### about dimmitt and castro county

Ordinarily it's not considered good manners to scratch in public... but these are not ordinary times. We're not sure how it is over the rest of the county, but in Dimmitt in the late afternoon there are seventeen trillion mosquitoes, and every last one of the little flying darts apparently has a vengeance against humanity.

During the daytime it's no particular problem... one just slaps and scratches as much as he can and that's all there is to it. But comes bedtime with one or two of them buzzing around in the room awhile and sleep becomes virtually impossible. We doubt if there's anyone who hasn't undergone the nerve-wrecking sensation of laying in bed with the hum getting quieter, then louder, then quieter again, then louder, then it stops. When it stops is generally considered the time to start slapping, twisting and turning.

About the first of the year the Texas State Department of Health released some statistics on the current and past birth rates. While it was primarily intended to show how modern medicine had decreased the death rate for infants, it also brought out some other figures that are worth thinking about.

It pointed out that there were three births for every death during 1956. This rate has climbed from two to one during the past fifteen years.

This means that our population can reasonably be expected to double within the next fifty years, something many of our younger people will live to see.

With this increase in population will come some difficulty in food supply, although during this period it can also be expected that improved techniques will keep production well ahead of the actual need.

But if we step even further ahead to the next 75 to 100 years with our present farmland losing much of its natural fertility we could have a problem similar to India, China and other overpopulated areas of the world. It is not likely that such a thing will ever happen to us, but it is still a good argument for soil and water conservation.

We have been reading with some interest about the impending Japanese trial of American soldier William S. Girard for killing a Japanese woman. Girard himself is not so important as the fact that an American is being turned over for trial to another country.

This is setting a dangerous precedent. Any American soldier either on or off duty has specific or implied orders to protect Army property by any means at his disposal should the occasion arise—not to do so would subject him to court martial for noncompliance with duty.

for construction if county taxpayers approve the measure. One change would be to make the building 120 feet wide instead of 100 as shown on the plans, with the ceiling 80 feet wide and 20 feet high in the center and with a lower ceiling on each side 20 feet in width and 14 feet high.

Bleachers to accommodate 600 people are proposed to be installed in one end and possibly two meeting rooms would be omitted from the drawings.

Tentative plans call for temporary livestock stalls to be installed during fair time just below the lower ceilings on both sides with a judging ring in front of the permanent bleachers in the center of the building. The kitchen would be moved to one of the dressing room locations on the plans.



plans. The maximum figure arrived at for cost of the project is \$115,000 which would include cost of the building and property. No definite location has been arranged for.

## MOSQUITO CONTROL ON THE FARM

Most mosquito sources in agricultural districts are man-made and can be reduced or eliminated by man. A farmer or rural resident can do much to help protect his family and livestock from mosquito-borne disease and mosquito annoyance by:

1. Properly preparing fields and pastures so water is not ponded or pooled.
2. Properly constructing and maintaining ditches so they do not become overgrown with vegetation or hold water for several days.
3. Reducing waste irrigation waters to the lowest practicable amount.
4. Eliminating of standing water in well pump sumps.
5. Keeping house screens in good repair.
6. Destroying all mosquitoes that enter the home. Any commercial household spray is satisfactory.
7. Removing all artificial water containers on the premises as tubs, barrels, cans, old tires, etc.
8. Screening or closing cisterns so mosquitoes can neither enter or leave.
9. Eliminating any openings to septic tanks or cesspools by which mosquitoes might enter or leave.
10. Connecting all sink drains, etc. to home sewage disposal system so water is discharged above ground.
11. Stocking large stock watering troughs with fish and preventing overflow and pooling of water.
12. Consideration of some form of modification of any "playa" lakes or ponds that exist upon the premises.
13. Larviciding of mosquito sources until they can be eliminated or modified. Equipment and chemicals already present on the farm may be satisfactory.
14. Residual spraying of sheds, garages, storm cellars, shrubbery and other daytime places of adult mosquitoes, particular attention should be given to livestock sheds and chicken houses.
15. Prevention of pooling of water from evaporative type air conditioners. Where recirculating pumps are used a teaspoon full of household spray placed in the water pan weekly will control this possible source.

## Citizens Hear Power Discuss Mosquito Control Measures

"Mosquitoes are a menace to health and a nuisance," said Mr. Bill Power, Lubbock City-County Health Engineer at a meeting in the courthouse Friday night, "but they can be controlled and it must be done on the farm as an individual undertaking."

Mr. Power went on to explain how elimination of breeding places would cut down on mosquito populations. "About 80 percent of the mosquito production on farms in this area is directly attributable to irrigation water," he said, "whether the breeding places are found in lakes filled with irrigation water, undrained ditches, or other places where water can collect for as much as ten days."

The merchants of Dimmitt and the farmers of the Bethel community enjoyed a barbecue supper prepared by the Bethel H. D. Club. About 90 farmers and merchants turned out for the occasion.

At Dimmitt by County Health Officer Dr. J. W. Spetee and Mayor Joe Cowen as one of the measures on a local level to help cut down the incidence of encephalitis in the county.

Among other things discussed about mosquito control it was brought out that man or animal cannot transmit encephalitis—it must be carried from one to the other by a mosquito. The mosquito eggs can lay dormant in dry lake beds for years before hatching out in wet weather, and they live on an average of two weeks after they pass the pupa stage and begin flying. It takes from four to seven days for an egg to hatch to form larvae, which in turn forms the pupa and to the adult stage.

Lake edges should be clean so the wave action can break up larvae. Other common breeding places are air conditioners (a teaspoon full of household spray once a week will take care of this), old tires that may collect water, tin cans, cesspools, or undrained ditches.

He went on to explain that mosquito traps can show where mosquitoes breed to an extent. The tarsalis mosquito has a range of about two miles while the remaining minority can range as much as fifteen. If the mosquitoes trapped are all identified as the tarsalis, for instance, they are from a two-mile radius of the trap.

# Floyd County Water Recharge Well Indicates Future Practibility

## High Plains Underground Water Conservation Dist. No. 1

At last the rains came—as we believed they would for eight long years.

Many people in the High Plains, who are now aware of the diminishing supply of underground water, are concerned with the problem of saving the large quantity of water that has recently collected in the thousands of wet-weather lakes by draining the water into the underground reservoir for storage and future use.

Numerous farmers throughout the High Plains have installed dual-purpose wells near the lakes for the purpose of draining the lakes and producing irrigation water. Such practice has been described by them as highly successful.

Although the practice is not yet fully acceptable to economists and engineers, many of whom are naturally skeptical until shown, the High Plains Water District has developed some important information from the recharge experiment that is being carried out at the Allmon Gin in southwestern

Floyd County. In the fall of 1953 a well was drilled near the edge of the lake. Total depth was about 380 feet. It was cased with 12-inch steel casing, the bottom 150 feet being slotted. It was developed by pumping with a test pump and producing about 1,100 gallons a minute.

A pit was dug around the well and filled with cotton burs. An 18-inch concrete pipe was laid from the bottom of the lake to the pit, the lake end being equipped with a valve and the pit end had a meter for measuring the flow of water from the lake to the well.

Assistance to the project was given freely by numerous local interests recorded on a sign at the recharge site, including: Southwestern Public Service Company; Fox & Higgins Drilling Co., Petersburg; Bill Wolf Irrigation Service Co., Abilene; Peerless Pump Division; W. C. Allmon, Route 1, Petersburg; Gifford-Hill Western, Inc.; Commissioners Precinct No. 1, Floyd County; Commissioners Precinct No. 2, Hale County; West Texas Gas Company.

In June 1954 the area received

a heavy rain and the lake caught 32 acre-feet of water. After a few hours wait, in order to let the coarse silt settle to the lake bottom, the valve was opened and the water flowed by gravity into the pit. However, it was soon discovered that the cotton burs, although fully composted, did not prove satisfactory as a filter. Nevertheless muddy water entered the well at the rate of 1,050 gallons a minute.

The well was not equipped with a pump and as a result, after eight days of recharging, the formation became clogged with silt. A test pump was again installed and after a few hours of pumping several yards of sand and silt were removed from the well and it produced equally as good as after the first development.

This original test proved that the lake water could be drained by gravity into the water bearing formation; but it also proved that unless the mud and silt were removed during the recharging period the formation would become clogged and would no longer take water.

During the last week in April 1957, the area again had about 5

inches of rain and again the lake became filled with water. In the meantime a concrete meter box was built in the pit-end of the

18-inch concrete pipe, and an 8-inch steel line, equipped with a flap valve, was laid from the meter box to the well. The pit was

filled and a pump base was built around the well. The land owner, Mr. Bill Allmon, had agreed to install a permanent pump, but the day he intended to set his pump the rains came.

On April 30, 1957, at 10:35 a.m. the valves were opened and the water entered the well at the rate of 1,700 gallons a minute, going into the formation and filling the well casing. The rate at which the formation took water is indicated on the accompanying chart.

It is significant to note that during the first 24 hours the well took water at the average rate of 920 gallons a minute, that during the second and third days the rate was about 770 gallons a minute, and that during the fourth day the rate was 620 gallons a minute, showing that the silt was gradually clogging the sand.

On Saturday, May 4, 1957, a 7-stage number 10 pump bowie and 180 feet of 8-inch pump column pipe and 10 feet of suction pipe were set in the well. The pump was operated for 4 hours and produced a large quantity of silt, sand and water at the rate of about 1,000 gallons a minute.

The pump was stopped, the valve was opened, and again water started pouring into the well. During the next 20 days the recharge is shown graphically in the illustration.

Again it is significant to note that whereas the rate of recharge during the first four days of the experiment decreased from 920 gallons a minute to 620 gallons a minute, with pumping only once a day to remove silt, the rate of recharge was maintained at a rate of about 920 gallons a minute until the lake was drained.

Just as the lake was drained the rains came again and the lake refilled to the previous level and the operation of recharging continued.

Although the problems of artificial recharge are not fully solved by any means, the work that has been done by numerous individuals, by the cooperative work of the Board of Water Engineers, U. S. Geological Survey, City of Field in Randall County, and the Amarillo at the McDonald Well of the Water District show that the problems can be solved and in the future millions of acre-feet of surface water can be salvaged that otherwise would be wasted.


