A room in the House Office Building at Washington. D. C., is known as the folding room. Some 70 workers are constantly employed folding and putting into envelopes for dispatch to constituents printed copies of speeches made by Congressmen. During campaign time the force is increased to 150 workers. At such times as many as 450,000 pieces of mail are gotten out each day. Speeches to be mailed out are printed at cost by the Government Printing Office, and paid for by the members of Congress. Mailing is free. 
