## Cost-Of-Living Pay Rises Keep Cleveland Plant Going In High

CLEVELAND (UP) — James P. Lincoln these days just leans back in his chair in his president's office at the Lincoln Electric Co., here and watches the country's labor strife. Lincoln Electric has never been bothered by any.

It may sound simple but if you produce twice as much the cost is cut in half. Your cost of living is reduced because prices will be forced down and at the same time you will be paid more for turning out more products.

Every time the Department of Labor's cost of living index goes up, there is an equal percentage increase given to the employees. No one has to remind the "boss" about a raise. It comes automatically. There is a provision for cuts in any pay if the living standard goes down, but it has never been used.

## Urges That U. S. Delegates Know Major Languages

WASHINGTON (UP) — Sen. Elmer Thomas, D. Okla., suggested that American representatives abroad be taught all major world languages so they will know what is going on at international conferences.

"We must not only know what the other delegates say and write, but we must know exactly what the spoken and written words mean — in whatever language," Thomas told the Senate in a report on the recent Food and Agriculture Organization conference in Quebec.

Paris recalled Berlin a 3rd Paris conference after the first world war, and said that the American delegations, knowledge of languages was so scant that some of the delegates still are wondering what happened there.

"As a national policy," he said, "steps should be taken immediately to train personnel for the special work of looking after our interests not only at home but abroad."

In the meanwhile, he said, American delegates to forthcoming conferences should be picked partly because of the linguistic ability. He emphasized he was not criticizing the U. S. representatives at the Quebec conference, which was conducted in English.

WASHINGTON, D. C.—A first, raw statistics picture of U. S. labor union finances on a national scale has just been released by the Bureau of Internal Revenue in a compilation of returns on the 1943 income of tax-exempt organizations.

This matter of big union finances has become increasingly controversial over the last few years. There has been agitation to force unions to incur personal, like business, and to pay taxes on their incomes, also like business corporations.

Aside from these objections, congressmen haven't been able to move toward financial control over the unions because there was no place to go to find out the condition of the union treasuries.

In the compilation of returns from over 28,000 labor organizations reporting in 1943, the gross labor union income is shown to be over 390 million dollars.

In the Treasury's breakdown of union income, seven reported gross for the year of over five million dollars each.

MANY unions are known to have bought war bonds to the limit of their treasury funds. Interest payments to the unions on the investments are put at over a million a year.

About 83 per cent of the unions' 1943 income was reported as expense. The total was 323 millions, leaving 67 millions as union profits or reserves for the year.

Report On the War

By General George C. Marshall

Biennial Report of the Chief of Staff of the U. S. Army 1943 to 1945, to the Secretary of War

This is the fifth of 42 installments of material selected from General Marshall's report on the winning of World War II.

THE STRATEGIC CONCEPT

THE period covered by my first two Biennial Reports was a time of great danger for the United States. The element on which the security of this nation most depended was time—time to organize our tremendous resources and time to deploy them overseas in a world-wide war.

In no other period of American history have the colors of the United States been carried victoriously on so many battlefields. It is with profound satisfaction and great pride in the troops and their leaders that this report is submitted on the campaigns which crushed Italy, Germany and Japan.

It is necessary to an understanding of the Army's participation in these campaigns that reference be made to the decisions which launched them. The forces of the United States and Great Britain were deployed under a single strategic control exercised by the group known as the Combined Chiefs of Staff.

The President and the Prime Minister, with the advice of the Combined Chiefs of Staff, made the decision at this first confer-

ence that our resources would be concentrated first to defeat Germany, the greater and closer enemy, and then Japan.

AFRICAN LANDINGS DECIDED ON

After prolonged discussions, it became evident that the only operation that could be undertaken with a fair prospect of success that year was TORCH, the assault on North Africa.

We have since learned that the German plan at that time was to attempt the defeat of Britain by aerial bombardment and by destruction of her army and resources in the Middle East.

For 10 years up until the spring of 1944, the farm produced only needlegrass and weeds, according to the article. This year 170 goats grazed hairy vetch on the place for two months. Also there were 15 head of cattle, three horses and 30 sheep on the farm. In addition to the grazing, Mr. Clark realized 4,600 pounds of vetch seed, valued at more than \$500.

In rebuilding the depleted soil, Clark cut the needlegrass and other vegetation in October a year ago, and seeded rice and vetch. Last summer the field was mowed to control competition of undesirable plants. Texas' Top 4-H'ers in 1945

TEXAS' 1945 winners in the 1945 4-H Meat Animal, Victory Garden, Dairy Production and Soil Conservation programs, named by the state club officers, and brief outlines of their club records, are as follows:



Dietrich J. Gombler, Jr., Henry Schacht, Earl Edwards Jr., Ernest Hardwick

Dietrich J. Gombler, Jr., 26, of San Antonio, receives a 17-jewel gold watch from Thomas E. Wilson, Chicago, for having the highest scoring record in the 1945 National 4-H Meat Animal award program. During six years in club work the boy handled seven...

Henry Schacht, 15, of Lockney, has been named Texas' entrant to be considered for sectional honors in the National 4-H Victory Garden Activity, awards in which are provided by the Sears-Roebuck Foundation. His 4-H record shows that he raised a total of one acre of garden during six years of club work. Henry won a \$25.00 War Bond in the state contest in 1943. He states in his record: "I have been a club member six years, holding office and positions of leadership most of this time and have felt a great deal of pride in my 4-H club work and in doing my small bit to help feed a nation at war."

\*The sectional award is an all-expense trip to the National 4-H Club Congress, Chicago.

Earl Edwards Jr., 16, of Florida, is the state's entrant to compete for a sectional award\* in the National 4-H Dairy Production Activity. During six years in club work the boy developed a purebred Jersey heifer that returned him \$7,000.71, including \$267.39 in cash prizes. He showed the grand champion and reserve champion Jersey at the Florida County show and won showmanship at the Plains Panshandle Dairy show in 1943-44. spark—finally has had its picture taken. Previously, ordinary cameras recorded little of the actual structure of the troublesome spark. A device had to be designed that could catch up with the actual movements of electrons in a spark discharge.

The result was the Westinghouse cathode-ray oscillograph, an electronic instrument capable of making the most minute pictorial measurements of electrical movements. The functions of the cathode-ray oscillograph as a camera of electrical discharges were revealed in Detroit by Edward W. Beck, protective device engineer of the Westinghouse Electric Corp.

Basically, the oscillograph is a large sloping tube with an electron gun at one end and a flat, round fluorescent plate or screen at the other. When the tube is charged, a beam of electrons is shot at the screen causing it to glow. Numerous magnetic devices in the tube control the movements of the beam of electrons as it strikes the screen. Introduced through these magnetic controls, the movements of electrons in a spark are easily charted on the fluorescent plate.

As Beck puts it: "The impulses present in electrical discharges—such as the spark—once impressed on a cathode-ray tube cause the electronic beam to 'write' a complete record of all changes on the fluorescent screen." The effect is similar to the ordinary process of photography, he said. But in the oscillograph, flashes traveling 5,000 miles an hour are recorded. Everyday cameras never record speeds much above several hundred miles an hour. Beck predicted that the oscillograph will find increasing use in peacetime in the study of transmission-line faults in insulation.

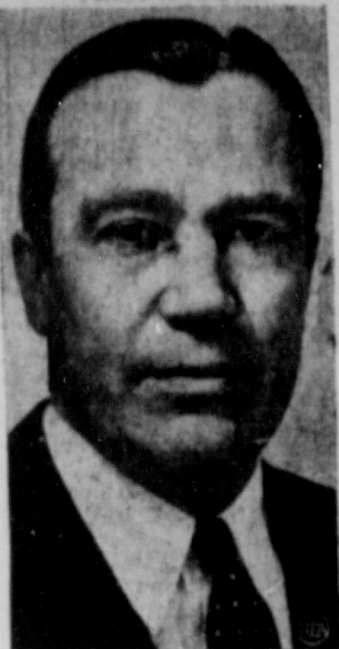

## ENLIGHTENED PEOPLE ONLY PEACE HOPE

AUSTIN, Texas — Our only assurance of peace is an enlightened world, says Dr. J. Lloyd Mecham, professor of government at the University of Texas, who is protesting against Congress' slashing appropriations to curtail an international cultural and education program.

"The United States should vigorously prosecute cultural relations programs, initiated during the war, more so than ever, because understanding is the means of peace," he pointed out.

"In the past we have been too compromising as to our policy toward Argentina and Spain, and this has caused people to wonder just where the United States stands on the question of democracy.

"We should have a militant aggressiveness in our stand on democracy, the vital preservative of peace."

A world in which all peoples have equal freedom and unrestricted information, which exists only in democracies, must be the goal, otherwise there can be no reciprocal understanding.

"We don't fear people. What we fear are the irresponsible rulers—the dictators. If popular control
