WASHINGTON (UP)- The Department of Agriculture is looking forward to a boom in frozen foods that may carry them to the top of the housewife's best

The department, in a special resume of the frezen foods industry, said that ultimately more than half of the nation's meat and a quarter of its fruits and vege tables may be marketed in frozen
