If, however, you were up against it and wanted to borrow a little money, the first place you would go would be to kind-hearted banker Henry rather than to hard-hearted banker Jesse.

Its appropriations and transfers from other government agencies for the current fiscal year approximate four and a half million dollars. This should give some idea of the scope of BAE operations, although it does not compare with the six million dollars spent on Bureau of Labor Statistics or the nearly 20 million that goes to Bureau of the Census and Boreau of Foreign and Domestic Commerce in Department of Commerce. It is over these last two business analysis agencies that Wallace would preside if ratified for appointment as Secretary of Commerce. Department of Commerce this year is a 101 million dollar business with 44,000 employees. Department of Agriculture is a billion dollar business with 80,000 employees. Which is therefore the bigger business man—Wallace or Jones?




