Twenty eight fighters from Okinawa bombed and strafed Japanese suicide plane bases near Fukuoka on the southern home island of Kyushu. Seventy five Mustangs based on Iwo Jima attacked airfields around Mito, 65 miles north

The 28 plane raid was only a teaser of what will happen when Okinawa becomes the base it is in the blue prints. But dispatches from the field revealed six airfields already are in operation on the island and the steady development of Okinawa was enough to


