Dixle Demos Seek Barkley For Vice Presidential Post Congress Faces Legislahre Jam Before July Deadlines

Special to Central Press

▶ WASHINGTON-A definite movement now is in full swing behind the scenes by certain "deep south" Democrats to replace Henry Wal-lace with Senate Majority Leader Alben Barkley as President Roose-

There is little doubt that the Kentuckian, facing a stiff fight for re-election in his home state, would consent to be "drafted" as vice presidential candidate.

Wallace is extremely unpopular in the south. Nomination of a

southerner to run with the president would make the party leaders there happy.

Not that the solid south is in danger of going Republican—for all the traditionally Democratic Certain for

southern states seem certain to remain in the Roose

But the border states are in doubt-and among them is Kentucky. Best bet is that Wallace will be named to a diplomatic post in Latin America—likely Mexico or Brazil—to clear the path for a

southern nominee. And Barkley-grown in legislative stature since his temporary break with the New Deal over the tax veto message-appears a possibility to run with the president.

• CONGRESS IS IN A FAIR WAY to get into a legislative jain in the next two months. Numerous important bills must be passed before July 1, and thus far there is no evidence they will be disposed Aside from the bill extending expiring price and wage control laws,

nearly all the annual appropriation bills still have to be passed before July 1. Then there is the bill to extend the Lend-Lease act, which also expires at midnight, June 30. The score to date, in three months of the present session, so far

as deadline bills are concerned, is one regular annual appropriation measure passed—the one billion, 240 million-Jollar Treasury-Post Still to be passed are Navy and Army supply bills, the Independent Offices bill, war agencies appropriations, and the agriculture de-

partment measure. The first three months of the session were consumed for the greater part in a feud with the administration. The soldiers' vote bill was

the principal issue. But the explosion over the president's veto message on the tax bill joited the administration into an appearement policy toward Congress, so that one source of friction has been removed. The Senate probably will take up the Anti-Poll Tax bill sometime next week. Southern senators, in the minority, intend to fillbuster it

The Price and Wage Control Extension bill still is in the hearing stage. Republicans have said they would revive the consumer sus-sidy issue, so another fight is in prospect.

All this points to a legislative jam-with Republicans wanting to get out of Washington by June 15 for the Republican national convention in Chicago.

Livestock Care Is Discussed At County Meeting

Sixty-nine people attended most important livestock meeting held at the City Hall in Rising Star on April 19th, E. R. Eudaly, Dairy Specialist of A&M College and Q. W. Thompson, Ass't, Dairy Specialist, gave informatiive and inspirational talks on Livestock Care and Management, Pastures, Breeding, and, etc.

It is the small things in livestock program that means the difference between profit and loss says E. R. Eudaly.

Good fresh clean water of the right temperature should be available to all types of livestock a all times. Just cleaning out the trough daily and adding fresh wa-ter increased the gain of some steers on feed one-half pound per day. Milk is 87 percent water, and if you do not get the water down the cow, you need not expect the maximum amount of milk that the cow is capable of producing. Water should be warmed in the win-ter and cooled in the summer for livestock. It is simple to cool water in the summer by merely placing a shade over the drinking trough. The temperature can be lowered, 15 degrees when a concrete trough has a shade over it. This would be still more if it were a tin trough. This 15 degrees

change in temperature caused a 10 percent increase in milk production. The higher the shade the cooler the water will be, therefore, the shade should be at least 6 feet high. It should be larger than the trough, otherwise, the water will only be shaded about an hour in the middle of the day. It takes 5 gallons of water to produce 1 gallon of milk for cows on dry feed. whereas cows on green feed or silage puts one-third of the water contained from the
