Dines and Miller will discuss all phases of wheat improvement and Dines, an expert on analyzing of wheat samples, will be glad to analyze any farmers sample to determine if there are several varieties of wheat present in that which he will use for seed wheat.

Boys Between Ages 18-25 Would Learn Trades in Much Dema Now-City School Might Get As Much As \$1400 Worth of Good

Castro County, Dimmitt and the Dimmitt Public Schools again this year have an opportunity to secure a mechanical training school youth of the county not in public schools between the ages of 18-25. Highly trained instructors from A. & M. College are available to such projects, and youth may learn mechanical work which is undoubted becoming increasingly important in this mechanized age.

To secure an approximate \$1400 worth of equipment and trained instructor from the government, the county, city and school must build an adequate building on the school property. 
