Expensive fire

This fire Tuesday morning at the Engelbert Bugarin home, 106 NE Seventh St., destroyed a garage-workshop building, a car, exercise equipment and tools. When Mrs. Bugarin saw the smoke and called the fire department about 9 a.m., most of the damage already had been done—the flames had spread throughout the wood framing inside the building, and into the car, she said. By the time

firemen arrived moments later (left photo), the building was engulfed in flames. In above photo, firemen pull out the destroyed car after extinguishing the blaze. The car was a 1968 Chevrolet Malibu which Engelbert Bugarin Jr., 16, had been restoring for more than a year. Mrs. Bugarin said an electrical short apparently started the fire. The damage estimate is still being tallied.

Police calls

Pedestrian is injured; three vehicles damaged

County Probation Officer Henry Warren was treated for a shoulder injury and multiple cuts and abrasions after he was hit by a pickup last Wednesday night on Southeast Fourth Street.

The pickup's driver, Billy Joe Farris, 43, of Hart, was arrested for causing the chain-reaction accident that also left three vehicles damaged.

City police said Warren was unlocking the door of his car, which was parked at the curb in front of the Tex Pack Freight building, 511 SE Fourth St., when Farris' pickup struck the rear of his car and then hit him, throwing him part of the way across the street.

After being hit from the rear, Warren's car—a 1977 Olds Cutlass—lurched forward at an angle and crashed head-on into Gerald Summers' 1982 Chevrolet pickup, which was parked off the street nearby, officers said.

When officers arrived at the scene, they found Warren bleeding from visible injuries, but walking around. Warren told them he had been dazed but not knocked unconscious when the oncoming pickup knocked him off his feet.

Warren was taken by ambulance to Plains Memorial Hospital, where he was treated for multiple contusions, abrasions, a deep cut on one finger, and a shoulder injury.

Farris was charged with felony DWI, failure to control speed and failure to maintain financial responsibility. Justice of the Peace Marshall Young set his bail at \$1,500; he is currently free on bond pending Grand Jury action on the felony charge.

Vehicle damage was heavy to Warren's car, moderate to Farris' pickup and light to Summers' pickup, police reported.

Burglars stole video equipment from two mobile homes in Dimmitt during the past two weeks.

Yolanda Chavez, 206 E. Grant St., reported last Wednesday afternoon that someone had broken into

her mobile home between Dec. 23 and Dec. 28 and stolen a 25-in. Magnavox color TV set valued at \$300 and a Sony VCR valued at \$200. She said the burglar pried open the front door of her mobile home to gain entry.

Deputy Sheriff Manuel Flores, 642 NW Sixth St., Lot 11, notified city police early Monday that someone had entered his mobile home and stolen an RCA remote-control VCR valued at \$570 and a Chaparral Sierra satellite remote-control unit valued at \$1,000. The burglary occurred between 5 p.m. Sunday and 12:55 a.m. Monday, Flores reported.

Both cases are under investigation.

Dora Garibaldi, 400 SW Fourth St., complained to police last Thursday that someone had taken a gold chain valued at \$50 and a box of hamburger patties valued at \$15 from her home.

Several cases of vandalism and criminal mischief occurred during the week.

Robert Luna notified city police at 11:15 p.m. Saturday that a young Dimmitt man had broken the passenger-side window and the windshield of his car with a heavy chain.

Luna said he was "dragging Main" with friends when the other man, who was driving in front of him, stopped his car in the 400 block of North Broadway, got out carrying the chain, walked back to Luna's car and broke out the windows.

Police arrested Louie Arguijo Jr., 19, after a car chase, and charged him with disorderly conduct, evading arrest, aggravated assault and criminal mischief in connection with the incident.

A car and pickup collided on South Broadway in front of Mr. Burger last Wednesday night.

Police said a 1977 Oldsmobile driven by Sylvia Barrientos, 37, of Stamford, was traveling south when a northbound 1986 Chevrolet pickup driven by Reagan Frye, 19, of Route 2, Hereford, started a left turn toward the Mr. Burger parking lot and crossed in front of Barrientos' oncoming car.

The collision damaged the front of the car and the right side of the pickup, police reported. Frye was cited for failure to yield right of way while turning left and failure to maintain financial responsibility.

First farm program meeting set tonight

A series of four meetings has been planned to discuss the 1989 Farm Program and 1989 payment limitation provisions.

The first meeting will be held tonight (Thursday) at 7:30 p.m. in the Hart High School cafeteria. Coffee and tea will be provided by the Hart ag-science boys. On Jan. 9 the second meeting will be held at the Easter Community Center. The meeting will be held in conjunction with the Easter Lions Club regular meeting. The third meeting will be held Jan. 11 at 8 p.m. at the Nazareth Legion Hall. WIFE will host the fourth meeting Jan. 12 at 7:30 p.m. at the Dimmitt City Hall.

The sign-up period for the 1989 Farm Program began Dec. 19 and continues through April 14. Producers who intend to plant a percentage of their permitted acreage of a base crop to soybeans or sunflowers must sign up by Feb. 3, Abbott said.

"There are quite a few changes from last year in the 1989 Farm Program," said Scotty Abbott, ASCS county executive director.

"Advance deficiency payments will be available only if you make a request during the program sign-up period. The advance payments will be made in cash at 40% of the estimated deficiency payment rate for wheat and feed grains and at 30% of the estimated rate for cotton. The advance payment rates are \$.20 per bushel for wheat; \$.356 per bushel for corn; \$.36 per bushel for grain sorghum; \$.092 per bushel for barley; and \$.0642 per bushel for cotton."

Under the new farm program, advance payments will be limited to the intended acreage of each crop. Payments will not be made until the entity requesting payment has been determined to be "actively engaged in farming" and a person determination has been made for payment limitation purposes.

"You may also declare intentions to plant 10 to 20% of each program crop's permitted acreage to soybeans or sunflowers and protect the program crops acreage base history," Abbott said.

For farmers who must register

soybeans and sunflowers by Feb. 3, the total planting intentions for all farms under the special sign-up will be reviewed to ensure that the price for the 1989 soybean crop will remain above 115% (\$5.49 per bushel) of the 1988 loan rate of \$4.77 per bushel. No program benefits other than soybean price support loans will be made available when planting soybeans on permitted acreage.

Any portion of a farms acreage base, minus the soybean base included in the farms acreage base may be exchanged for oats for the 1989 crop year during the 1989 sign-up period. Any acreage that is exchanged for oats will be considered planted to the original program crop for determining the farm acreage base or crop acreage base in future years, but will not result in an increase in the program bases. Program benefits for the acreage planted to oats will be those applicable to oats.

For more details about the 1989 Farm Program, farmers are encouraged to attend one of the four meetings.

TCGA to meet Tuesday

Congressman Kika de la Garza, chairman of the House Agriculture Committee, will be the main speaker when the Texas Corn Growers Association and the Texas Corn Producers Board hold their 16th annual meeting in Dimmitt Tuesday.

The meeting will begin at 9:30 a.m. in the County Expo Building and is expected to draw corn producers from throughout the Panhandle.

The Castro County chapter of Women Involved in Farm Economics (WIFE) will serve a free lunch at noon.

De la Garza, a Democrat from Mission and one of the ranking members of the House of Representatives, is expected to speak on major farm legislation and the outlook for agriculture from a political standpoint.

Other speakers will include:

—Mike Moeller, Texas' deputy commissioner of agriculture.

—John Ford, former deputy secretary of agriculture, who serves as information director of the American Corn Growers Association.



Our peace officers

Sheriff Lonny Rhynes took the oath of office Tuesday morning to begin his third four-year term as the county's top elected law officer.

Sheriff Rhynes heads a 12-person department that is on duty around the clock.

Other members of the Sheriff's Dept. are Deputies Jerry Bailey, Joe Hoard, Jerry Jansa, Manuel Flores and Ernest Back; Dispatchers Glen Snitker, Tana Young and Earline West; Chief Jailer Ben Reyes; and Jailers Vicki Bailey and Sammy Ramirez.

Constable James Dobbs, the only other elected peace officer in the county, serves basically as an officer of the local courts.

Across the hall from the Sheriff's Dept. in the courthouse are the offices of the Texas Dept. of Public Safety, a six-person department that includes Troopers Ron Morgan, Nick Hand and John Piper, Clerk Lori Glidewell, Driver's License Trooper C. D. Fitzgerald and Driver's License Clerk Carolyn Thompson.

Across the street in the city hall is the county's second-largest law enforcement agency, the Dimmitt Police Dept., headed by Police Chief Gary Thurman. Members of the Police Dept. are Lt. Ray Aleman, Sgt. Felix Balderas, Patrol Officers Rudy DeLeon, Rita Varela, Mitch McDonough and Don Elliott, and Secretary Loreta Andrada.

The Sheriff's Dept. dispatchers serve all three law enforcement agencies. They receive phoned-in complaints at 647-3311 and radio-dispatch the appropriate officers, based on the jurisdiction involved.

The Dimmitt Police Dept. investigates complaints, crimes and moving-traffic accidents within the city limits, and patrols traffic on the public streets.


The Sheriff's Dept. investigates crimes and accidents that occur in the county outside the Dimmitt city limits, and in the cities of Hart and Nazareth, which have no city law officers at present.

The jurisdiction of the Dept. of Public Safety extends throughout the state. Although DPS officers are seen mainly patrolling our state and federal highways, they can cross county lines to serve anywhere in Texas, and they also use planes, unmarked cars and undercover officers to investigate other crimes against the state.

These local departments often work together and with other state and federal law enforcement agencies to help enforce our laws and bring criminals to justice.

Sometimes we take our peace officers for granted and it appears that we don't appreciate them.

But we want all of you peace officers to know—we're glad you're a part of Dimmitt and Castro County!

The County Committee members for 1989 are Frank Wise, chairperson; George Elder, vice chairperson; and Arlie Petty, member.

The Amarillo area Adult Literacy Council will offer two workshops to train interested people who want to teach others to read.

The spring workshop schedule includes two sessions. The first session includes meetings Jan. 30 from 6 to 9:30 p.m., Jan. 31 from 6 to 9:30 p.m. and Feb. 3 from 6 to 9 p.m. The second schedule is April 10 and 12 from 1 to 4:30 p.m. and on April 14 from 1 to 4 p.m.

The Dimmitt council is in the beginning stages and is not qualified to train tutors yet. The one-on-one tutoring to read is now available to those wishing to learn to read or to improve their reading and writing skills in Dimmitt and anyone wishing to have private help should call Rhoads Memorial Library, 647-3532. There is no charge for the service.

Cotton loan deficiency payments have been authorized for 1988 crop upland cotton during periods when the average world price is below the 1988 crop national average loan rate of 51.8 cents per pound.

The cotton loan deficiency payment rate is equal to the difference between the loan rate and the loan repayment rate in effect during the week in which the cotton is sold, plus, if applicable, any coarse count adjustment. An application for loan deficiency payment and acceptable documentation must be submitted within 60 days of the date the cotton is sold, but not later than May 31.

LDP's will be paid to eligible producers who agree to forego eligibility on the production on which a loan deficiency payment is requested. The LDP will be determined on a farm-by-farm basis. The payment will be paid on a bale by bale basis, which means that an eligible producer may place bales produced on the same farm under loan and get an LDP on the eligible production not placed under loan. The pounds for this payment cannot exceed the individual farm program planted acreage times the farm program payment yield.

The final 1988 wheat deficiency payments are in the process of being paid. The payment will be based on 69 cents per bushel rather than the estimated \$1.53 per bushel. Those of you who enrolled in the 0/92 program will be guaranteed the \$1.53 per bushel on the acreage not planted.

The five-month national average market price exceeds the target price for barley and oats. Only producers guaranteed payment are those who enrolled in the 0.92 program. These payments will be made soon.

Vegetable meeting set

Better ways of marketing and producing traditional vegetable crops and new alternative vegetables and strawberries on the High and Rolling Plains will be explained at the 1989 West Texas Vegetable Conference in Hereford Jan. 17.

The program in the Hereford Community Center, 100 Avenue C at Park Avenue, begins at 8:30 a.m. More than a score of scientists and experienced growers and shippers will address the theme, "Profitable Alternatives."

"For growers who are serious about the vegetable business, this program will present vital, practical information they can use to make profitable decisions for 1989 and beyond," said Dr. Roland E. Roberts, vegetable specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service and conference coordinator.

The session will open with an update on research to improve one of the area's major vegetable crops, potatoes, and on a new entry into the marketplace, the Texsprout mungbean. This will be presented by Dr. Creighton Miller, professor of horticulture with the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, and Doug Smallwood, TAES research associate from Lubbock.

Other specialty crops for Texas will be discussed by Tom Longbrake, Extension Service horticulturist at College Station. Getting a profitable mix of specialty crops will be examined by Dr. H.L. Goodwin, assistant professor of agricultural economics at College Station.

Other speakers will detail the latest information on materials, equipment and strategies in pest and disease control, fertilization and irrigation, and production of onions, cucumbers, potatoes and spinach.

Educational and agribusiness exhibits will provide growers a look at new materials and equipment.

The conference has been planned by the Extension Service with the cooperation of the High Plains Vegetable Growers and Shippers Council, the Deaf Smith County Extension Vegetable Program Development Committee, TAES and Texas Tech University.

Additional information is available at County Extension offices throughout the High and Rolling Plains.

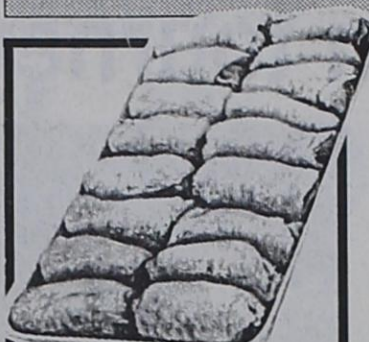

Naz beats Sudan in tourney finals

Nazareth's Swiftettes felt pretty good Friday night after capturing their second tournament championship of the year at Sudan.

But what felt even better was beating the third-ranked team in the state and longtime rival Sudan Hornets to earn the title.

Brockman led Nazareth's scoring attack with 12 points. Dana Schulte added 9.

After a sluggish first half, which was marred by fouls and turnovers, Nazareth's girls took control of the championship game against Sudan Friday.

The lead changed hands several times throughout the first quarter and after eight minutes, Sudan held a 10-9 edge. The Hornets held on to the lead, stretching it to three points in the second quarter, but it wouldn't last. Nazareth tied the game at 20 with 2:15 left in the half when Leavitt connected on a turnaround jumper, then took the lead on a Ball basket with 1:20 left. Sudan never regained the lead.

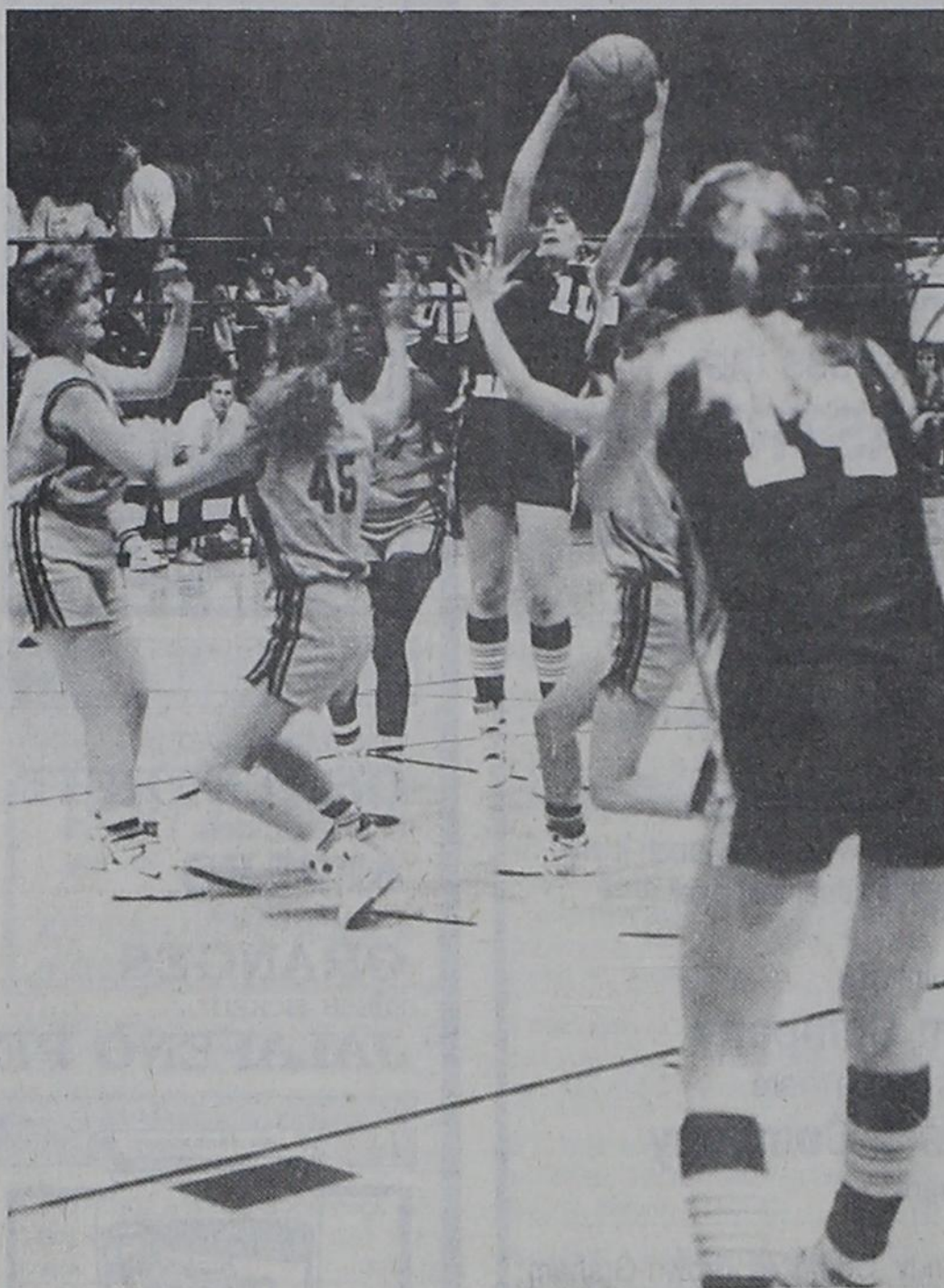
Nazareth opened the third quarter with three quick baskets to take a 29-22 lead and held on to lead 40-33 after three quarters.

Bobcats win consolation

Dimmitt Coach Ken Cleveland feels his young Bobcats showed a lot of progress in the Caprock Holiday Tournament and are ready for the district race.

And none too soon. They open conference play Tuesday night at Littlefield, against District 2-AAA's top-ranked team.

In the big 16-team Caprock Holiday Tournament field, the Bobcats made a good showing as they won four and lost one to capture the consolation championship.

"There were about 10 teams of the 16 that could have won the tournament, and ours was one of them," Cleveland said. "When you look at the comparative scores, you realize that if we were to hold the tournament again this week the results might be different all up and down the line."

The Bobcats' only tourney loss

came in their opener against Class 5A Lubbock Monterey, 64-51.

"They just beat us fair and square," Cleveland said. "They had a three-point shooter who just drilled it. He got 30 points. We didn't play badly; we just got beat."

After downing Class 2A Morton 64-40 in the first round of consolation play, the Bobcats put away three good Class 4A teams—Lubbock Dunbar, Lamesa and Levelland—to win their trophy. Point guard Emilio Arce, who was Dimmitt's leading scorer in four of the five games, was named to the all-tournament team.

The Bobcats proved something to themselves when they defeated Dunbar, 68-59. Dunbar had a good 6-9 post forward, John Elliott, plus two other front-liners who were taller than anyone on the Dimmitt squad.

The Bobcats went on to defeat

Lamesa 64-47 in the consolation semis and Levelland 64-52 in the consolation championship game.

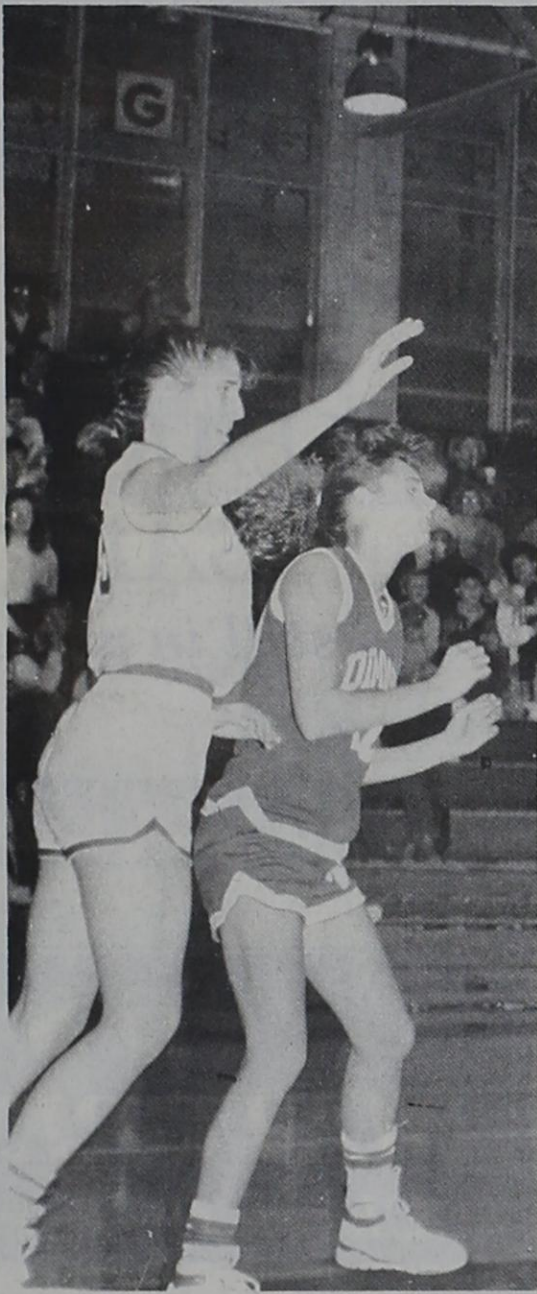

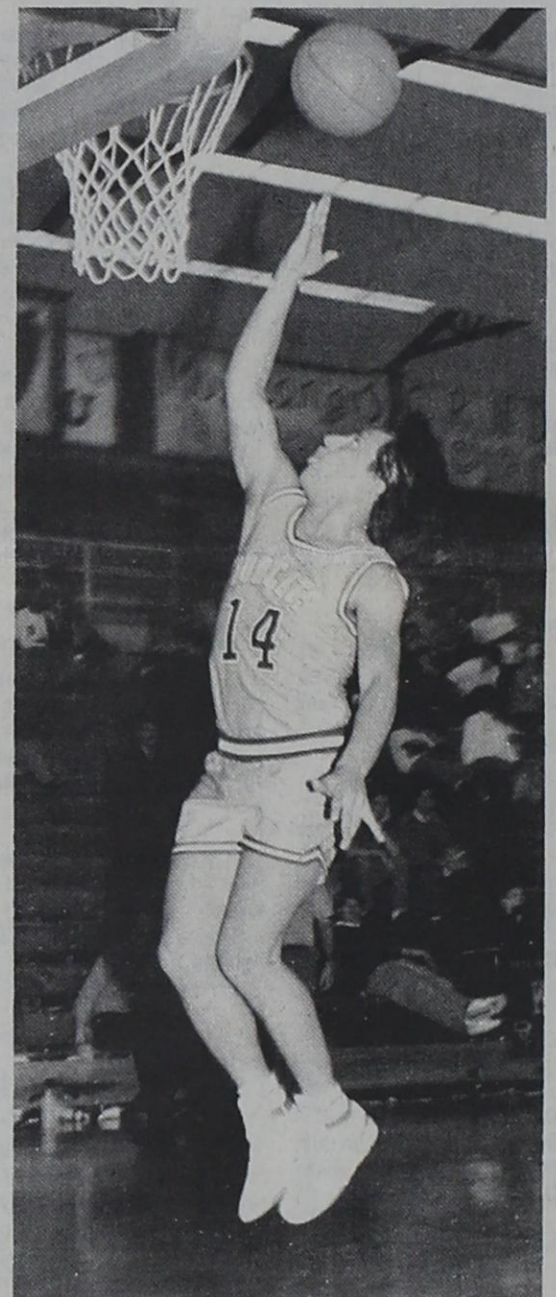


