SOON after taking over his duties as chairman of the New York Boxing Commission, Eddie Egan called a meeting of writers to discuss changes in the scoring system. Following a lengthy discussion a vote was taken on the question of whether judging should be scored on the point or round system. Opinion was evenly divided—just as it frequently is at the conclusion of a fight. Egan met with referees and judges with the same result.

Discussing systems of scoring fights is as amusing as the instructions given boxers by referees, which recalls to Tommy Loughran the most sensible set of orders ever given him by a third man.

Loughran was boxing Joe Sekyra in Louisville on Derby Eve of 1928, when Marvin Hart struggled into the enclosure, his shoes bulging with bunions. "Now see here, you fellows," said the Kentuckian whom Jim Jeffries gave the heavyweight title when he retired in 1905, "you've both been around a long time and know what it's all about. I've got bad feet, so I'm going to sit down in a corner, and don't give me any trouble."

There would be more action in more fights if referees would only sit quietly in a neutral corner.

A HALF dozen scoring systems were discussed at Egan's meetings with writers, referees and judges. The net result was that precisely nothing was done about

changing the present system, which determines the winning young savage by the greater number of rounds won. The official is supposed to arrive at his decision by taking into consideration effective aggressiveness, generalship, effective punches, allowing for defense and deductions for fouls.

QUITE complicated, and at the windup the official is usually too goggle-eyed to total up with any degree of accuracy. As a matter of fact, unlike other games, boxing has no hard and fast formula for deciding a winner—unless there is a knockout. It's largely a matter of opinion, and from various angles and distances fights are seen through different eyes.

Officials have to have some knowledge of other sports, but not so in the desk busting business. Anybody can set himself up as a judge, and does. A new fight fan becomes an expert and oracle overnight.

It's that simple, which is perhaps not the least reason why the cauliflower industry has held its appeal down through the centuries.

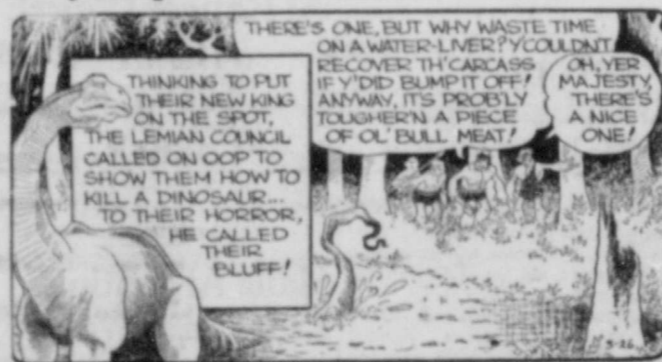

### Squad Tents To Be Manufactured By Ford Company

Twelve-man squad tents—a product new to the automobile industry—soon will be manufactured by the Ford Motor Company on machines where cloth parts for passenger cars were made before the war, it was announced today. The order, totaling about \$1,000,000 is for heavy canvas duck tents for the Quartermaster Corps. They will be fabricated at the rate of 2,000 a month.

Ford will build the tents in the Highland Park plant and production is scheduled to start in April. The tents are made of fire and mildew-resistant material, and are oblong in shape, having six-foot, two inch doors but no windows. They are 32 and one-half feet long, 16 feet wide and 12 feet high at the peak.

### Diplomats See Long Absences Hurting Corps

DIPLOMATS SEE 18 Pteyilli WASHINGTON (UP)—Spokesmen for the United States foreign service believe that "without any fault of their own," the nation's career diplomats are "hitting on only five out of eight cylinders."

The compliment came from the American Foreign Service Journal, official organ of the government's 750 career diplomats. It charged that long assignments outside the country, outmoded State Department practices and poor salaries had instilled "a sense of remoteness, frustration and general inadequacy" in American embassies throughout the world.

What's more, it said, there's too much "deadwood" in the upper ranks.

The journal took its own organization—as well as the State Department—to task in a special article analyzing 60 manuscripts submitted by diplomats in an essay contest on what's wrong with this country's diplomatic corps.

"Perhaps the most frequently voiced suggestion," the article said, was that of "closer contact with the Department and the United States."

It said that the men who are charged with carrying out foreign policy are "all too often out of touch with the trend of thought in Washington, and insufficiently familiar with the changing American scene."

Most of the essays urged a regular system of domestic assignments which would bring foreign service officers back to Washington every four, five or six years. Periodic leaves of absence, they said, should be made obligatory "at government expense" to bring diplomats back home for a look at changing conditions.

Charging that "too slow" promotions had stifled development of promising young diplomats, the journal also expressed fear that men unable to qualify for regular diplomatic assignments would be "suddenly incorporated into the higher brackets of the service."

Almost all the essay contestants demanded "increased and realistic allowances" to cover expenses encountered in foreign posts. They noted that " spasmodic waves of false economy had damaged efficient operation of the diplomatic corps in the past.
