

## A New Island Is Born



A new island is born 200 miles off the main Japanese island of Honshu as huge smoking rocks from the bottom of the ocean push upward through boiling water. The topographical phenomenon has been going on since at least Feb. 14 when a British war ship in the area made the discovery and from a available information there is no indication of any decrease in the speed with which the island is rising. It has already reached a height of about 75 to 80 feet in some spots and is about 150 to 200 yards in size. An observer's opinion of the upshooting island is that it is a continuation of a chain of volcanic islands running south from Honshu which extend all the way to the Bonin Islands. ## CISCO HOMES, INC. SET TO MEET ISSUE

CISCO, March 7 — Cisco Homes, Inc. set to meet today to discuss the problem of the new housing project. The meeting was held at the home of E. G. Damron, president of the company, and was attended by directors and stockholders. The project is a 100-unit apartment building to be built on the site of the old Cisco High School. The company has received a permit from the city to build the project and is now in the process of securing financing. The meeting was held in the evening and adjourned at 10 o'clock.

## CHAPLAIN ACCEPTS CALL TO PASTORATE

Officials of the Second Baptist church have announced that Chaplain Jasper C. Massegee, formerly pastor of the church, has accepted the pastorate again and will take up his duties immediately. Massegee resigned the pastorate of the church to enter the service of the Army as a chaplain.

Chaplain Massegee was in the European Theatre where he served with the 70th and 90th Infantry Divisions. He served with the 417th Infantry Regiment, 76th Division for one year at Camp McCoy, Wisconsin, then served with this unit in combat overseas from early January until V-E Day. During his active service with the 417th Infantry, Chaplain Massegee served as Regimental Chaplain in England, France, Belgium, Luxembourg and Germany. With his unit he participated in the Ardennes, Rhineland and Central Europe Campaigns, being awarded three bronze battle stars, the American and World War II Victory medals. His Regimental Commander gave him a "Superior" rating for the service rendered. After V-E Day, he served four months with the 90th Division in Bavaria; for four months he also served with the 98th General Hospital located in Munich, Germany. He is on Terminal leave at the present which continues until April 7.

Spending 14 months overseas, Chaplain Massegee conducted over 200 services with approximately 9000 in attendance. There were about 100 public professions of faith. Other expressions of faith too numerous to mention. "Religion or a vital faith in God was the greatest morale factor for the service men when the going was hard and dangers were encountered," the Chaplain said. The Second Baptist Church has unanimously elected Chaplain Massegee as their pastor and he has accepted their call to continue his work among them and in the community.

Rev. Massegee states that he believes in the necessity of a co-operative spirit among churches and all worthy organizations which serve to build better communities, greater institutions, and stronger and more efficient citizens.

## TRUMAN SAYS DIFFICULTIES NO UND THREAT

WASHINGTON (UP) — President Truman said today the United Nations organization is not going to collapse as a result of differences with Russia because the United States will not let it collapse. Asked what would happen if the Soviet Union continued going down a one-way street, Mr. Truman snapped back that he didn't think Russia was going down a one-way street. The President's comments came two days after the United States had delivered a strong note to Moscow demanding withdrawal of Russian troops from Iran and accusing her of violating the Teheran declaration by not removing them by March 2. The United States also has protested Soviet policies in Manchuria where the Red Army is removing industries as war booty.

## Charge Sabotage In Fire On Liner

SOUTHAMPTON (UP) — Sabotage was blamed today for a mysterious fire aboard the \$5,000-ton liner Queen Elizabeth today and Scotland Yard agents were called in to help smash what was believed to be an arson ring operating in Britain's major ports. The entire Southampton dock area was placed on an anti-sabotage alert and fire patrols were doubled on all berthed ships as police began a minute check-up on all workmen and loiterers in the district.

## SETTING UP OF BODY WILL DELAY ACTION 30 TO 60 DAYS

WASHINGTON (UP) — President Truman today set up an emergency board to investigate the threatened railroad strike. The president's action under the railway mediation act will postpone for 30 to 60 days the strike of railroad locomotive engineers and trainmen scheduled for Monday. In past cases, the operations of emergency boards in railroad cases usually have brought about settlements without any strikes. At the same time, the president said flatly at a news conference that he will not intervene in the 108-day-old General Motors strike. Meanwhile the president called particular attention to peaceful settlements of the rubber and telephone disputes through the process of collective bargaining. He said it is too bad that people who could do things in the right way could not get the same public credit as those who run to the newspapers to make headlines.

## Churchill Asks Closer Union

RICHMOND, Va., (UP) — Winston Churchill, appealing once again for close union of the English-speaking peoples, warned today that peace cannot be preserved if they "cast aside the paternity of warlike strength" in "dangerous times."

We take back everything we have been saying about the disappearance of the terrific dust storms that used to roll in on Ranger each spring. And when the dust storm, a regular old-timer, hit Ranger about 5:00 o'clock Thursday afternoon, we were reminded of the old saying about the newcomer, the fool and Texas weather. And we're not a newcomer. Riding in with the dust storm was a typical spring norther which dropped temperatures in degree from 5:00 to 6:00 o'clock. High Thursday had been 84 and at 5:00 o'clock it was 80 degrees. Low this morning at 7:00 o'clock was 32 and at 8:00 o'clock the mercury had climbed two degrees. When the storm hit Thursday, windows four stories from the ground were peppered with sand and pebbles that rattled on windows like a shower of sleet. Fine dust sifted through even the tightest built buildings and more than one housekeeper was heard to complain.

## SAYS SPY RING HAS AID FROM AMERICANS

WASHINGTON (UP) — Representative Rankin, D. Miss., the ranking democrat on the House un-American activities committee, said today the Russian atomic spy ring is assisted by "American Communists, many of whom are on the federal payroll." He said in his statement that there "can be no question but that Communist spies and their fellow travelers are trying to secure the secrets of the atomic bomb." Committee Chairman John S. Wood, D., Ga., who announced yesterday that the spy ring had been unearthed, told reporters that as far as the committee had determined, no American was involved. Rep. Karl E. Mundt, R., S. D., said earlier that certain "professional scientific societies" may be involved, but Rep. J. Parnell Thomas, R., N. J., said the efforts so far have been unsuccessful. "As far as the committee can determine, the secret of the atom bomb is still exclusively ours," Thomas said.

## College Students Hear Mates Tell War Experiences

Ranger Junior College students are reliving World War II through a series of chapel programs which are given each Thursday at 11:30 a. m. Announcement of the program was made by Bobby Eakin, president of the student council, who stated that the first in the series was given by Albert Bradford, who served in the Air Corps in Europe. This week Everett Weaver, a veteran of the European war who served as a corporal in the 4th Division, gave a stirring account of his experiences from the time he left New York until his return to the states. He was in the invasion of Normandy and took part in five major battles before the Germans surrendered. Next week, T. J. Capell, who served as a corporal in the Pacific will give an account of his experiences. Great interest is being shown by the students in the series of programs.

## SAYS GOERING SOUGHT TO PREVENT WAR

NUERNBERG (UP) — Reichsmarshal Hermann Goerring tried vainly to prevent war and only built up the Luftwaffe for use if Germany's neighbors started it, his ostensible second in command testified before the war crimes court today. Marshal Erhard Milch, next to Goerring in the German air command, was the second witness as the defense for the Nazi leaders opened. Milch testified that Goerring did not want war, "but in his position there was nothing he could do—it was hopeless." The chief technician for the Luftwaffe said he advised Hitler that the air force was short of bombers and not ready for war against Russia, but Hitler disregarded the warning. He quoted Goerring as saying before the war that captured armaments should be "treated as our comrades."

## Pauley Still Fighting For His Appointment

WASHINGTON (UP) — Edwin W. Pauley said today he had considered both withdrawing from and going ahead with his fight for confirmation as undersecretary of the navy and "right now I'm in there slugging." Meanwhile, rumors about an alleged "deal" for Pauley's withdrawal, delays at the request of President Truman, and charges of "double cross" among committee members flew thick and fast. There were unconfirmed reports that arrangements had been made for Pauley to give his statement today denying various charges against him, and then withdraw tomorrow. There were reports that Sen. Charles W. Tobey, R., N. H., Pauley's chief opponent, agreed to such a program.

## Miss Childs Is Discharged From WAVES

Word has been received that Miss Mary Helen Childs, daughter of Mrs. C. L. Childs of Los Angeles, California, formerly of Ranger, has received her discharge from the service of WAVES. Miss Childs served as a lieutenant in the WAVES and received her discharge March 4 at the U. S. Naval Personnel Separation Center, U. S. Naval Barracks, Washington, D. C. She entered the service December 22, 1942 and her last station was the Naval Air Station, Norfolk, Virginia. 


