
Holiday deaths decline

The 19 fatalities included nine people not wearing seat belts, three pedestrians, one bicyclist, and three under investigation as alcohol related.



SUCCESS starts in off-season

The ultimate success of an offseason conditioning program is measured in wins and losses.

The Muleshoe High School football team showed dramatic improvement last year, finishing at 5-5 in 1997 after winning just two games in the previous three years. The three high school programs combined for an 18-11 record.

But there are also other ways to gauge improvement.

A stop watch: four Mules ran 4.7s this spring in the 40-yard dash, the measuring stick of football speed. "We're not slow anymore," Muleshoe head coach David Wood said.

Last year, one player ran a 4.7. The weight room: three Mules bench press 250 pounds or more. "Certain kids are just blossoming. The lineman are becoming men," Wood said.

Numbers: The Mules have 63 football players in grades 10-12 in off-season programs, compared to 50 last year. "We're right where we need to be," Wood said.

Attitude: "The biggest area is "inhouse cleaning" as far as commitment to the program and adhering to the rules," Wood said. "We've tried to weed out the problems."


Wood said it is much easier to sell the kids on the program now that they've tasted success.

The momentum of the Mules' season-ending 38-31 overtime win against playoff contender River Road has carried over through the whole off-season.

at a better time," said Wood, whose team finished 1-9 in his first year at Muleshoe. "It showed them what they could accomplish if they set their minds to it."

The Mules worked out five days a week during the off-season, four days of lifting and agility drills and one day of competitions, with the emphasis on gaining strength and quickness.

"Building a winning program starts in the off-season," Wood said.



"I don't think it could have come

for high school students. Students will have the op-

portunity to take courses that can lead to certification and immediate employment upon graduation.

Courses include air conditioning and heating, allied health, graphics art, building trades, secretarial skills, cosmotology, and welding.

Students will not be charged for the course if they abide by the agreement made between themselves, the high school and the college, as well as successfully pass the course.

Students participating will attend the vocational courses in the afternoon. Ten students have already been chosen to participate in the program next fall.

In other business the board discussed combining election places with the City of Muleshoe and Muleshoe Area Hospital District.

The three voting entities are working together to make voting easier for local constituents.

Officials are trying to organize one voting site for early voting and one voting site on election day. Currently voters have to make three stops in order to participate in local elections.

Superintendent Bill Moore added that representatives from the three entities are going to approach the Bailey County officials and ask that all voting precincts and places be placed on voter registration cards.

Longtime MISD educators retire

The Muleshoe Independent School District this week said good-bye to more than 100 years of experience as three longtime educators retired.

Georgia Pena, director of special programs, and high school teachers Marquita Adamson and Johanna Wrinkle are starting a new phase of their life as they close the doors of their classrooms and open the doors of retirement.

For the past 44 years, Marquita Adamson has dedicated her life to teaching.

The 1950 Muleshoe High

School graduate first began working for the district in the early 60s. She soon made her mark, starting the first girls physical education and health program at the high school in 1961.

Adamson did leave Muleshoe for a several years, teaching home economics throughout New Mexico and Texas. She returned to Muleshoe in 1983.

Now that she's retired, Adamson has plans to travel and spend time with family, but definitely has no plans of leaving Muleshoe.

"I will fly away and visit

people, but I will always come back. I love this small town."

Adamson, who has a master's degree in home economics, also plans to write a cookbook combining favorite family recipes with stories of the past.

Pena has been helping Muleshoe students succeed for over 32 years.

Pena started her career in Muleshoe as a junior high reading teacher and high school English teacher.

For the past 25 years, she has been the director of special programs for the district, find-

actions concerning their property tax appraisals. You may follow these appeal procedures if you have a concern about:

- the market or special appraised value placed on your property
- the unequal appraisal of your property
- the inclusion of your property on the appraisal roll
- any exemptions that may apply to you
- the qualification for an agricultural or timber appraisal
- the taxable status of your property
- · the local governments which should be taxing your property
- the ownership of property
- the change of use of land receiving special appraisal
- any action taken by the chief appraiser, appraisal district or appraisal review board that applies to and adversely affected you.

Review by the Appraisal Review Board

If you can't resolve your problem informally with the county appraisal district (CAD) staff, you may have your case heard by the appraisal review board (ARB).

The ARB is an independent board of citizens that reviews problems with appraisals or other concerns listed above. It has the power to order the CAD to make the necessary changes to solve problems. If you file a written request for an ARB hearing (called a notice of protest) before the deadline, the ARB will set your case for a hearing. You'll receive written notice of the time, date, and place of the hearing . If necessary, you may request a hearing in the evening, Saturday or Sunday. Prior to your hearing, you may ask to review the evidence the CAD will use to uphold their determination. The CAD may ask you for a copy of the evidence you plan to present. The hearing will be informal. You or a designated agent may appear in person to present

ARB to review at your hearing. The CAD representa tive will present evidence about your case. You may cross-examine the CAD representative. The ARB will make its decision based on the evidence presented. The CAD has the burden of establishing the property's value by a preponderance of the evidence presented. You can get a copy of a protest form from the appraisal district office

Note: You shouldn't try to contact ARB members outside of the hearing. The law requires ARB members to sign an affidavit saying that they haven't talked about your case before the ARB hears it.

Review by the District Court

After it decides your case, the ARB must send you a copy of its order by certified mail. If you're not satisfied with the decision, you have the right to appeal to district court. If you choose to go to court, you must start the process by filing a petition within 45 days of the date you receive the ARB's order.

Tax Payment

If you appeal and your case is pending, you must pay the lesser of the amount of taxes due on the portion of the taxable value not in dispute or the amount of taxes due on the property under the order from which the appeal is taken.

Usual Deadline

Late protests are allowed if you miss the usual deadline for good cause. Good cause is some reason beyond your control, like medical emergency. The ARB decides whether you have good cause.

Late protests are due the day before the appraisal review board approves record for the year. Contact your appraisal district for more information.

Special Deadlines

For change of use (the appraisal district informed you that you are losing agricultural appraisal be-

On or before May 31 (or 30 days after a hotice of cause you changed the used of your land), the deadline is before the 30th day after the notice of the determination was mailed to you.

> For ARB changes (the ARB has informed you of a change that increases your tax liability and the change didn't result from a protest you filed), the deadline is before the 30th day after the notice of the determination was mailed to you.

> If you believe the appraisal district or ARB should have sent you a notice and did not, you may file a protest until the day before taxes become delinquent (usually February 1). The ARB decides whether it will hear your case based on evidence about whether a required notice was mailed to you.

* The deadline is postponed to the next business day if it falls on a weekend or holiday.

ing ability, and suggests approaches that can compensate for those changes.

The 55 ALIVE course covers the problems of impaired vision, hearing, and reaction time that impacts the driving ability of older motorists, and the affects of alcohol and medications on driving.

Local driving problems and ways to prevent car crashes are discussed, including what should be done in adverse driving conditions such as bad weather and rush hour congestion.



To receive Reading Renaissance Model Classroom certification, a teacher must demonstrate that their students receive a minimum of 60 minutes of reading practice time daily.


Teachers also must be actively working with individual students to meet Institute-recommended standards for reading achievement.

Improvement on TAAS test continues

Muleshoe Independent School District students showed improvement in TAAS scores in most every area.

Leading the pack for improvements was the WJHS eighth graders with 99 percent passing the math test.

Fourth graders also made great strides in each subject area with 77 percent of the class passing all three, reading, math and writing, portions of the TAAS. This was a 39 percent increase from last year's performance.

The number of 10th-grade students passing all three tests has risen from 44 percent in 1993-94 to 79 percent this year.

Overall, students are still struggling with the test at the third grade level, with only 57 percent passing.

However, since 1993 the entry level scores have steadily risen. This year's scores being the highest yet.




Mrs. Berry is a member of the Muleshoe Church of Christ. She participates in their "55 and Alive" program. They visit, have luncheons and play cards.


Winnie says that the staff of M.A.H.H.A is very nice. They are polite people who care a great deal. She adds that "they sure know what they're doing!"

Grants enhance public access to the library

The Muleshoe Area Public Library has been fortunate enough to receive three important grants this year.

The Telecommunications Infrastructure Fund enabled the library to purchase the equipment needed to bring the internet into the library. Any patron is welcome to use these computers and surf the World Wide Web. You must have a current library card and not have any fines or overdue books. Just come in and take the time to read the library's computer and internet policy and the library staff will introduce you to the Internet.

Another grant the library has received is the Texas Book Festival Award. This grant allowed the library to purchase some much needed reference tools.

The 1998 edition of the World Book Encyclopedia has changes on more than 3,300 pages. Over 80 new articles have been added and 55 entries were extensively revised. One thousand articles received a partial revision and cartographers created or revised over 130 maps sine the 1997

edition. Prior to this, the 1994 World Book Encyclopedia the library had was the most recent edition available in this library.

The 1998 World Book Medical Encyclopedia has topics that range from child development, nutrition and exercise to general safety. It also includes step-by-step lifesaving procedures to help you through emergencies such as choking or poisoning. The newest Medial Encyclopedia the library had dated back to 1989.

The Grolier Encyclopedia of Diseases has topics from lymes disease to stomach problems, from cancer to headaches. This 8 volume set provides clear, comprehensible information on more than 1,000 diseases and the body systems or parts they affect. 

But respect is different. By its very nature, it has to be earned. Not by perfection (no one can give that or should have to try), but by honesty and integrity and a good heart.






