highly informative volume, the Washington telephone book, is out. Its listings reflect, as usual, the rise and fall of various businesses and professions. After a careful perusal of its pages it can be reported the "influence business" is booming. National statistics are not available but Washington must have more lawyers per acre than any other city in the country. The classified listing gives 25 columns to the lawyers. At an average

of hundred names to a column, that makes 2500. And that doesn't live the thousands of lawyers who work for the government. It these days around publicity and public relations business is in a healthy state. Field, near Houston. too. Whereas a few years ago the book carried few such listing, there are now 53 firms or individuals which practice the art known show business as "flackery."

The most fascinating pages, however, are those devoted to associations. The association business, next to the government itself, is probably Washington's biggest.

Recently the names "federation," "conference," "council," and "foundation" have been popular, but the most favored term currently is

Many of these associations are in Washington because the gov-ernment has such a great influence on business. Some are there because the government is itself a source of large orders. Others are in the nation's capital purely for reasons of prestige. But nearly all of them are engaged in influencing somebody or other-most often Congress, or the departments, or frequently even each other. Out of their offices go hundreds of news letters, magazines and other publications, all purporting to give the inside stuff to the mem-bers back home who foot the bills. Collectively the bill must be mendous. Many of the executives of these groups receive \$15,000

or \$25,000 or more a year. THE influence business among the lawyers is also good. By no. means all of them engage in activities other than the practice of law. But the number who make money on the basis of their friendships and influence is large. There is one lawyer listed who has never been known to practice. His specialty is knowing important people. For a fee he can arrange a luncheon with nearly any im-

All told, the number of influence boys must run into the thou-sands. But the Washington telephone directory does not have a
