### INDIVIDUAL LABOR PROBLEMS

There is some interesting material for speculation in the evember report of the National Labor Relations Board, which shows a drop in union election ballots favoring collective bargaining. Out of 61,926 votes cast that month, only 69 per cent favored collective bargaining by an or-. gan zation, as against 74 per cent in August and October, and 30 per cent in September

The report showed further that, in all elections were workers could cast a negative vote, "no union" won a majority in 26 per cent of the cases.

· All sorts of meaning might be read into these figures. \* It could be said that they show a trend toward revolt against dictated mass action by union leaders. Or that they represent a protest against the alleged undemoncratic \*con luct of some unions. Or that thee"no union" voters \*foresee strikes in their industry in which their economic \*loss would far outweigh their gains.

Such speculations might be right to some extent. But to \*make them would be to indulge in more generalizing about labor with a capital L. And more generalities are something the subject doesn't need.

We should fel safer in guessing that the groups who -voted for "no union" were coting in a personal way about "specific conditions. It is probably not far wrong to assume that ro-union voters simply chose to let an unorganized well-enough alone.

Inevitably we have to speak in general terms about Mabor and unions in a day of industry-wide organization. "demands and strikes, and of mass political activities by organizations of unions. But we still believe that the cause and cure of most labor trouble and worker unrest is in the "Individual plant and its subdivisions.

Such problems as a domineering boss, an unreasonable management representative, or a trouble-making union steward are surely as acute and immediate as the broader grievances and demands that Mr. Green and Mr. Murray are compelled to concentrate upon. Industrial relations, of course, are human relations. And human beings carry their personal prejudices, frustrations and resentments on to the job with them.

Wire and earnest efforts toward understanding by individua's in individual plants would solve many labe problems. The same efforts by individuals in the highe more. But the efforts have not been made wisely and ear nestly enough.

So today we find a new Congress working in a tense at mosphere upon new labor legislation, to the accompani ment of exhortation and recrimination from the sidelines and mingled shouts of joy and fear from the crowd.

Senators Robert A. Taft of Ohio and J. William Fulbright of Arkansas collaborated on a bill to pass this miracle in the last Congress. It was also recommended in one of the President's reorganization plans, but that didn't get anywhere, either Lumped in the new Department would have been the present FSA units—Social Security Board, Children's Bureau, Public Health Service, Office of Education. Bureau, Public Health Service, Office of Education Office of Vocational Rehabilitation, Food and Dru

Administration and a few institutions in the District of Columbia.

If anything develops on this idea in the new Congress, it will have to be taken up with Republican Senator Taft. As chairman of the Senate Committee (\* Education and Labor, Robert will have to clear everything coming under the head of general welfare.

As a matter of fact, Taft's program in this field was pretty well outlined in the last Congress, when the Democrats were supposed to be running things. Now that the Republicans are boss, all Taft has to do is put his ideas across. It may not be as easy as it sounds. Taft's program includes a national health act, a bill to aid education, broadened social security coverage, a housing bill and various labor measures. Labor legislation will get priority handling in Taft's committee, but the other social issues should come up in rapid order. Taft's federal-aid-to-education bill would provide grants of money to states not able to pay their own way, so that the average expenditure for education would be not less than \$40 per pupil per year. Taft's national health act would provide for grants-in-aid to states setting up approved medical plans to pay the doctor and hospital bills of low-income families not able to afford proper care. AS a matter of fact, Taft's program in this field was pretty well

OTHER social welfare measures expected to be brought up in the

THER social welfare measures/expected to be brought up in the new Congress include a school health program and a cancer report program. Greater aid for vocational education, especially for physically handicapped, will/probably be proposed. The programs of two federal government wartime welfare activities to social the sought in bills to assist state and local governments in recreating programs, and to aid in the fight against social diseases. Extension of social security coverage is a hardy perennial, sure to set into bud in the new Congress, though it may not reach full om. Bringing the self-employed, farm and domestic workers underage and survivors' insurance, systems is one recommended program. Increasing present benefit/payments is another.


