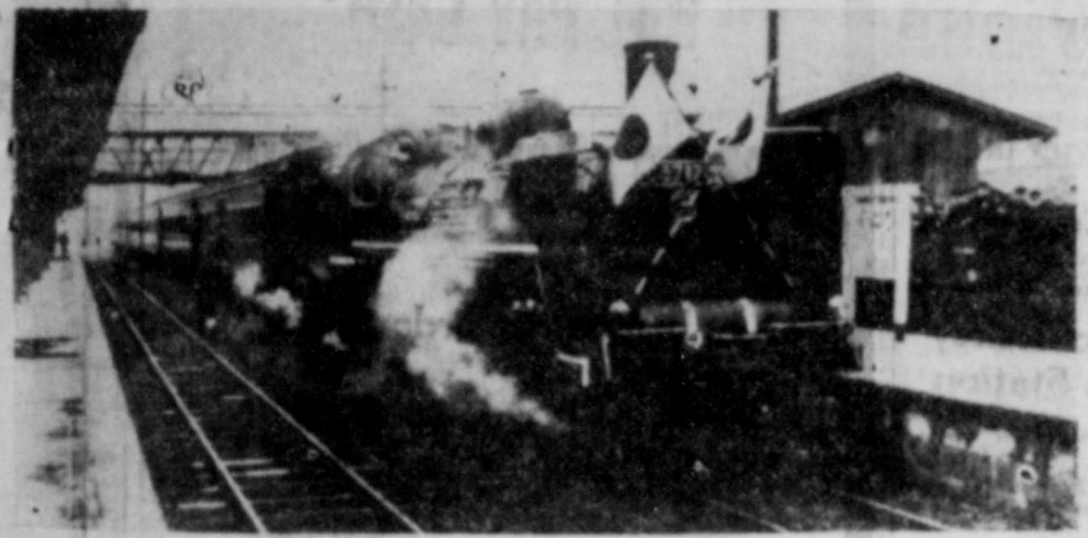


Emperor Arrives At Unebi

A-BOMB SECRECY OBSOLETE SAYS WOMAN SCIENTIST

TROY, N. Y. (UP)—The "great secrecy" surrounding the atom bomb is "overdone" now, in the opinion of a leading woman scientist who has been doing research on radioactive substances.

Dr. Hertz R. Leng, physics professor at Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute, who flatly predicts that atomic energy will be available for industrial use within a few years, says Americans must face the fact that there are no real secrets about the atomic bomb. Moreover, she said, the official report on development of the bomb, including "all the basic information needed for another country to develop the bomb," is now on sale for \$1.25.

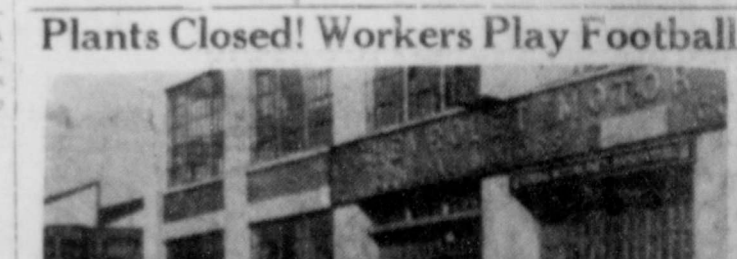

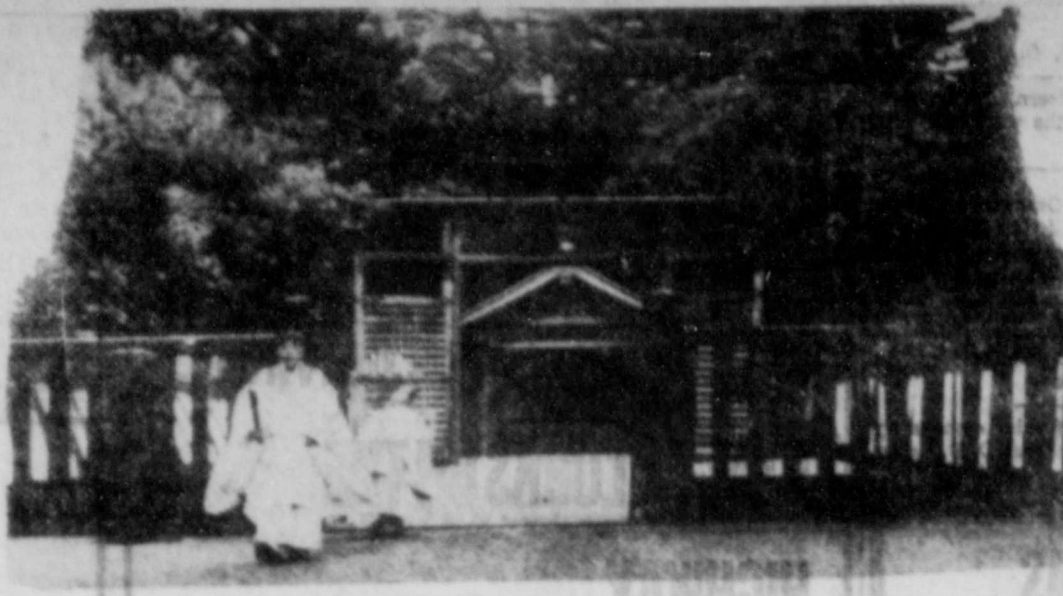
