#### WAR FORCES **DRUG ADDICTS** TO TAKE CURE

ST. LOUIS, Mo. (UP)- The war with Japan has virtually halted the smuggling of opium intol, the United States and forced thous tion to "git." ands of narcotic addicts to take the cure --- whether they want to

John M. Tully, head of the St. Louis bureau of the Treasury Department's narcotic division, revealed today that war time conditions have greatly reduced the number of drug addicts because brand drugs. He predicted that i the war with Japan continues an other year, drug addiction in the United States may be completely

Tully reported that there are less than 50 of what he called "non-medical users of narcotic drugg" in the eastern federal district of Missouri as compared to more than 500 in 1941 before the Pearl Harbor attack.

Importation of opium, the basic property of practically all habitforming drugs," Tulley explained, "is so restricted today that the suply is barely adequate to meet the demand for legitimate users of drugs.

"There are only three firms in the United States that process opium and the Treasury Depart ment is able to keep the strictest supervision over the distribution of opium drugs from these manufacturers through retail sources to the ultimate consumer.

"The great amount of narcotics used by the addict was smuggled into the country and was not processed by these three firms, It was this contrabrand supply that kept the government busy in pre-

Tulley aded that the few addiets who have not taken involuntary cures are being driven to extremes to get habit-forming dry and "our department is closing in on their source


