Stevenson, Moody In Senate Race

Italian Voters Cast Ballots For A Republic

ROME (UP) — Italian voters are ordering King Humbert II off the throne in favor of a republic, partial official returns indicated today.

Vice Premier Pietro Nenni announced that nationwide totals in the monarchy referendum vote to 11 a. m. showed 1,508,631 votes and for the republic and 847,561 for keeping the monarchy.

Coalition Rule Looks Likely For The French

PARIS (UP) — A Big Three party coalition government probably will run France for the next seven months, it appeared today, despite the strong election showing of the Popular Republicans.

SAYS SOVIET IDEA HURTING WORLD PEACE

LONDON (UP) — Foreign Secretary Ernest Bevin told Commons today that a Russian idea that the Soviet system should be adopted throughout the world has become "a great obstacle to peace."

Bevin, in a sweeping review of foreign affairs, urged the Russian to lift the "iron curtain" drawn over eastern Europe.

Bevin endorsed the United States' plan for a 25-year treaty to make Germany militarily helpless and urged Russia to approve it because such a chance for peace "may never come again."

He asked that the British be treated as "decent citizens" in dealing in southeastern Europe, where he said they had had "every obstacle placed in their way."

Warning Issued About Safety In Water Sports

AUSTIN, Texas — Some timely advice to vacationists concerning the proper precautions to be used in water sports during summer months was released from the State Health Department today by Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health officer.

It was pointed out that in view of prevailing travel difficulties, vacation pleasures are apt to be limited to excursions and picnics at nearby lakes, rivers, and ponds of "unfamiliar depths and currents and without the usual lifeguard supervision associated with bathing beaches and commercial swimming pools."

"Swimming and water sports are beneficial to good health provided one's physical condition justifies this type of exercise," Dr. Cox asserted; "nevertheless, they possess dangerous possibilities if the rules of safety, though carelessness or thoughtlessness, are disregarded."

The State Health Officers outlined the following simple rules for bathing and swimming in safety when swimming, be alert and careful of unknown depths and currents; at least one hour should elapse after a meal before entering the water; upon the first indication of fatigue, come ashore and call it a day; if you become chilled, leave the water immediately; do not enter the water when overheated; learn to float, this is important; never attempt to rock a boat in a spirit of fun; never swim in water that may be polluted. Swimming close to or even a few miles below sewage outlets is inviting the possibility of acquiring disease.

"Excursions, picnics, and swimming parties contribute much to a healthy, happy, normal life, which is always desirable," Dr. Cox said. It is by no means advisable to eliminate these excursions from our summer program, but it is important that they prove beneficial and not disastrous.

The tests will be given by Mrs. Hal Hunter, guidance director of Ranger High School and Ranger Junior College and boys and girls between the ages of 11 and 17 will be eligible. A fee of \$1.00 will be charged.

BYRNES READY FOR JUNE 15 PARIS MEETING

WASHINGTON (UP) — Secretary of State James F. Byrnes said today he saw no reason for postponing the June 15 meeting of the foreign ministers at Paris.

He said he expects to leave for Paris June 15.

Byrnes told his news conference that he had submitted to other members of the Big Five a draft treaty for Austria, but has received no replies.

British Foreign Minister Ernest Bevin "scopped" Byrnes on the Austrian announcement, disclosing the American proposal in Commons earlier today.

At the last Paris meeting, Russia adamantly opposed any discussion of an Austrian peace treaty at this time.

Sen. Tom Connally, D., Tex., now has decided definitely to accompany Byrnes to the Paris meeting. Sen. Arthur H. Vandenberg, R., Mich., already had agreed to go.

OWIU Meeting Held In Ranger Monday Night

A meeting of the OWIU, Local 478 was held at the American Legion Hall in Ranger Monday night at 7:30 p. m. After the meeting was called to order, and the minutes read, new members were accepted and sworn in.

In accordance with the unanimous decision of the members, a PAC Program will be sponsored July 1 and will be open to the general public. This program will include a movie discussion of housing shortages and other subjects of community interest.

Local 478 voted to go in on a wage negotiations as planned. The general opinion seemed to be that it is better to have enough money now to meet obligations than to depend entirely on the Old Age Benefit plan sponsored by U. S. Company.

We are hearing much about the need of changes in our educational system to meet the changing times. People are really thinking about the matter and one time reader has submitted the following article on the subject.

We quote: "To the Ranger Times; I read an article in a current Reader's Digest about a little town in Alabama, in what the author calls the 'fat back and hominy grits' country, about how they are letting their children acquire much-needed practical training in their high school."

A condemnation from The Rotarian; the article is entitled "Holtville Youth Leads the Way." It relates how "Holtville high built with a student-run enterprise which do almost anything for the local farmer from slaughtering his meat to riving his wife a shampoo and finger wave."

I commend the article to every one's close attention and hope that we can equal their accomplishment.

The article conforms to my belief, that high school students should be taught practical subjects, as well as the fundamentals and required arts and sciences; the general trend in educational methods being in that direction, too.

I also know that Ranger High School is not teaching as many vocational subjects as the school could teach and that is what caused me to engage several of the present students in conversation about the article.

The essence of the conversations with these young people was about as follows: "Have you read the article in the Reader's Digest about what they are doing in the school in Alabama?"

The answer was always, "Yes." The fact that all of the youngsters were able to say that is a good indication of their alertness.

My next question was "How would you like to do that here?" Their replies were enthusiastic. The exact language of one young lady was "I'd love it." The degree of retained frustration was apparent to me when this same young lady added—"But you couldn't get the people of Ranger to do that."

Is this not at once a challenge to the parents and a stark accusation of neglect? How can we idly accept such a challenge and labor unaroused under such an accusation? Are not our children entitled to all of the advantages we can give them? Or cannot the town of Ranger equal the educational advantages of the "fat back and hominy grits" country?

The article opened, "Boys and girls can work miracles under their own power. They may need help in shaping their first plans (please note their first plans) but after that you'd better watch out or you'll get run over."

What think ye, fellow citizens of Ranger? Are we sending our children to their educational meal because it is twelve o'clock?

Or are we sending them to have their hunger sated with 'clay filler' and their appetite yet unsatisfied?

Or do we send them because the law requires their attendance? Or are we moving the bed to cover the hole in the bed room carpet?

I am asking questions and I would truthfully like to know.

Read the article, ask yourself some questions and then do what you honestly believe should be done."

NOT MUCH OF A SWAP

Philip Murray, CIO president, recently announced that the CIO is opposed to Communists who work the Communist line as a block within the organization.

Naturally, the AFL capitalized on this situation as it started its organizing campaign below the Mason-Dixon line, it served to present the senior organization of unions as a conservative labor group to a conservative section of the country.

That this didn't do the CIO's chances in the South any particular good is strictly the CIO's worry. But the stimulus it gave to smouldering Klan sentiment didn't do the country any good, which is more important.

Anyone acquainted with the Klan's history in the years following World War I will hesitate to believe that an anti-Communist crusade would stop short of another drive for a political stranglehold on the South and Middle West.

And anyone acquainted with the Klan's shame-faced terrorism, practiced with masked faces in the dark of night in the name of "Americanism" will hesitate to believe that a Klan revival is much preferable to the Communist infiltration which it professes to fight.

It is to be hoped that experience and common sense, fostered by the law where law is applicable, will throttle the Ku Klux Klan revival in its infancy.

With this declaration, Mr. Murray has taken on the obligation to allay any suspicion by the public that his belated discovery of Communist influence in his midst was a matter of expediency.

CANTON, Tex. — The importance of the office of Lieutenant governor was stressed by Jo Ed Winfree of Houston Monday, June 3, in Canton when he officially opened his statewide campaign for that position.

The 54-year-old Harris County legislator said that the lieutenant governor of Texas "can make or break the administration of any governor," adding that "those who really have the power to affect the welfare of the entire state are the legislators and senators," whom he termed "the ones who make our laws and spend our tax money."

"Probably one of the most powerful bodies in America today is the Texas senate, over which your lieutenant governor presides. By his appointment of committees, particularly free conference committees, he can to a certain extent exert great influence in the passage or defeat of legislation," Mr. Winfree said.

Mr. Winfree said that he is basing his appeal for the office on the record he has made during his 12 years in the Texas legislature. He places emphasis on his work as chairman of the taxation committee of the forty-eighth legislature, pointing out that this was the only tax committee in 65 years that

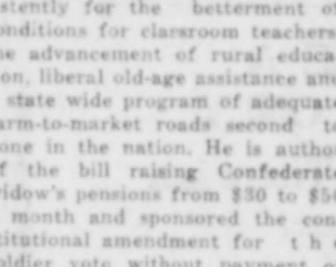
