For more than 50 years, eminent members of the Texas bar have been citing the defects in the judiciary of this Tatate and urging revision, but while piece-meal remedies have been applied, very little substantial improvement has resulted

The six commissioners are already virtually justices in so far as their work is concerned. They help in the review of cases, up to the point of decision, and then decision rests With chief justice and his two associate justices.

The three justices who are elected by the people, appoint the six commissioners. If the proposed amendment is adopted all nine members will be elective for six-years terms; hree terms expiring every two years, and all will participate in decisions. The commissioners now in office will rein as justices until their terms expire and will be entitled to seek re-election.

The amendment will also raise the minimum age of justices from 30 to 35 years and the period of legal experience is from seven to 10 years. This will not affect present personnel of the court and commission.

Years ago it was recognized that a Supreme Court of three members was not large enough to serve Texas. This is why the commission was created. As the business of the court has increased a tribunal of nine members is none too horge, and it is high time to simplify matters by eliminating

As the slary of a commissioner is only \$500 a year less "Than that of an associate justice, adoption of the amendment will not be expensive to the taxpayers. In fact, the change by improving the efficiency of the court, is likely to prove economical. The Texas judiciary needs additional . revision, but adoption of this amendment will be a move in the right direction and it may pave the way for other corrective measures.

WASHINGTON, D. C .- Do you have trouble answering your mail? Do you blush when you enter a drawing room to see standing there Miss Josephine de Oakes to whom you owe a thank you note for having invited you to cocktails on the 13th ull.? Do you lie awake nights worrying about all those let-

ters you have forgotten to write to your relations, doctor, dentist, grocer, butcher and landlord, thanking them for their services and, incidentally, et

definitely. You will never forget the day you read here how easy it is to get your mail answered rithin three days after receipt of same, banishing

your cares. In one easy lesson it tells here how the efficience experts in the Department of State figured out a system whereby the Secretary of State could get

his mail answered without forgetting. It seems that some months ago the Secretary's office was having sareal trouble getting his mail answered. A letter would come in which the Secretary himself couldn't reply to because he didn't know the answer, or was over at the White House, or something.

SO the efficiency experts got together and devised a system to remedy all this. They issued an "Administration Instruction" the title of which was "Control of Limited Category of Communications Addressed to the Secretary of State," which stated:

"To all communications selected for control will be stapled four serially numbered control cards (yellow, blue, red and green) of which the original (white) is retained in the Secretary's office and on the stub of which appears the following: "The Secretary wishes an immediate acknowledgment made of this communication if a reply cannot be sent within three days.'

Next comes instructions on "Procedure." Thus:
"1. Yellow card. Immediately on receipt of the cor the division or office to which routed for action, the entry only on the yellow card (Date received) will be completed, but firmly written so that carbon impression will be recorded on the underlying blue. red and green cards. Send the yellow card at once to the Secretary's

Instructions as to the blue and red cards were followed thus: "4. Green card. The Division of Co-ordination and Review will detach the green card after stamping in the (Date mailed) and send the green card to the Secretary's office, room 284."

See how easy it is to get your mail answered in three days? Just fill out four cards (but firmly) and attach to letter when received. Send yellow card to Gran'maw's, blue card to the police station, red card to the fire department and the green card—Oh, just drop the green card in the garbage pail for the waste-
