Texas Trucking Industry Pays \$33,531 to County

Austin, January 16-The Texas trucking industry last year paid taxes to Castro County amounting to \$33,531.67, Lynn B. Shaw. general manager of the Texas Motor Transportation Association.

reported today.

Shaw said the amount represented \$30,476.87 for highway construction and maintenance, and \$3,054.80 for the public schools of Castro County. For each scholastic in the state, the truckers paid \$2.80, an increase of 31 cents over the pervious year. An amount equal to the school fund was distributed to counties to absorb bonds for road building purposes.

For highway and school purposes alone, the Texas trucking industry last year paid taxes in excess of fourteen million dollars.
