### GERMANS PLUNDERED ITALIAN LIVESTOCK

ROME (UP)—The Germans  
plundered 140,000 head of cattle  
from 38 Italian provinces during  
their occupation, a preliminary  
survey by the Italian government  
shows.

The total included 1,528 bulls,  
12,684 oxen, 25,291 milk cows,  
58,288 other cows, 18,256 young  
bulls and 26,091 calves. The  
Germans also took 608,000 sheep,  
14,048 horses, 22,680 donkeys, 6,  
614 mules, and 4,076 buffalo.
