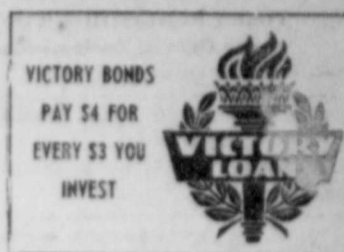

ANNIVERSARY OF X-RAYS OBSERVED

CHICAGO (UP)—Fifty years ago, an obscure physics professor at the University of Wurzburg, Bavaria, covered a Crookes tube with an opaque piece of cardboard and observed a weird glow reflecting from a piece of barium platinocyanide paper on a nearby table.

That was the way X-ray was born and the eyes of the medical profession opened to undreamed-of wonders.

The discoverer was Wilhelm Conrad Roentgen, a modest man whose previous life gave no hint that he was to present mankind with one of its greatest gifts.

In celebration of the golden jubilee of his discovery, the American College of Radiology has designated the week of Nov. 5-10 to pay tribute to Roentgen.

Not until more than two months later did Roentgen announce that he had discovered a new invisible ray which could pass through opaque materials.

Curiously enough, many could think only evil of the new ray which could "see" through almost anything. A new Jersey assemblyman, whose sense of decency was aroused by reports that the ray could penetrate clothing, introduced a bill prohibiting the use of X-ray in opera glasses.

Today, X-ray is widely used in the treatment of growths such as tumors and cancers. Skin diseases which defy ordinary forms of treatment respond favorably to X-ray.

X-ray also has been found beneficial in the treatment of various types of blood diseases.

The clothing of flesh and muscle over hearts, lungs, bones, gall bladder and other internal parts is stripped away by the X-ray, enabling the doctor to see with his own eyes what is wrong with the patient.

CHAIRMAN REPORTS ON BOND SALE

The following report was issued today by Cyrus Frost of Eastland county chairman of the Victory Loan drive, with reference to the progress of the drive.

Eastland County's quota for the Victory and last loan has been set at \$470,000, \$230,000 of which is to be in Series E bonds, which will be credited to the respective cities where purchased, as well as all other securities that are bought to make up our full quota.

Eastland County is in the Fort Worth District and this district contains 59 counties. At the close of business Saturday night Eastland County had sold more than 50,000 Series E bonds and 45,000 of the other issues.

JONES DENIES INCOME TAX EVASION GUILT

DALLAS, (UP)—Denial of guilt and readiness to go to trial to prove innocence was the rebuttal to a charge of income tax evasion made today by Joe H. Jones, former assistant district attorney.

The indictment charging Jones with income tax evasion will be heard at the January term of court, said Federal District Attorney Bob Young.

Jones posted a \$2,500 bond before United States Commissioner John Davis yesterday. Denying charges of income tax evasion, he said, "on February 14 I voluntarily filed an amended tax return set out in the indictment and paid the full amount."

CIO INSISTS CONFERENCE GO ON RECORD FOR RAISES

WASHINGTON (UP)—The labor-management conference headed toward a possible explosion today over wages.

The Congress of Industrial Organizations accepted a challenge from other labor forces which were prepared to battle against inclusion of the wage issue on the conference agenda.

As the conference executive committee met for its initial session, CIO President Philip Murray told reporters the CIO would ask that the agenda be broadened to include wages.

He said the CIO wanted the conference to go on record as saying "that there is now room" in the wage-price structure for higher pay.

WINDSOR, Ont. (UP)—Ford of Canada officials today for the first time formally entered discussion—called negotiations—to settle the spreading strike of 20,000 CIO United Auto Workers.

Laud Michigan Physicist For Role In Fuse

ANN ARBOR, Mich. (UP)—The role a University of Michigan physicist played in developing and perfecting the radio-controlled anti-aircraft shell—a weapon ranked second only to the atomic bomb—has been revealed.

Navy experts described the shell as "instrumental in stopping the Germans at the battle of the Bulge," and attributed the failure of the Japanese Kamikaze to its effectiveness.

Work on the secret project was begun in 1941 by associate professor...

of physics H. R. Crane of the University of Michigan together with 25 hand picked assistants.

Before the monumental job was completed more than 50 scientists throughout the nation had applied their technological brains to the project.

The professor and his aides set up equipment in a gravel pit outside Ann Arbor, where they conducted countless experiments for four years.

Briefly, the shell consists of a five tube radio transmitter and receiver—so small it can be held in the hand of a child—in addition to the explosive.

The radio automatically sets off the shell fuse when the projectile is within 70 feet of any target.

Previously, the Navy engineers pointed out, shell fuses had to be set for certain heights at the gun before they were fired.

Error in judgement were frequent and direct hits few, the Navy reported, as the old shells exploded regardless of the location of the target, once set.

But with the new controlled fuse, a staggering toll of enemy planes was accounted for by anti-aircraft gunners during the closing phase of the war.

While design of the new shell was underway, scientists all agreed that for highest effectiveness the shell had to reach a certain point 70 feet in front of the plane before explosion.

While many others contributed to the final development of the weapon, it is reported that Prof. Crane's work in solving the fundamental problem was invaluable.

The Ann Arbor physicist and his associates set by miniature gun emplacements in the gravel pits and flew thousands of model copper planes over them in countless tests.

Manufacturing concerns have meantime indicated that the ray radio set is highly adaptable for peacetime use in portable radios and in many other remote controlled appliances.

EASTLAND, Nov. 6 — A returned soldier of World War I was charged with aggravated assault following his alleged attack Monday morning on County Health Officer F. T. Isbell. Dr. Isbell was attacked in his office. He was not seriously injured.

Hat Marks Spot

TOKIO, Texas (UP) — Stacks of mail bags that piled up here daily during the war bearing inquiries about this little town, name sake of Japan's capital city, will diminish as peace years roll on.

But Postmaster Dellis E. Green and his wife, Mrs. Ara Green, will never forget the somewhat questionable fame brought to their little town during the war. Thousands wrote wanting to know what Tokio, Texas, was like and source of its name. Nearly 1,000 such letters deluged the little post office after V-J Day.

Located in Terry County 60 miles southwest of Lubbock and 20 miles from Brownfield, home of the nearest doctor, this is a little agricultural spot of 200 persons with sorghums, corn, hay, wheat and barley. Also doing well are the dairy industry, beef cattle, sheep, good soil and crops of cotton, grain hogs and horses raised for market.

To answer the numerous questions about the town, Mrs. Green probed archives for the history

of Tokio, Texas.

"Tokio," she said, "is a peaceful town with one cotton gin and two churches, Baptist and Nazarene." She discovered that a now deceased Mrs. Ware settled in the community 36 years ago and felt the need of a post office, so she started handling the mail.

The postmaster general wrote Mrs. Ware requesting a name for her post office. Mrs. Ware suggested two names, one of which was Tokio. She selected the name of Tokio to connote the remoteness of the little community she was living in.

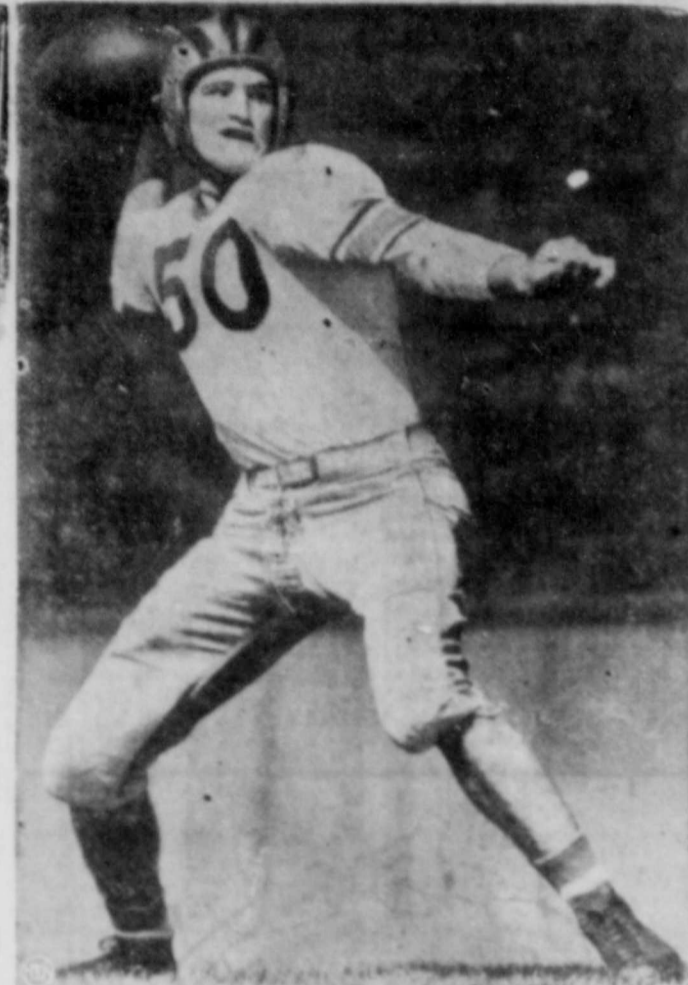

Army Getting 1000 Men A Day In Campaign

Fast track men a day are joining the Regular Army according to reports received this week from the War Department.

At Camp Bowie's Recruiting Center, some 2500 men have enlisted as of October 27, taking advantage of the many new provisions under the new Recruiting Act passed by Congress.

They wait another attractive provision was offered to men who want to enlist for three years, a choice of 30 days at their own station in which he is now serving, such an enlistee will not be sent to a reception center for training in other words, you can take off in that 30-day furlough and report back to your unit.

One of the most interesting recruiting stories this week which bears out the Army's promise of giving the reenlisted man his choice on a three-year hitch, concerned Staff Sgt. Leroy Thomas.

Sergeant Thomas was discharged on June 7, this year after serving three years and four months. Prior to that he served seven years in the National Guard and came here with the 26th Division. Holding 88 points, he became eligible for discharge and when he heard about the new provisions for reenlisting, came back in for three more years.

According to Thomas, he can do better in the Army from a financial standpoint than on the outside. His outside income he figured was less than his Army pay after all deductions for taxes, social security, insurance, etc., were made. This, Sergeant Thomas, a married man with three children, plans to make the Army his career.

The big factor, however, was this: Sergeant Thomas was in charge of Military Police patrols in Brownwood while on duty here and therefore, requested through Captain Frank J. Husband, chief, Military Police Corps, that he go back to his old outfit. He not only got his old outfit back, but also his old job, according to Captain Husband. His assignment was in accordance with War Department circular that provides for "favoring the soldier's desire for branch, station and theatre of operations on a three-year enlistment."
