Defeat Winters in Prelims And Wellington in Finals To Take Region 1-AA Title

Dimmitt's almost-annual spring vacation begins Thursday as the Dimmitt Bobbies—and a goodly portion of the townspeople—converge on Austin for the Interscholastic League Girls State Basketball Tournament.

Dimmitt fans have followed the Bobbies to the McCamey League tournament in Waco and the TIL tournament in Austin five of the seven years, missing only 1954 and 1956. And the Bobbies have compiled the best record of any team ever to play in Baylor Gym at Waco or Gregory Gym at Austin, they have never lost a game together.

This year's state tournament may be one of the best in the Interscholastic League's history. Three High Plains teams will be entered and are expected to give the customary type of competition that has become a legend of teams from this area, and at least two 1956 state champions are returning this year to defend their titles.

Coach Johnny Ethridge's Bobbies will meet the well-regarded Seagoville Dragonettes in the first Class AA game Friday at 7:30 p.m. The last time these two teams met, it was for the 1956 state championship. The Bobbies took the crown from the defending champion Dragonettes that time, but six little sisters from Seagoville may want to even the score this year. The game is rated as a toss-up.

The other first-round Class AA game is expected to be one of the best of the tournament. This game will match Buna, last year's Class A champion, against Angleton, last year's Class AA champion. This contest is scheduled for 5:30 p.m. Friday, following the Dimmitt-Seagoville game.

The winner of the Dimmitt-Seagoville contest will meet the winner of the Buna-Angleton game Saturday at 7:30 for the Class AA state championship. The two losers will play Saturday at 1:30 p.m. for third place.

Two teams from the High Plains have emerged as solid favorites in Class A and B competition. Roosevelt, because of its six-point victory over Buna in the Class B regional finals, is seeded as one of the best teams in the tournament, regardless of walk-away with the Class B crown.

Ropesville is the favorite in Class A competition. The Ropes girls won the Region 1-A title in a walkaway, defeating Hale Center 71-45 in the finals. This will be the second trip to Austin in two weeks for Ropesville fans; their boys' team played in the state boys' tournament last week.

Buna is regarded as the team to beat in Class AA. The Buna girls are pulling an upset in the Bobbie tricks; they won the state championship in Class B last year, and are undefeated so far this season with a string of 30 straight victories. If there is a team in Texas that can beat the Buna girls, that team will have to be Angleton, Dimmitt, or Seagoville.

The Bobbies left Dimmitt Wednesday at 8 a.m. for Brownwood, where they worked out and stayed Wednesday night. They arrived in Austin Thursday morning, and were to have worked out in Gregory Gym from 2:30 to 3 p.m. Thursday.

The Bobbies will stay in the Driskill Hotel in downtown Austin.

Boys, would you like to get a box supper, a pair of socks, and a dinner companion—all in the same deal? All you have to do is show up at the Masonic Hall in Dimmitt next Friday night with a pocketful of money, a good appetite, and a pair of cold feet. The deal is open to all boys and girls from 12 through 18.

The Dimmitt Rainbow Girls will sponsor a "Sox Supper" on that night (March 22) for all youths of the county, at 6:30 p.m. in the lobby of the Masonic Lodge Hall in Dimmitt. "Sox Suppers" originally were similar to box suppers. Each girl attending would buy a pair of men's socks, fill one with food, and have the other auctioned. The high bidder for the new sock would also get the food-filled mate, plus the girl who prepared the food as a dinner companion.

The Rainbow Girls are planning a new twist to the idea, however. Girls are asked to prepare a box of food, just as for a box supper, and decorate the top of the box with a new boy's sock. The girls will then put the mate to that sock in their coat pockets, and after the bidding is over, socks will come from pockets to be matched with socks on the boxes until all the cookers and bidders are paired off.

Three Directors Will Be Elected By C-C Tuesday

Three directors will be elected and objectives for 1957 will be formulated in the Tuesday night meeting of the Castro County Chamber of Commerce. B. M. Nelson, manager, said Thursday. Nelson urged all members and prospective members of the Chamber to attend this meeting and express their opinions on what goals the Chamber should work toward in 1957.

The skull session is set for 8 p.m. Tuesday in the District Court Room of the Castro County Courthouse. The Chamber of Commerce is presently investigating the possibility of a vegetable program for the county, Nelson said, and is planning an all-county Trades Day. These topics and all others brought up will be discussed at the Tuesday night meeting.

"Please make a special effort to attend this meeting," Nelson said in a letter to members of the Chamber. "The extent of the accomplishments in the Chamber's work program will be determined by the active participation of its membership."

Exposition Building Proposals Considered

A seven-member committee has been appointed to study the possibilities of a proposed Castro Exposition Building.

In an initial meeting Friday night in the District Court Room, attended by 23 county farmers and businessmen, C. W. "Wag" Anthony of Big Square was elected temporary chairman and given authority to appoint the committee.

Those named to the committee by Anthony are Roy Taack of Hart, Jim Schwallier of Nazareth, Ivor Bagwell of Bethel, E. R. Sadler of Sunnyside, H. C. Nelson of near Dimmitt, Anthony, and Edd McLeary of Dimmitt. Ex-officio members of the committee appointed thus far are Robert Estes, county judge; Bob McLean, president of the First State Bank of Dimmitt; and B. M. Nelson, manager of the Castro County Chamber of Commerce.

This committee's first meeting will be Tuesday at 9 a.m. in the county judge's office of the Court House. Members will take a tour. Mr. Ben Vera, Floydada Baptist lay minister, announced this week he would conduct lessons in Spanish in Dimmitt if a minimum of fifteen people signed for the course.

Cost of the instruction will run \$1 per lesson of one and one-half hours each and the lessons will be given one each night for two nights a week. The course lasts about a month and may go longer, if the students so desire, Mr. Vera said. This would be eight lessons, and according to Mr. Vera would give the student a basic working knowledge of spoken Spanish.

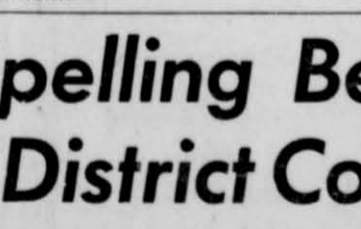

County Spelling Bee Friday At 4:15 in District Court Room

It's "antidiseestablishmentarianism" again, and school spelling champs from Nazareth and Dimmitt will gather in the District Court Room Friday to try to spell their way into the Castro County Spelling Bee championships. Elementary school winners will compete in two classifications: the Junior Bee, for students in the 6th grade or below, and the Senior Bee, for students—pardon—students through the 8th grade. To enter the Senior Bee, students must not reach their 16th birthday before June 6. The Junior Bee winner will be eligible to enter the Senior Bee.

Mr. Anthony Thursday urged everyone in the county interested in this project to meet with the committee and make the tour.

In the Friday night meeting, those attending discussed the pros and cons of such a building and what its primary purpose should be.

All present agreed that Castro County needs an all-purpose county exposition building, primarily for agricultural shows and club meetings. Such a building could be erected, it was noted, by having 5 to 7 cents added to every \$100 valuation on county taxes. This would make necessary a county-wide bond election, it was explained. With this 5- to 7-cent tax boost, it was estimated, the building would cost taxpayers of the county an average of \$5 to \$15 per year each for a model all-purpose, fire-proof building.

Mr. Anthony reported on two trips taken by groups of local citizens to study county exposition buildings; one of these trips was to Lubbock, the other was to Hereford.

"If we build such a building," Anthony said, "we could profit by asking those who already have such buildings what they would do differently, or what they would add, if they had it to do over again."

Mr. Anthony added that those who worked toward the Deaf Smith County Coliseum have told him they would slant the floors of the building slightly for better drainage after floor-washing, and that they would have made their ceiling four feet higher to meet the qualifications for professional basketball games.

Mississippi Congressman to Speak At Annual PCG Meeting Monday

The first annual meeting of the Plains Cotton Growers, Inc., a 23-county cotton producer-businessman organization formed in January, 1956 to protect and promote interests of Texas South Plains farmers and businessmen, will be held Monday in Fair Park Coliseum, Lubbock, Edd C. McLeary, Castro County Director, has announced.

The meeting will begin at 10 a.m. and producer-business members from all 23 counties are expected to attend. "More than 1,200 members attended the organizational meeting January, a year ago, and we hope to have that many or more at our first annual meeting," the director said.

Featured speaker at the first annual meeting will be Congressman Jamie L. Whitten, Mississippi Democrat who is chairman of the House Agriculture Appropriations Committee. Congressman Whitten will discuss cotton legislation in the federal government. Title of his talk is "The Farm Problem."

Congressman Whitten has played a major role in present cotton legislation and he was an active fighter for the present cotton export sales program at competitive prices. He has long been interested and active in cotton legislation. In discussing his talk in Lubbock, Whitten said he believes Benson's policy of lower prices has not increased the domestic consumption market in this country.

In addition to Whitten's address at the Monday annual meeting, W. O. Fortenberry, president of the Plains Cotton Growers, Inc., will make his annual report, a financial report of the organization will be made, and George W. Pfeifferberger, executive vice-president, will tell the membership of 1957 plans of the organization. Directors of the Plains Cotton Growers, Inc. met last Wednesday in Lubbock and completed final plans for the annual meeting. The meeting place was changed to the Fair Park Coliseum, east of Lubbock, in order to serve a free barbecue lunch at noon.

"Directors said after their Wednesday meeting that the first year for the Plains Cotton Growers, Inc. could be considered nothing but a successful year and reports to be made to the general membership Monday will show the tremendous progress made by the organization during its first year," McLeary said. All members who can possibly attend are urged to be at the first annual meeting Monday.

After having fought tooth and nail to get there, the Dimmitt Bobbies breezed through the Region 1-AA tournament in Lubbock Saturday.

The Bobbies began their regional walkaway by stomping a young Winters team, 68-53. They bested the Wellington Rockettes, 73-62, for the championship. The Bobbies scored at will and were never pushed as they built up comfortable leads early in both games.

In the semi-finals Saturday morning, the Bobbies took on Winters, a team composed mostly of sophomores and juniors, and won going away.

The Bobbies scored only 15 points, to 11 for Winters in a slow first quarter. They held a 31-20 lead at halftime, and were ahead 54-41 at the end of the third period. When the lead jumped to 21 points, 68-47, in the final quarter, Coach Johnny Ethridge sank in his second team, a luxury he could not afford against Tulia and Abernathy.

As usual, Bobbie pivot Dovie Smithson almost scared the socks off the Winters players with her scoring exhibition. When Smithson fouled out of the game in the fourth quarter, with the Bobbies ahead 59-43, the Winters girls began playing with renewed energy, as if expecting to close the 16-point gap in the remaining six minutes.

That was when Sandra Thompson, Mickey Pelley, and Ed Dena Boxer went to work. Although they had not really needed to score many points previously, they now turned the Winters girls every way but loose as they scored nine points in three minutes to increase the Bobbie lead from 16 to 21 points. Bobbie guards allowed Winters forwards only four points during this time to help ice the game.

The final minutes of the contest were played with Boozier, Lorene Taylor, and Peggy Gilbert at forwards, and Dera Cartwright, Audrea Boothe, and Tommye Sheffy at guards.

Guards Judy Maples, Myrna Finch and Kaye Killingsworth turned in good performances, although they were playing against much taller girls than themselves. Finch and Killingsworth overcame first-quarter litters to dominate rebound control throughout the game, and Maples scooted around the tall Winters forwards to get the ball back to the Dimmitt end of the court.

High scorer for the Bobbies was Smithson, who rolled up 49 points before fouling out in the fourth quarter. Pelley added 11 points to the Bobbie total. Thompson scored 6 points, and Boozier scored 2.

Ginger White led in scoring for Winters with 24 points. She was followed by Mildred Tabor, with 19, and Carolyn Faubion, who had 10.

The Wellington Rockettes had defeated Haskell, 47-32, for the bi-district championship of 5-AA and 6-AA, and overran Granbury, 52-39, in the semi-finals of the regional tournament Saturday morning at Lubbock.

The bubble broke for the Rockettes, however, when they tangled with the Dimmitt Bobbies in the regional finals. All the Rockettes found themselves on the short end of a 25-12 score at the end of the first quarter and could never get within striking distance of the Bobbies afterward.

The Bobbies played a cautious, no-mistakes-allowed type of basketball during the first quarter, using ball-control and scoring as many points as possible with safe shots—a standard procedure against any unfamiliar opponent. The Rockettes weren't up to the Bobbies' type of competition, however, and when the smoke cleared, the Bobbies had downed the Rockettes, 73-62, to become champions of Region 1-AA.

The Bobbies won the game in the first quarter with the 12-point lead they ran up during that period. They increased their lead to 14 points, 39-25, at halftime; again held a 12-point lead, 55-43, at the end of the third quarter; and won the game by 11 points, 73-62.

Compared with games in district and bi-district competition, the Bobbies' regional championship game was slow; they kept a comfortable margin throughout the game and the Rockettes couldn't score fast enough to push the Bobbies into any serious trouble. After the first quarter, the game was virtually a point-for-point match, with 11 to 14 points separating the two teams. Pivot Dovie Smithson again tallied most of the Bobbies' points by accounting for 44. Sandra (See BOBBIES, Page 6)

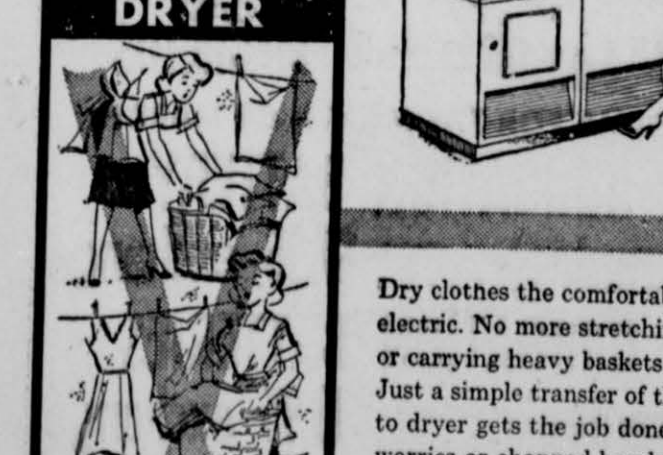
