HERO'S GIRL TELLS HOW HE **ROUTED NAZIS**

JACKSONVILLE, FLA. (UP) Typical of thousands of engaged and married young couples all over America who though separated by hundreds of miles, are still working "together" for thembelves and victory - are Ruth Gentry and her fiance, Staff Sgt. Paul B. Huff, both natives o Cleveland, Tenn.

Miss Gentry is a metalsmith's helper in the huge assembly and repair shops of the Jacksonville naval air station. Huff is "Somewhere in Italy" where according to Ruth, he has been awarded the Congressional Medal of Henor for his work on the Anzio beachhead. Ruth said she came to the naval

Cleveland in order to play a part in the war effort while waiting for Faul to come home. An attractive brunette, she wields a riveting gun with finesse, getting navy planes back into condition. "You shouldn't say much about

she smilingly declared Paul's the hero-not me. That's the way I want it-and that's the way it should be. We just want to get this thing over with as zoon as possible, so we can be together again.

The story of how Sergeant Huff who comes from the same hil country that gave America Sgt. Alvin York in World War I-wor his congressional Medal, is classic of this war,

Huff, a corporal at this time led his six-man patrol into action near Carana, Italy, on Feb. 8 1944 Weather conditions were ideal for the Germans! The sky was clear, there was almost no cover and the Nazis had good observation posts covering almost every route to their positions.

A shallow draw was selected by Huff and his patrol of parachuteinfantrymen as their best approach -but the draw was mined and covered with fire from three machineguns and a 20-millimeter cannon. As they found out later.



Public Interest Zooms In Post-War Planning

Truman May Continue as Head of Probe Committee

Special to Central Press • WASHINGTON-Reconversion from war to peace, in all its phases, is viewed in Washington as being the big domestic news story in the coming months, with the single exception of the presi-

To observers of the national scene, the attempted assassination of Adolph Hitler, and the internal unrest it connotes in Germany, has brought home to the American people the fact that the war in Europe can end at any moment.

For this reason public interest in government post-war plans is expected to increase greatly from now until the war

Industrial actually ends. Congress, when it returns from its summer recess, will be faced with industrial reconversion legislation Legislation as one of the main pieces of business before it, but a recess until after Labor Day is expected to be taken by the legislators reconvening August 1 unless Germany collapses.

Postwar tax plans, too, are slated for congressional and executive consideration with private groups already submitting suggested programs to encourage industrial reconversions and lay the groundwork for a sound peace-time economy.

The recently completed international monetary conference at Bretton Woods will be followed by other meetings of the United and Associated Nations in an effort to work out equitable post-war ma-chinery for handling international trade and commerce. And, finally, the "Big Four" nations' diplomatic representatives are

cheduled to hold meetings in Washington to work out the basis for an international order to preserve peace after the war.

• THE FINAL DECISION as to whether he will carry out his original decision to resign as chairman of the War Investigating commit-tee rests squarely in the hands of Senator Harry S. Truman of Missouri, the Democratic vice presidential nominee.

In Chicago the night he was nominated as President Roosevelt's fourth term running mate. Truman told reporters he was giving up the chairmanship but remaining in the Senate until after the elec-

However, authoritative sources now report that he has changed his mind, and will confer with the committee early in August, after returning to Washington from the Missouri primaries.

Truman wants to feel satisfied that the committee will carry on its work—concentrating on war to peace conversion in industry. He sees the collapse of Germany as inevitable and believes it may come soon. If he is elected as vice president under Roosevelt, Truman wants to feel also that every step has been taken to avoid economic chaos when the Reich goes under and the war in Europe ends.

The final decision on the committee chairmanship rests with him unless unexpected opposition from Republican committee members headed by Senator Homer Ferguson of Michigan should develop.*

Normally, Senator Tom Conally of Texas, foreign relations committee chairman, would succeed Truman—but Connally is too busy

to take over the job. Other possible successors, Senator James Mead (D.) of New York, and Senator Carl Hatch (D.) of New Mexico,

American farmer's worst pests, It was in November, 1942 that a small amount of DDT, a white powder, was received at the Euroand tested by G. T. Bottger, ento-

Scientists at the laboratory were not excited particularly at first; it was just another routine test for them. But it was not long before the laboratory sent an enthusiastic report back to Washington.

Soon after, the War Production Board clamped down a tight cenorship on news of DDT at the reuest of Army authorities.

Now that the secrecy of the in ecticide is no longer in effect, can be revealed that DDT can keep flies away from a cow barr for at least three months after ne spraying.

The powder is sudden death to flies, chiggers, ticks bedbugs. roaches, mosquitoes, Japanese be les and ants. A tiny bit of DDT n a room would be a death trap for flies for almost a year, tests





EXCESSIVE FROST on the freezing unit of your refrigerator acts as an insulator and retards refrigeration by reducing the absorption of heat from foods.

Frost should be removed whenever it reaches a thickness of onequarter inch to keep your refrigerator operating at peak efficiency. Frequent detrosting also makes it easier to remove ice trays, thus forestalling the damage that often results when trays are forcibly dislodged with tools. [Don't fill trays too full, as water expands when it freezes and may cause trays to stick).

Since frost forms faster in summer than in winter, it is necessary to defrost oftener during the hot months. Always empty drip tray immediately after defrosting: otherwise moisture will be drawn to freezer and speed formation of frost when refrigeration is started
