Bemedaled GI With 168 Points Sticks To Guns

SANTA MONICA, Cal. (UP)—Gen. Henry (Hap) Arnold, commander-in-chief of the Army Air Forces, has commended 8-27, Harold M. Carothers of Denver, for deserving to fight the Japanese although the bemedaled sergeant's 168 points make him eligible for discharge.

Carothers' decision to "stick to your guns" with the AAF "has served the purpose of emphasizing to the American public that we are still at war and that the AAF will not rest until the strategic targets of Japan are reduced, as were those of Germany, to rubble," Gen. Arnold wrote.

The sergeant soon will leave the AAF Redistribution Station here for B-29 Flight Engineers School in preparation for a crack at the Japanese.

In his European warfare, he won the Silver Star, Distinguished Flying Cross, Distinguished Service Cross, the Soldiers Medal, the Purple Heart with one cluster and the Air Medal with 11 clusters.

He rates as his greatest thrill his experience on Feb. 8, 1944, when the Allied Air Forces began the "obliteration campaign" over Berlin. His ship dumped a cargo of bombs over Hitler's headquarters, and as tail gunner, he was able to see the destruction caused by the raid.

Sgt. Carothers received the Soldiers Medal for pulling the pilot out of their crashed plane on Jan. 16, 1945.

Weatherford Peaches Acquire Peculiar Name

AUSTIN, Tex. (UP)—To folks along the Rio Grande border, "wetback" is a fellow from Mexico who swims the river and makes illegal entry into the United States.

But to folks who know peaches, "wetback" is something entirely and pleasantly different.

"Wetback" is the trade name which the Parker County Fruit Growers Association markets its products—and especially a brand of peaches called "Fair Beauty."

State Rep. Arthur Cato, Weatherford, who presented Austin businessmen a bushel of the "Fair Beauties", said he didn't know how the "Wetback" name got to Parker County. He said, and others agreed, there certainly was no connection.

Texas Airports To Get Big Sum

AUSTIN, Tex. (UP)—The Civil Aeronautics Administration announced that when its \$120,000,000 airport development program in Texas is completed, the state will have a total of 632 airports.

The program includes development of existing airports and building of new ones, nearly 121 million dollars worth of air field development. This does not include buildings, hangars and facilities.

Columbia River Dams Pay U. S. Big Dividends

PORTLAND, Ore. (UP)—America's taxpayers—all stockholders in the Columbia River, America's number one power stream—are promised repayment with interest for every dollar of investment made in the federal power projects on the Columbia and in the 2,700-mile Bonneville-Grand Coulee transmission system.

Officials declare gross revenues from the sale of power from Bonneville and Grand Coulee dams are paid the \$62,000,000 mark. The net surplus totals \$14,500,000—after payment of all power costs, interest on investment, operating and maintenance expenses.

Annual gross revenues run close to \$23,000,000. Concerning the big surplus, D. L. Marlett, assistant Bonneville administrator said it is a "wait-and-see" phenomenon and will serve as a cushion when revenues level out after Northwest war industries close down.

Marlett said, from the long-range view, Bonneville's basic wholesale rate of \$17.50 per kilowatt year is fixed as just about the right level to assure repayment within 50 years of the federal investment.

Bonneville and Grand Coulee projects are not only self-supporting, he said, but are also paying huge dividends to the Northwest by providing the basis for development of new tax-paying, job-producing industries.

"Since 1940, 15 electro-process and related plants representing an investment of \$150,000,000 have been established in the Pacific Northwest. They form the nucleus of the area's war production—turning out ships, planes, light metals, alloys, chemicals, and other war materials.

Lend-Lease To France Offset By Coal Strike

PARIS (UP)—France has, so far, been unable to make full use of the extensive lend-lease supplies from the United States because of Europe's Number One problem—the shortage of coal.

Lack of coal is threatening to disrupt entirely the already shattered French economy, which will bring suffering to millions next winter.

The Ministry of National Production told the United Press that the French textile industry is operating at only 30 per cent of capacity because of the coal shortage, and a further 16 per cent reduction in production is threatened by what appears will be another 50 per cent cut in coal supplies in the near future.

French civilians already have been reduced to making clothes out of curtains, and on the basis of the present situation it appears like they will continue to do so for at least another winter even though American raw materials are already on hand to alleviate the situation.

Prisoners and deportees recently demonstrated in Paris because they have to pay \$200 for a suit of clothes. Miners have struck for more food and bigger wages. In an effort to combat the situation the French government has promised the miners more rations and ordered a boost of 25 per cent in their wages. In addition, the government plans to place 35,000 German prisoners in the mines and is negotiating for the use of the Saar and Rhur. French technicians are already with the Americans in that area surveying the situation.

While increased shipping space is being allotted to delivery of American raw materials for France, government officials ruefully admit that this won't do the French much good until the coal problem is licked.

Navy Turns Cupid To Officer And Australian Bride

FORT WORTH, Tex. (UP)—When two people are in love they will do practically anything to be with each other.

This holds true for Chief Petty Officer W. E. Whittle and his Australian bride who recently traveled 10,000 miles to be with her husband.

Whittle was introduced to the Brisbane girl while he was on shore leave from his submarine. He immediately fell in love with her and they were married.

The veteran of three major battles was then called back to duty, and when the ship pulled into port again, it was in the United States. He then received a furlough and the ship departed without him.

After waiting 15 months, the bride finally was able to obtain transportation across the Pacific, and she arrived in Fort Worth two days before Whittle was to report back for duty at Key West Fla.

The navy playing cupid, gave the groom a nine-day extension, however, and then the bride will stay with her mother.

Plot Against Irish Government Is Broken Up

DUBLIN (UP)—A plot to overthrow Premier Eamon De Valera's Eire government by force has been smashed with the arrest of 40 members of the outlawed Irish Republican Army, it was disclosed today.

Police authorities revealed that the would-be rebels were among some 400 IRA members who were released from the Curragh internment camp at the end of the European war.

Acting on information that the IRA men were planning a wholesale assassination campaign against government and police officials, flying squadrons of the Irish criminal investigation department rounded up the 40 leaders, most of them within a few days after their release from Curragh.

U. S. Food Supply To Liberated Europe To Halt

WASHINGTON (UP)—The U. S. Army will stop supplying food to civilians in liberated Europe on August 31, it was learned today.

The action will save millions of dollars for American taxpayers. But it is not expected to mean more food for civilians because purchase and distribution of about the same level will be handled by the liberated government themselves.

At the same time it was disclosed that the United States, contrary to earlier announcements, would continue lend-lease shipments of meat to Russia during July, August and September.

Friday Set As Deadline For Charter Hearings

WASHINGTON (UP)—Chairman Tom Connally, D. Tex., of the Senate foreign relations committee today set Friday afternoon as the deadline for public hearings on the United Nations charter.

"We expect to complete the hearings tomorrow and will report the charter to the Senate next Monday," Connally said.

The committee is expected to approve the charter either at the close of hearings tomorrow or at a special meeting on Saturday.

To expedite action after hearing ends, a special subcommittee and state department experts already are at work drafting a favorable report on the plan for a new world peace-keeping organization.

Domestic Conflicts On Increase As Veterans, Families Reunited

DALLAS, Tex. (UP)—With the war nearing its victorious end for the United Nations, many men are returning home from overseas to the wives they hastily married and to their families; and this way new problems face the county offices of domestic relations.

Such problems have taken a major spotlight in Dallas courts and presumably the same conditions will apply in most other communities in Texas or the nation.

Even during the conflict many cases have been filed by men and women whose families have decided to split up because the wife may go out with that "cute" welder, or it may be that hubby has decided the pulchritude of other women is more to his liking than that of his wife.

RANGER'S LOSS IN THE WAR IS THE HEAVIEST

From the beginning of Selective Service in 1940 to date, approximately 3,900 men and women from Eastland county have been called into the service of their country. From this number there have been 142 deaths, 125 wounded and 50 missing in action. In these losses Ranger has lost more than any other one town or community.

Of those killed 32 were from Eastland, 23 from Cisco, 44 from Ranger, 13 from Rising Star, 11 from Gorman, four from Olden and 13 from the various rural communities.

Of those wounded 25 were from Eastland, 13 from Cisco, 56 from Ranger, 16 from Rising Star, five from Gorman, three from Olden and seven from the rural communities of the County.

Of the 50 reported missing in action (some of whom may have recently been accounted for) five were from Eastland, 18 from Ranger, 12 from Cisco, four from Rising Star, five from Gorman, one from Olden and five from the rural sections.

Lid On Passenger Cars May Be Off On January 1, '46

WASHINGTON (UP)—New passenger cars, which already are in production, may be rationed free by next January—but most Americans probably won't be able to get one for some time afterward.

The war production board believes that enough materials will be available during the next two months to allow manufacturers to make more cars than their present quotas.

Appropriation For FEPC Passed

WASHINGTON (UP)—The house today approved a \$250,000 appropriation for the fair employment practice committee. The money could be used either to terminate its functions or to continue operations pending approval of additional funds.

Lauds Spirit Of Chinese In War Output

BEVERLY HILLS, Cal. (UP)—Thanks to the devoted labor of her patriotic people, China's armaments are turning out twice as much war material today as they were nine months ago.

That's the cheering report of Edwin K. Smith, former ordnance major recently returned to his Beverly Hills home after eight months in China as metallurgical adviser in the State Department's cultural relations program.

As an example of the spirit that has kept China fighting the invader for eight years, Smith told how unskilled peasants are helping to make up for the loss of the great iron deposits Japan got in her Manchurian grab.

"Hundreds of Chinese farmers use spare moments to gather iron ore and smelt it in crude home furnaces," he said. "They bring the large, thin slabs of pig to the new arsenals in primitive carts."

Smith, who was sent to China to suggest improvements in iron and steel production, thinks the greatest bottleneck in our oriental ally's war effort is transportation.

Victory Garden Pays Dividends For Nine Women

CAMP SWIFT, Tex. (UP)—Victory gardening is paying dividends to nine women working in the control office of Combined Maintenance.

Capt. G. M. Viek, production control officer, saw several women idly digging in the ground last spring while they were—on their lunch hour.

An idea came into the minds of the workers when the Captain said, "Why not put your digging talents to use?"

The next day cultivation began behind the office, and a garden from which they now take home beans, peas, turnips, tomatoes, and other fresh vegetables was in the making.

They set up a fund to buy seeds and tools, and spent their noon hours and rest periods in making the dust fly.

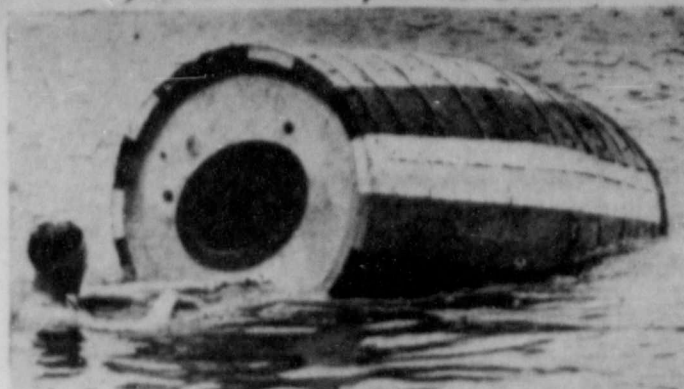
