



NOWHERE IN THE AD IS THERE THE SLIGHTEST PROOF THAT THE CIO POLITICAL ACTION COM-MITTEE HAS ENDORSED ME!

None of the organizations mentioned as endorsing m are members of the CIO or in any way affiliated with it. The CIO has no control over them. Moreover NOT A SINGLE ONE of these unions ever approached me with an offer or was solicited for money, support or endorsement. Whatever endorsement was given me with without my prior knowledge.

I HAVE NEVER ASKED, OR CAUSED TO BE ASKED, THE CIO POLITICAL ACTION COMMITTEE FOR EN-DORSEMENT, SUPPORT OF MONEY, I HAVE NEVER BEEN OFFERED SUPPORT, ENDORSEMENT OF MONEY BY IT OR ANY OTHER UNION ORGANIZA-TION. I WOULD NOT ACEPT IT, IF IT WERE OFFER-

The advertisement complains that I did not make any statement in the ad by which my friends, incensed at the false charges against me because of their activities in my behalf, exploded and exposed the tactics of the opposition The ad was written and prepared by them and inserted in the newspapers by them and I was not asked to contribute any statement to it. They felt that if the people of the district knew the facts they would condemn a type of campaigning inconsistent with the high office of Congress.

MY OPPONENT KNOWS PERSONALLY THE MEN WHO SPONSORED. THE BILLBOARDS, 'HE KNOWS THAT THEY ARE UPRIGHT, PATRIOTIC BUSINESS MEN WHO, IF THEY THOUGHT FOR A MOMENT THAT I WAS A CANDIDATE FOR THE CIO POLITICAL ACTION COMMITTEE, WOULD SPEW ME OUT OF THEIR MOUTHS! HE KONWS THEY WOULD NEVER ALLOW THEIR NAMES TO BE USED TO "COVER UP" FOR THAT COMMITTEE OR SUPPORT AN UNTRUTH! I CHALLENGE HIM TO DENY THIS

My opponent was district judge for twelve years. He should know the law which clearly says that every candidate or his registered campaign manager is required to file a sworn statement of "all money previously received by or disbursed by him" at stated times and that it "shall include the names of all contributors to any campaign fund handled by the party making the same." 
I want my opporent to note carefully what the report said. I quote only what he was willing to use in his own
