Bee Improvement Seen In Breeding Experiments

bees can be developed through artificial breeding, according to . L. Farrar, in charge of the North Central State Bee Culture aboratory, operated by the fedral department of agriculture and niversity of Wisconsin on the Wisconsin campus,

Artificial breeding, Farrar exlained can improve honeybee stock by selecting outstanding type drones to sire broods.

Recent improvements in the technique of artificial insemination, some of which were worked out at the Madison Laboratory have overcome former disadvantages in artificial breeding. Farrar Commander Hazard pointed out said that artificially bred queens now compare favorably with naturally-mated ones in egg laying, survival and the yield of honey from their colonies.

He believed that artificial breeding would not be widely used by to get improved honeybee stocks developed through artificial breed-

Department of Justice economists and lawyers keep a routine check on many big U. S. corporations. Sometimes there to ms spend a couple of years or more investigating before grand jury proceedings are begun, indictments obtained and court action is filed.

As a matter of open court record, the government has had General

Motors on the pan for over six years. Action was begun in November, 1939. In 1941 a criminal conviction was obtained in federal court at South Bend, Ind., against General Motors, General Motors Acceptance Corp., General Motors Sales Corp., and General Motors Acceptance Corp. of Indiana. In brief and non-technical language, the charge was that these corporations required General Motors dealers to finance their car sales exclusively through GM facilities, in restraint of trade and in violation of the Sherman Anti-Trust Act.

SHORTLY after the criminal conviction was handed down, the Anti-Trust Division of the Department of Justice began a civil action on the same grounds. That case has been pending in Chicago for four years. The case has not been set for triat.

The mere fact that a corporation is big does not make it a monopoly in 1941, the last full year in which automobiles were manufactured. General Motors produced 47 per cent of the cars sold. Chrysler was second with about 25 per cent and Ford third with 20 per cent. General Motors' fixed assets in 1941 were over a billion dollars. Its net sales were \$2,435,000,000, its net income \$201,000,000.

NUMBER of trade practices in the automobile industry as a whole are known to have been under study. In 1940 the Federal Trade Commission investigated auto industry sales practices. The pressure which manufacturers put on dealers to take more cars than they can self was criticized in a report of over 1000 pages. To some degree

Many charges have been made that lower costs in production have not been passed on to the consumers. At the beginning of the war the industry had developed along lines where for all practical pur-poses there is little competition in price lines, the real competition being in style and sales cumpaigns.



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


