#### Lakes Season Is Extended By Ice Breaker

CHICAGO (UP)-With the re cent introduction of the U. S. Coast Guard's Makinaw, a \$10,-000,000, 5,000-ton ice-breaker, a pected along the Great Lakes

waterway. This powerful new ice-breaker recently proved its possibilities when it cut a path in the frozen Soo river for four newly construct ed ocean-bound cargo ships. The ship slid Mrough as much as 20 inches of clear ice without drawing upon its special ice-crushing equipment, which includes a bow propeller and special ballast tanks

for rocking the boat-Coast Guard officials said the e-breaker can cut through as much as eight feet of ice and ma make the St. Mary's river, the Soc and the Straits of Mackinac pass able at any time of the year.

The vessel will open shipping lanes probably three to four weeks earlier than usual in the spring and keep them open later in the fall. Assurance of an early opening which transports huge tonnages of of Lake Superior to both the Chi cago area mills and Lake Erie ports Occasionally heavy ice has delayed navigation long enough to

threaten exhaustion of stockpiles.

The lake shipping season for iron ore in the last decade has ranged from March 27 opening to a Dec. 11 close. #### Century of Education

(From the Dallas News) Founded in the latter days of the Repub

lie of Texas, Baylor University has much cause for gratification in looking back over its first century of service to education. At first a missionary college on the rugged frontier, Baylor has grown with Texas. Today it offers training for many professions in a mechanized world but keeps an anchor fast to its original religious aims. On the firing lines and on the home front, its graduates are leaders in the battle for liberty and democracy.

The university took its name from Judge Robert Emmet Bledsoe Baylor, who wrote its charter and gave the school its first thousand dollars. A Kentuckian who had served in the War of 1812, Judge Baylor had also represented Alabama district in Congress for one term before he came to Texas. Here he was an advocate of annexation. Later he served as a district judge for a quarter century. Collaborating with him in founding what later became Baylor University were two missionaries, the Rev. Huckins of New Hampshire and the Rev. William M. Tyron of Georgia, who had been sent by the American Baptist Home Mission Society of New York.

Baylor enjoys a strong loyalty from its graduates, many of whom have become eminent i ntheir chosen fields in Texas and elsewhere. Like other institutions of higher learning, it now suffers from a war that has taken many of its young men; but it is won and battle-scarred veterans will be returning to the campuses to resume the

studies they broke off. The university's greatest usefulness lies ahead.
