WASHINGTON COLUMN

SAN FRANCISCO, Calif.—One of the most pathetic facets of this United Nations Conference has come from a lot of half-lost little people who, not belonging to any organization and not representing anyone but themselves, have nevertheless come here because they want so very desperately to help make the peace.



How they got here, where they stay, who pays their bills, nobody knows. But somehow they think that their lone voices, crying in the wilderness of international sin on the Barbary Coast, will start something. And they are living proof to the delegations from 48 other nations here gathered that in a democracy where freedom of speech is a gospel, every man is indeed a king even when he's a crankpot.

In the kaleidoscope of San Francisco memories there will always linger the image of a lean-faced ascetic passing out little slips of paper on which was printed the breath-taking news that A. C. S. Raymond of Orange, N. J., had come to San Francisco for just one purpose—to put God into the United Nations Charter.

ANOTHER memorable character was an unsuspecting-looking female who walked the sidewalks in the vicinity of the delegates' hotels, waiting till someone came along wearing a Conference button. Then from her handbag she would produce a four-page leaflet advocating amendments to the United Nations Charter to provide for "CSSA." This, it was explained, stood for Constitutional Social Security Amendments. The general idea was to confiscate all wealth, and all income from labor, then divide it up and pass it out as uniform social security benefits all over the world.

The prize handout of all, however, was the work of one C. Townsend Tucker of Los Angeles, self-styled "founder, organizer, and author of 'The Evolution of Civilization,' a revealer of truth, and endowed with understanding."

A chart, big as a tabloid newspaper page, showed the scheme. On it were a hundred stars and a lot of connecting lines. One cross, three ships, the Statue of Liberty, nine assorted sheds and outhouses, a curve labeled "love," a diagonal labeled "grace" and a horizontal curve near the top indicating there was a 4000-year plan to work all his out.

Of course all these people get a terrific runaround. They write letters to the Secretary of State, who writes them back thanking and referring them to the secretary general of the Conference, who writes them to inform that they tie on to one of the duly accredited organizations having an official consultant. These consultants can be bothered by lone-wolf cranks and pests.

They'll all probably go home frustrated and sore and forever after they'll be telling anyone who will listen, "Now when I was in San Francisco for the Peace Conference, I tried to warn everybody about these situations, but they just wouldn't listen. See what happened as a result?"

CELEBRATING his 30th birthday, the distinguished Exterminator still appears hale and hearty. He seemed to enjoy the birthday cake provided for him by his owner, Mrs. Willis Sharpe Kilmer, at Briar Court, Birmingham. He also appeared to revel in the presence of hundreds of children of the neighborhood who came to pay him court.

The actual founding date of a thoroughbred is seldom noted except in his registration papers, all race horses becoming a year older on January 1, but Old Bones is an exception. He always was an exceptional horse.

The popular old gelded son of McGee-Fair Express according to general estimate among horsemen, approximates the age of a 95 to 100-year-old human, but Exterminator looks big as well. He's not as trim and rounded as he was in his heyday, but Peter H. Curran, farm manager at Sup Briar, says they now chop his hay for him because his teeth are worn pretty smooth, but his appetite is good and he still romps in the paddock with his pony companion, Peanut III. He has outlived three stable companions.

EXTERMINATOR, raced 100 times in eight years, won 50, including 29 stakes, and added up a winning total of \$252,996—big money in his day.

When little Henry McDaniel took Sun Briar to Churchill Downs in the spring of 1918, the winter took favorite would not extend himself in early work-outs. McDaniel reported to Willis Sharpe Kilmer that Sun Briar might perk up if he had a horse to run with him. So Kilmer bought Exterminator for \$12,000 from J. Cal Milan.

Kilmer almost threw a fit when he saw the scrawny nag. About a week later Sun Briar's legs went amiss, and against his better judgment Kilmer sent Old Bones to the post instead of to a livery stable. Exterminator electrified the turf world and astounded the experts by winning at 30 to 1 in a phenomenal stretch drive.

In addition to his 50 frats, Exterminator finished second and third 17 times each, and was placed only 16 times. He was retired in 1924, to spend the twilight of his life in ease and luxury. It's been a long twilight. Over the years turf fans have sung the praises of many horses, great of today and of the past. But they were pipped! Old Bones.

Conduct Text Of Ultraviolet In Classrooms

SCHENECTADY, N. Y. (UP) The New York State Education Department in collaboration with the General Electric Co., has hit on a new idea to keep Johnny in school.

It has agreed to installation of germ-killing ultraviolet ray lamps in classrooms on an experimental basis in the hope they may control epidemics of measles, chickenpox and mumps.

Three large central rural schools in upstate New York have been chosen as the proving ground. The choice was made because all three schools were constructed recently on the same general plan.

All have similar ventilating systems circulating the same amount of air per pupil. Each school has a full-time nurse, and the health records for the past several years are reported to be good. The student populations are comparable with respect to size and come from homes of similar social and economic standing.

Also, the schools are not close to a large city and no large war industry has been introduced in their midst which might cause an influx of workers disrupting conditions.

In one of the schools, all rooms have been fitted with the ultraviolet lights. In another, half of the grade school rooms have been equipped and the others have not. In a third school, no installations have been made but health and ventilation records, similar to those of the other two schools are being kept for the purpose of comparison.

Tests to determine the bacterial contamination of the air in representative rooms with and without ultraviolet lights will be made. The ultra violet light intensity and bactericidal activity of the lamps also will be studied periodically.

But the experiment will not end there. Data to be kept over a period of several years will include the occurrence of measles, chickenpox and mumps among the school populations and confirmation of the diagnosis; determination of the source of infection in the initial case, and exact date of onset; determination of whether or not school children were exposed to the patient in classrooms or school buses and a study of secondary attacks occurring among those exposed.
