FRANK ADMISSIONS WANTED

Devotion to the status quo is not an emotion peculiar to conservative, comfortably entrenched businessmen. And their cries of protest in the early days of the New Deal were no shriller than those being heard now from comfortably entrenched union executives against the proposed changes in labor laws.

In both cases the sins of the few were charged against the many. In both cases there was strong public sentiment for change. The chief difference is that the union men stand a good chance of making out better than the busi-

But if they do it probably won't be as a result of the reason and realism of their protests. Rather it would seem that if the sharp edge is taken off some of the new labor laws it will be because the Labor Committee of the Republican Senate contains three strongly pro-labor Republicans along with four strongly pro-labor Democrats.

There is no black-and-white simplicity about such things as industry-wide bargaining, the closed shop, union shop and maintenance-of-membership agreements. They are complex matters in which both sides have some presuas ive arguments.

But the extreme views on these subjects, for and against approach hysteria, with the champions of the labor status quo naturally making the most noise. Yet one examines their protsests in vain for any admission that the actions of certain union leaders may have aroused a great many people to the extent of influencing their vote last November and prompting them to demand some curb of economically disruptive powers.

Rather we hear from Philip Murray of the CIO that unidentified "powerful monopoly interests" are out to "destrow American unionism." Louis Hollander, New York state president of the CIO, credits Senator Ball personally with the same desire. The United Mine Workers Journal. taking another tack, sees in any effort to curb unions the regimentation of business and eventual destruction of the profit system.

Name-calling and ignoring charges by hurling countercharges are old political tricks. They can easily become a habitual method of argument. But they will not solve our present economic problems.

Before they can be solved the leaders of our great unions will have to admit that all their actions have not been perfect and to the public interest. They will have to recognize their public duties and responsibilities as well as their "rights." They will have to concede that those rights have been abused on occasion, and that others besides "powerful monopoly interests" would like to see the power of our John L. Lewises somewhat curtailed.

on pages 1406-8—there is a summary of government expenses year
by year for 10 years. It starts with 1939 and gives actual expenses
through 1946, and estimates for 1947 and 1948.

If the Republican Congress does what its leaders
say it will do, the 1948 figures won't look anything
like the President's numbers. But here is the best
possible list of symptoms from which to make a
diagnosis of the causes for the government's 10year headache of rising expense.

year headache of rising expense.

This fever chart shows that total government expenses rose from \$9 billion in 1937 to a peak of \$100 billion in 1945. Then they drop to \$63 billion in 1946, \$42 billion in 1947, \$37 billion is 1948. The 63 per cent drop in the last three years is

But the fact that federal expenditures in 1948 will by the President's estimates be 400 per cent above what they were in 1939 is also notable. And this is where an economy-minded Congress will have room to perform any operations deemed necessary to cure the government's spendthriftitis and end the headache.

GLANCE over some of the departmental figures to see how this gov-

GLANCE over some of the departmental figures to see how this government spending has grown beyond all sensible bounds. These are the 10-year growths, from 1937 to 1948, in round figures to the closest million or billion dollars:

National defense, from \$1 billion to \$11 billion.

Veterans' benefits, from \$500 million to \$7 billion.

International finance, from \$17 million to \$2820 million.

Social Security payments doubled, from \$886 million to \$1467 million. In this same 10-year period work relief—WPA and such direct relief measures—was cut from \$3111 million to only \$7 million. That's all to the good. But the trend towards more government social security aids is apparent. In his Economic Report, the President recommended that a larger share of this social security be paid for out of the federal treasury, instead of by employer-employe contributions. That would increase government expense.

Aids to housing jumped from \$17 million to \$225 million.

Research and education went up from \$44 million to \$88 million.

And present planning calls for vast increases in this latter sum.

Aids to agriculture jumped from a high \$927 million to a higher \$1603 million.

Development of non-agricultural resources is up from \$218 million to \$1099 million. Atomic energy development accounts for only \$444 million of that jump.

d to transportation—highways, airways and merchant marine— rose from \$466 million to \$1533 million.

A IDS to "free enterprise" business have climbed from \$24 million to \$112 million. Labor-regulation aid went up from \$11 million to

General government expenses are up from \$338 million to \$1427 Some items, like the present \$5 billion interest payment on the \$259 billion public debt, cannot be reduced. But others are strictly in the government luxury class. Once a program like labor training, support of farm prices, maternity benefits or the building of government parks is begun, it's hard to stop. All these things may be nice,

but are they necessary?
Those who say "Yes!" advance the argument that these expenditure: over the past 10 years have so promoted the general prosperity that the country can now afford to live at this higher standard.
