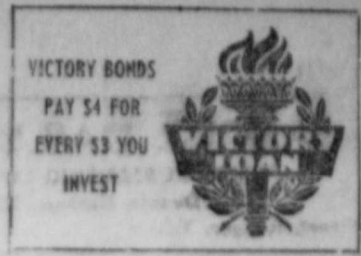

Mrs. S. W. Bobo, for 23 years a resident of Ranger, died early this morning, November 8, in a Ft. Worth Hospital following a brief illness. The body was returned to Ranger today by Killingsworth's Funeral home and services will be held Saturday afternoon at 3:00 o'clock in church.

EXPECT G. I. BILL TO BE LIBERALIZED

WASHINGTON (UP)—House and Senate veterans' spokesmen predicted today that an amendment liberalizing loan and education features of the G. I. Bill of Rights would be approved by a conference committee within a week. The Senate bill would remove the 25-year age limit and extend it to the present law and make any veteran eligible for college or vocational training under the G. I. Bill.

COLLECTIVE BARGAINING IS ACCEPTED

WASHINGTON (UP)—The labor management conference today successfully negotiated collective bargaining shakhs which wrecked a similar parity after World War I. Conference Secretary George W. Taylor announced that all of the six working committees, now exploring bases for industrial peace, have fully endorsed the principles of collective bargaining.

CHAIRMAN REPORTS ON CHEST DRIVE

Morris Knight, Ranger chairman for the United War Chest drive, reported today that a total of \$1,163.25 has been collected in the campaign so far. Knight's quota is \$2,750. The sum reported represents collections by 12 committees, two of which have completed their work. Sixteen committees have not reported to headquarters.

REVEALS AIR FORCE PEACE TIME WISHES

WASHINGTON (UP)—Gen. James H. Doolittle disclosed today that Army air forces want a post-war fleet of 5,000 combat planes ready for instant use, 400,000 officers and men, plus an air national guard "as large as the states can stand."

TRUMAN SIGNS BILL FOR 1ST TAX CUT IN SIXTEEN YEARS

WASHINGTON (UP)—The White House announced today that President Truman last night signed the 1946 income tax bill, giving the nation a \$5,220,000,000 tax cut, the first in 16 years. The new measure becomes effective Jan. 1 and applies to 1946 income. It is not retroactive.

GEORGIA PLANS EXPRESS ROADS FOR SIX CITIES

ATLANTA, Ga. (UP)—Express highway systems to relieve increasing postwar traffic congestion in the heart of six principal Georgia cities are being planned by state highway officials. State highway director-engineer George T. McDonald said that surveys have been made of highway facilities to and through Atlanta, Brunswick, Savannah, Columbus, Macon, Rome and Waycross. Recommendations for city highway development will be submitted to municipal and county authorities for their consideration within the next few months, he said.

GAME TO BE CALLED AT 8 P. M.

The Bulldog-Lobo football game will be called promptly at 8:00 o'clock tonight at the Lobo stadium in Cisco. Officials stated today that the game will be played despite the fact that freezing weather and rains were threatening.

Planes Crash In Mid-Air; Believe 21 Men Killed

CORPUS CHRISTI, Tex. (UP)—Navy officials announced today that two mariners' long range patrol sea planes—collided in midair at 8:06 p. m. last night near Spoil Island in Corpus Christi bay with 21 officers and men presumed killed. The planes were about 300 feet off the water, one landing and the other in the process of taking off, when they crashed. One attempted a landing, but the pilot was evidently unable to maintain control, and crashed into the sea. The other crashed immediately. Both sank.

Holiday Change Necessitated By World War II

AUSTIN, Tex. (UP)—Marshall, Texas, city fathers aroused ire of the American Legion when they suggested that Armistice Day November 11, be abandoned as a holiday. Presuming one holiday will finally be settled upon to keep fresh the memory of World War Two, the state may have to consider abolishment of one of its present 11 authorized holidays.

Twin Brothers To Return To Missionary Work

FORT WORTH, Tex. (UP)—Even though their missionary father was murdered years ago by Chinese bandits, and they themselves have recently been liberated from three years Jap imprisonment in the Philippines, two brothers are returning to China to do missionary work. The 37-year-old twin brothers are Rev. John W. Vinson Jr. and Dr. Charles Vinson. The two missionaries were 17 years old when their father, an itinerant missionary with headquarters in Hanchow, was killed.

Determines Hogs Butchering Time By Three Kicks

AUSTIN, Tex. (UP)—State Rep. Claude Calloway of Crowell, who visited the state capital on business last week, has a nifty way of determining when his hogs are ready to be made into hams, bacon and sausage. There are three trots (or actually three kicks) to the process and no scales are involved. In Farmer Calloway's words, here's how it is done: "You walk up to the hog all stretched out on the ground. You take your toe and judge him in the side. Then he grunts. You're supposed to nudge him again. This time the hog gets up on his rear humpers. "Then the third time you kick him, he'll get up. That means he's ready. Hogs that run off squealing the first or second time you kick them aren't fat enough for killing."

Murder Trial To Be Held By Childress Court

CHILDRESS, Tex. (UP)—Elbert Thompson will go on trial November 12 charged with murder in the killing of Lem Savage, Amarillo detective. Thompson will be brought here from the federal penitentiary at Leavenworth, Kansas, where he is serving a 99-year sentence for a kidnaping Miss Betty Jim Shelton of Amarillo after the Savage shooting. The trial was moved from Canyon to Childress where efforts to obtain a jury failed. Previously the case had been moved to Canyon from Amarillo on a change of venue.

Two-Way Bowling

ERIE, Pa. (UP) Two-way miniature bowling is catching on fast at the boys' club here. Instead of the bowlers rolling from one end of the alley, one player rolls from each end, replacing each other's downed pins. It's a duck-pin affair. The boys can't run before releasing the ball, but premier results showed scores are just as effective.

Three Back From Municipalities Meet In Austin

Mayor J. J. Kelly, E. T. Eubank and L. R. Pearson have returned from Austin where they attended the annual meeting of the League of Texas Municipalities. Sessions were mainly devoted to discussions of postwar plans for cities and postwar finances. Practically every department of city government was up for discussion, and those who attended it regarded the meeting as entirely worthwhile.

SAYS TEXAS HAS MATERIALS FOR INDUSTRIAL EXPANSION

AUSTIN, Texas—Texas has the agricultural and forest raw materials; chemical minerals; industrial and manufacturing materials, structural and building materials, and metals necessary for the development of great industries according to research by Elmer H. Johnson, head of natural resources for the University of Texas Bureau of Business Research. "That we are standing upon the threshold of a new era, both scientifically and industrially speaking, may at first seem but a repetition of a trite expression; however, henceforth, science and industry and research will for the first time in the world's history become global in their inclusiveness," he declared. "Economic research concerned with the fundamental aspects and problems of industry growth and its extension on a global scale, as based upon the availability and accessibilities of raw materials on the one hand, and of the dynamics of industrial evolution in the structure of an expanding economy on the other hand, is also just as essential as scientific research, if we are to view fully the actualities of the world we live in."

AUSTIN, Texas — The movement for junior colleges in Texas is getting underway in several cities and counties. Dr. C. C. Colvert, University of Texas professor — consultant in junior college education — reports.

S.M.U. will travel to College Station to engage the Texas A. & M. College in the other Conference fray of the afternoon. Vas Box will be on hand to do the play-by-play while Dick Bush will add color. This contest will hit the air at 2:15 p. m., over stations KRLD-Dallas, KTRH - Houston, KAHG-San Antonio, WTAW-College Station, and KWBU - Corpus Christi.

Among the cities considering setting up junior colleges for their immediate counties and territories are Alvin, Big Spring, Childress, Sweetwater, Pampa and Wharton county.

An inter-sectional game will bring T.C.U. to Lubbock to do battle with Texas Tech. Broadcast of this game will start at 2:15 p. m. with Dave Russell calling the plays and Alec Chesser the color. This game can be heard over WRR-Dallas, KFJZ - Ft. Worth, KRBC-Abilene, KBWD - Brownwood, KBST - Big Spring, KRLH-Midland, KGKL - San Angelo, KPYO-Lubbock, and KTHT - Houston.

Dr. Colvert has been conferring with officials of those cities, discussing the possibilities of setting up the colleges, giving them the benefit of his long period of service in the junior college field along the lines of curriculum, building plans, and qualifications for the teaching personnel.

"Alvin will have one of the unique, and model plans, if they go through with plans now being formulated," Dr. Colvert said. "Tentative plans made by the Alvin school board call for six grades in the elementary schools, four in high school, and four in junior college. If this plan is followed, there will be no break between high school and the first year of junior college."

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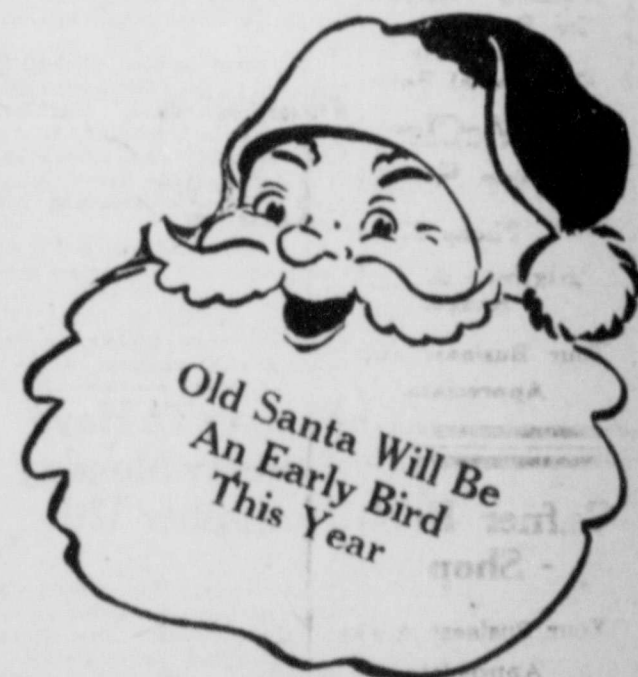
After All's Said And Done -

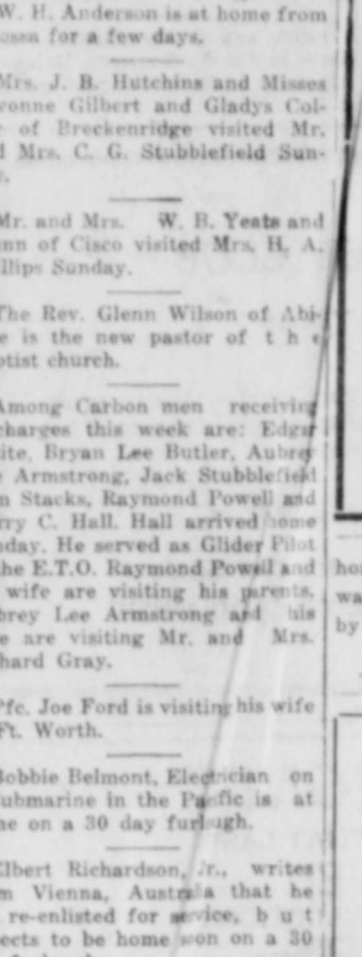
