sometimes place them in a woode box, before burying them in a miltary cemetery.

The Graves Registration Service seeps detailed records of the dead and sees that the cross or Star of David over each grave bears he name and unit of each victim. The information is stamped into lead colored metal plate which turn is nailed to the cross or star. If the doughboy's dog tags are recovered, one is nailed up be-side the metal plate.

G. R. S. SEEKS PLANT TO MAKE ALLIES TURN IRON POWDER FROM SHALE

MINNEAPOLIS (UP)- Re search metallurgists at the University of Minnesota have found a method of converting billions of tons of now worthless rock on the Mesabi range into the pure iron powder needed for a casting pro cess that may wolutionize the steel industry.

A laboratory plant to determine the best methods of producing the 99.5 per cent pure iron powder and to produce enough of it so that manufacturers can use it for experimental purposes will be put into operation at the university's school of mines experimental sta-

The laboratory will include a hydraulic press to demonstrate how the iron powder can be pressed into molds, then baked at 2,of their clothes before burial. "If the study of iron powder metallurgy had been going on for 50 years instead of merely 20 it would be of invaluable aid in the war production," said C. V. Firth, university metallurgist. "Any part that requires machining is expensive to make and those that require a great deal of machining can be made cheaper with iron

But the war cut the United States off from the supply of pure Swedish iron powder and manufac turers began searching for a substitute. About 16 tons of it are used daily in this country at the present time. Three processes were studied, but it was not until the method now employed at the university was made suitable to the "lower slaty" rock on the Mes abi range that a cheap and plenti- House Sustains

The "lower slaty", which m be removed before high grad ore can be mined, covers thous ands of acres on the Mesabi range and is from 10 to 40 feet thick Under the new process, this rock is ground into a bluck mud, treated with acid and oxidized, ther heated in blue water gas which are ground into powder.

Republican Groups Already Discussing Cabinet Makeup

New Battleships Make Our Navy Most Powerful of All

Special to Central Press

• WASHINGTON - Republican groups, voicing confidence in a sweeping GOP victory next November, carrying a Republican president into the White House, already are beginning speculation on the new cabinet. Of course, they are assuming that President Roosevelt will be a fourth term nominee on the Democratic ticket and assuming, too, that he will be defeated. Should Mr. Roosevelt add another scalp to his tracktion-busting

belt, it is expected there will be but little change in the makeup of the official family from 1945 to 1949. Included in the speculation of the GOPoliticians is the creation of a new cabinet post-secretary of the New Cabinet? bureau of aviation, or some similar name. Such a cabinet post would co-ordinate the Army and Navy Air Corps, and, in time of peace, would dominate the Civil Aeronau-

ties Board, which it would absorb. They are putting forth for the post-similar to the minister of alr in foreign cabinets-the name of Capt. Edward V. Rickenbacker, leading American ace in World War I, and a hero of the present war by virtue of his daring inspection flights.

Many Republicans feel the creation of an aviation portfolio will speed the war's conclusion and aid the progress of flying after the war. They feel Rickenbacker has the peculiar qualifications to set

These same observers say they would not be surprised to see a successful Republican candidate for president bring Gen. Douglas A. MacArthur to Washington to be secretary of war. There is great pressure in the west for this selection.

Another cabinet possibility they point out, is Herbert Hoover-the only living ex-president-to be secretary of state. The 1936 GOP persidential nominee, Alf Landon, is considered a "natural" for a cabinet post, either to be secretary of agriculture or of the interior.

Of course, it is considered a cinch that Harrison E. Spangler, GOP national chairman-or his successor if Spangler is unseated after the June convention-will be the next postmaster general-a traditional

fight off attacking planes. The United States lost the Arizona at Pearl Harbor, and the Oklahoma capsized but later was raised and may be salvaged. Others that were damaged badly have been modernized and now are more pos-

erful than they were before the war. With a couple dozen battleships plus aircraft carriers and other warships, Navy men say the United States fleet is ready to meet all comers on the high seas.



U.S. DEAD IN TUNISIA HILLS FROM SHALE

GAFSA, Tunisia (UP)-A grim little band of American troops has been prowling through the mined and booby-trapped Tunisian hills to locate isolated graves of dough boys who were buried hastily on

the battlefield. The bodies are being transferred to ever-growing American military cemeteries sprinkled across

Exploding mines have wounded several of the searchers, but they have brought in scores of bodies that otherwise might have never been recovered.

"It's easy enough to locate the plainly-marked graves" said one of the Graves Registration Workers, Sgt. Donald McHenry, a stage actor from New York City "But Arabs who stripped their bodies Arabs didn't mark the graves and don't like to tell where they placed the bodies.'

McHenry, however, has won the Arab's confidence by giving them cigarettes and candy, and by do ing his best to carry on friendly chats in pidgin French.

"Finally an Arab will admit he knows where one American is buried," said McHenry, "but when we get to the burial place, there will be several bodies. And when an Arab is convinced that I'm not going to shoot him for stealing, he suddenly 'remembers' where there are other graves.

Although the Arabs steal a soldier's clothes, they seldom take his 'dog tags," which carry his own name and that of his next of kin. But when a body is found without these identification discs, the searchers make tooth charts that are returned to Washington. G. R. S. SEEKS PLANT TO MAKE ALLIES TURN IRON POWDER BACK ASSAULT;

MINNEAPOLIS (UP)- Re search metallurgists at the University of Minnesota have found a method of converting billions of ions of now worthless rock on the Mesabi range into the pure iron powder needed for a casting process that may wolutionize the steel industry.

A laboratory plant to determine the best methods of producing the 99.5 per cent pure iron powder and to produce enough of it so that manufacturers can use it for experimental purposes will be put nto operation at the university's tion on March 1.

Included in the speculation of the GOPoliticians is the creation of a new cabinet post-secretary New Cabinet? bureau of aviation, or some similar name. Such a cabinet post would co-ordinate the Army and Navy Air Corps, and, in time of peace, would deminate the Civil Aeronau-

tics Board, which it would absorb.

They are putting forth for the post—similar to the minister of air in foreign cabinets—the name of Capt. Edward V. Rickenbacker, leading American ace in World War I, and a hero of the present war

by virtue of his daring inspection flights.

Many Republicans feel the creation of an aviation portfolio will speed the war's conclusion and aid the progress of flying after the war. They feel Rickenbacker has the peculiar qualifications to set up such a department.


