

A-BOMB SECRECY OBSOLETE SAYS WOMAN SCIENTIST

ASKS GIFTS FOR YANKS WHO GAVE

TROY, N. Y. (UPI) — The "great secrecy" surrounding the atom bomb is "overdone" now, in the opinion of a leading woman scientist who has been doing research on radioactive substances.

Dr. Hertz R. Leng, physics professor at Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute, who flatly predicts that atomic energy will be available for industrial use within a few years, says Americans must face the fact that there are no real secrets about the atomic bomb. Moreover, she said, the official report on development of the bomb, including "all the basic information needed for another country to develop the bomb," is now on sale for \$1.25.

Doctor Leng, a slight vibrant refugee Australian, said that atomic energy may continue to be too expensive to justify its use for industrial power, but insists it will be "available," probably within two or three years, but certainly within 19.

"It might take a year or two, or three—and a considerable amount of money" for another country to develop a nuclear bomb, Doctor Leng admitted, but she said there is no doubt that the so-called secrets could be worked out by an competent group of engineers.

"Germany," she said, "would not be able to do so for financial and control reasons, but certainly the Russians could."

Citing examples of vital technical information made public in the official report, Doctor Leng pointed to the section dealing with the development and use of plutonium instead of the U-238 isotope of uranium.

There was, she feels, "no reason whatsoever" to disclose the use of this substance if the United States wanted to keep the bomb a secret. No one, she added, "would have known we were using plutonium."

In common with many of the scientists who have worked on radioactivity, Doctor Leng believes the only answer to control of the atomic bomb is international control. It should, she insists, be turned over to an international organization of scientists, chosen as much for their "sense of responsibility" as for their scientific ability.

Ranger Man Saw American Flag Raised In Japan

Aboard the USS Tangier—Gaines Carlton Blanksberg, Jr., seaman, first class, USNR, Ranger, Texas, 116 East Main St., saw the Stars and Stripes raised over Ommito, Japan, while serving aboard this seaplane tender, a veteran of Pearl Harbor and one of the first to open fire on Jap aircraft during the sneak attack.

The Tangier, participant in the Admiralty Islands, New Guinea, Morotai and Philippine campaigns, tended planes of Black Cat squadrons which in the Philippines and Morotai alone sank or knocked out 116,000 tons of Jap shipping and damaged another 56,500 tons.

Ranger tried to get her passing attack going, but never could get it to work. Everytime Ranger would throw a long pass, they would get it intercepted. DeGaulle Gets Unanimous Vote Of Confidence

PARIS (UPI) — Gen Charles De Gaulle won a unanimous vote of confidence from the French assembly today after delivering a vigorous statement of policy in which he demanded an equal voice for France in all big power decisions on atomic energy and other world problems.

The program will hold office until the Fourth Republic comes into being next year, was endorsed without an opposing vote by all parties in the assembly.

The vote was taken at the close of his foreign and domestic policy statement in which he proposed international control of the atom bomb, a major role for France in world affairs, and nationalization of key French industries.

LTC E. MAY IN STATES FROM PACIFIC

Mr. and Mrs. C. E. May had a very pleasant Thanksgiving surprise Thursday when they received a telephone call from their son, Lt. C. E. May, Jr., whose ship had just docked at San Diego.

This is the first time that Lt. May has been back to the States since the signing of peace. He has been operating between Manila, Okinawa, Yokohama and Tokyo. He told his parents that his ship will proceed from San Diego, through the Panama canal to the Atlantic coast.

Lt. May is also a veteran of the European war, having served in the Mediterranean during the battle for Italy and Germany. He was sent to the Pacific two days before the German surrender. He has been in the service of the Navy serving on a destroyer, for more than three years.

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


